Support Asked For '57 Heart Fund Drive

February will be Heart Month in Springfield by official proclamation of Mayor Albert G. Binder.

In signing the proclamation today, Mayor Binder called upon the people of Springfield to give their earnest support of the 1957 Heart Fund drive, which the Union County Heart Association will conduct throughout the month.

The local association with Mrs. Amy Bandomer as the chairman, is affiliated with the New Jersey Heart Association and the American Heart Association, the only national voluntary health agency devoted exclusively to combating diseases of the heart and circulatory system.

The heart and circulatory diseases account for more deaths each year in this community and in the nation than all other causes of death combined, the Mayor pointed out in commenting on his proclamation. One among each 16 Americans suffers from some form of these diseases, which often cause family hardship and serious economic loss to local industry and the community at large.

Research is a primary need to discover the underlying causes of heart diseases; professional education programs to inform physicians about the latest knowledge in the field and public education programs to dispel misconceptions and to encourage early diagnosis.

Community services also are provided by the Heart Fund for rehabilitation of cardiac patients, prevention of rheumatic fever and other programs, he concluded.

Heart Sunday volunteers moved a step closer to Feb. 24, today with the completion of the distribution of Heart Sunday material kits for the door-to-door collection by Mrs. Henrietta Froehlich, executive secretary of the Union County Heart Assn. to Mrs. Amy Bandomer, Springfield Heart Fund chairman.

the Heart Month campaign. Mr. Sherman's personal check-not only gives momentum to the worthwhile fund drive but the Township official has promised to give as much of his own time to personally help Mrs. Bandomer and her volunteers to reach the quota set for Springfield.

August Opening Is Target For New Saks Store

5 Candidates File Petitions For School Bd.

A real contest developed for the three seats on the local Board of Education with the filing of petitions this week by Raymond Baumrind of 71 Kipling Avenue and yesterday by Mrs. Henry M. Wasung of 65 Woodcrest Circle. The election will be held Wednesday, February 13.

The three incumbents, Robert G. Smith, School Board president, Edwin G. Davenport and S. Bryant Haas had already announced that they were candidates for re-election.

Mrs. Wasung has been teaching school for a great many years and has made an exhaustive study of education problems, being very active in behalf of her profession. Baumrind is vice principal of the Robert Treat Junior High School in Newark and has been teaching in the Newark schools for over-10 years.

1957 Tax Rate Estimated At Well Over \$10

Township officials estimate a 1957 tax rate of well over \$10 for Springfield even though only preliminary considerations have been given the proposed budget.

The present rate is 9.77 and the increase, say members of the governing body, is inevitable with the automatic increases for police and firemen's pay, the 16 additional points as the result of the Regional and local school expansion program and other services.

Budget studies are occupying the attention of the Township Committee and efforts will be made to hold down the impending tax rise wherever possible. However, the 1957 rate is certain to be much over the \$10 figure, and some officials believe it will go very much over the \$10 estimate.

Move To Divide Town Into 13 Vote Districts

There will be 13 voting districts in Springfield instead of the six the Township now has, and the governing body plans to introduce the necessary resolutions to make the changes at the February 11 regular meeting.

The redistricting of the Township will be made in time for the coming primaries, according to Mrs. Eleanor H. Worthington, Township Clerk.

The largest district will be the Fourth which will include all voters living in the area bounded by Morris Avenue, Short Hills Avenue and Main street to the Millburn line, with 756 eligible voters.

The Sixth District will include Tower Drive, Lewis Drive back to Millburn Avenue, out Morris and the Springbrook section. This will have 579 voters.

The Henshaw-Hawthorn area will be the 7th district and the Pitt Road, Fieldstone Drive section will now be the 9th with 617 eligible voters.

The most compact voting district will be the 12th which is part of the Briar Hills development with 543 eligibles and 60 new homes being planned. The Woodside development will be District No. 8.

Ed. Board Hopeful To Face PTA Mon.

Candidates who aspire to be elected or re-elected to the Springfield Board of Education will be introduced at the January meeting of the Springfield Parent-Teacher Association on Monday, at 8:45 p.m. in the Florence M. Gaudineer School.

Mrs. Richard Moore, President of the Springfield League of Women Voters, will introduce Mrs. Russell Hillier, a member of the Springfield Board of Education. Mrs. Hillier will explain the functions of the Board of Education in the community.

Mrs. Naomi Alpher, Legal Aid Attorney for the District of Columbia Bar, will present the candidates and act as moderator of the meeting. Mrs. Alpher, a life member of the National P.T.A., has been an active P.T.A. worker in New Jersey and now resides in Westfield.

Candidates who will be introduced include the three incumbents, Robert G. Smith, President of the Board; S. Bryant Haas; and Edwin G. Davenport, also Raymond Baumrind, new aspirant.

Mrs. Alpher will act as moderator during the question and answer period which follows the introduction of the candidates. Questions may be verbal or written ones. Mrs. R. D. Hargrove, Jr., will assist Mrs. Alpher as timekeeper.

Mrs. Joseph Bender, Vice-President of the P.T.A. representing the Florence M. Gaudineer School, and Mrs. David T. Stamelein, Voters Service Chairman for the local League of Women Voters, have coordinated the program plans for this meeting.

Union Bank Is Successful In Bond Sale Bid

The First State Bank of Union was successful bidder for the \$370,000 bond issue at an adjourned regular meeting of the Township Committee held in the Florence M. Gaudineer School Tuesday evening. The funds will be used to finance an addition to the Municipal Building expansion, an addition to the Library and the construction of the Municipal Garage now well under way on construction.

There were four bidding groups all of whom offered the same interest rate of 3.70 but the Union bank bid \$370,886 for the issue which was higher than the others and accepted by the Township Committee. Other bidders were Rippel & Co. Fidelity Union Trust Company and the Union County Trust Company.

Representatives of the various financial organizations, appearing for the groups of bidders, were very impressed with well prepared proposal asking for bids on this bond issue and several of them spoke very highly of the fine condition of "your rapidly growing community." The brochure and invitation to bid on the bond issue including lists of township and school bond maturities, tax collections, complete financial information showing indebtedness and other pertinent data which had a great deal to do with bringing in bids from some of the leading financial groups in this area.

Building Far Ahead Of Adjacent Towns

Springfield was higher than all its neighbors in construction during 1956—the report of the Township Building Inspector, Wilbert J. Binder showing more building last year than Summit, Millburn and Union.

In total construction work Springfield reported \$7,636,905 against \$5.3 million for Summit, \$6.7 million for Union and \$3,368,913 for Millburn-Short Hills.

Springfield officials are especially proud of the number of one family dwellings constructed during 1956—the report giving a total of 349 as compared to 288 for Union and 123 for Millburn.

Township officials expect to keep up the building pace for this year with Nick Angleton's garden apartment project and several new developments for one family houses being planned for 1957.

Elks Start Easter Campaign For Crippled Children

Joining the 80 other Elks Lodges in the State of New Jersey, Springfield's Lodge No. 2004 is conducting a two-week drive within its membership to support the New Jersey State Elks 35th annual fund drive for its crippled children's work.

February 1 the appeal will be carried to the public with the mailing of a sheet of seals to every home in the state.

The 1957 Easter Shield campaign goal is \$200,000. Since inception of the program in 1929 more than \$4,500,000 has been spent to aid the handicapped in New Jersey.

Commenting on the appeal, Exalted Ruler, Richard M. Blake reminded members this is one drive where every dollar collected is expended in New Jersey for New Jersey children. "The Elks Crippled Children's Committee has no connection with any other group," he said, and added, "no portion of money received is allotted to any outside organization for administration, research or promotion on a national level."

He explained that the annual drive is directed by the New Jersey State Elks Crippled Children's Committee on behalf of the state's 81 lodges. At the conclusion of the drive all funds collected are allocated to the individual lodges for disbursement to augment funds appropriated by each lodge for its work in this field.



It's hard to believe that we are back from our Haytian vacation. So many impressions are still fresh in my mind. From the moment we asked our driver, "Parlez-vous anglais?" our adventure started. He honked three times to a passer-by and took off. Like most cabbies in Haiti, he had a habit of shutting off his motor (to save gas) each time he stopped.

The streets of Port-Au-Prince were a midway crowded with people and the noise of honking horns. Our driver added his generous part to the clutter.

The sun was always bright and sharpened the many colors. Even the people of Haiti represented a variety of colors ranging from ebony black to olive tan. Many peoples make up the history of Haiti, mainly the American Indian, Spanish, French, and African. Their rhythm is always present. The local radio station blares from homes along the streets. The people walk with a rhythmic free, swinging gait. It's not unusual to see little children dancing the "meringue" in the streets during the daylight hours. In the evening, small bands can be heard from the numerous hotels and night spots.

The memory that will remain the most vivid is that of the stoical women who unconcernedly balance heavy wicker baskets on their heads as they go to and forth home. One of the surprises of the market places. They carry everything-live chickens, fruit, all sorts of garden vegetables, charcoal, water cans, calabashes, etc. A few have burros that look as if they are moth eaten and exhausted but somehow these animals manage to carry mountains of wares and, more often than not, a rider perched on top of the load. Highlights of our trip included bongu-drum lessons from the leader of the little band playing at our hotel; a trip to one of the most beautiful coral reefs in the world; a visit to a supposedly authentic (we will never know) voodoo ceremony; an evening of trying our luck at the famed International Casino; and the experience of eating creole foods that, to say the least, are different from what we were used to back-

Haiti is the sight of tremendous mountain ranges rising on all sides almost from the ocean to heights as high as 8,000 feet. The views from these mountain tops are breathtaking and frequently carry the eye 20 miles to the next range.

Our visit was made even more enjoyable by the wonderful people we met. Among these was Miss Katherine Baer, a charming member of the staff of the English language newspaper, Haiti Herald. Miss Baer, an American who now makes her home in Haiti, guided us to some of the "off the beaten track" night spots.

We will always be grateful to our travel agent and fellow Springfieldite, Bill Savarin of the Fisher Travel Agency for arranging such a delightful trip.

At this point I should be murmuring "it's good to be home" but, to be perfectly honest "it was such fun to be away."

A meeting of the Executive Board of the Springfield P.T.A. was held in the Florence M. Gaudineer School on Monday, January 21. Mrs. B. P. Yuckman presided and committee chairmen made reports.

The Special Committee which was appointed to study the advisability of reorganization of the Springfield P.T.A. reported the recommendations which were decided upon after several weeks of research and study on the assignment.

In studying the by-laws of the National Parent-Teacher Association, this committee reported finding that the Springfield P.T.A. does not conform with the P.T.A.

Constitution according to Article 1 of the national constitution which makes it mandatory for each local unit to carry the name of the school. For this reason the committee recommends that the vice-presidents, representing the schools be delegated to meet with the principals of each school for the purpose of organizing individual local P.T.A. groups. It is further recommended that the present Springfield P.T.A. be known as the Council of Parent-Teacher Associations of Springfield. As stated in the P.T.A. manual: "Through a council, a group of local P.T.A. units can bring the power of united planning and effort to solve problems that are beyond the scope of a single P.T.A. working alone. Together the units can undertake, for example, community service projects and action programs to secure improvements in the school system as a whole. Individually each local P.T.A. unit can work on individual problems affecting the school and P.T.A. members which the unit represents. The report of the committee indicated that it was felt that the individual schools will profit by individual P.T.A. units which have representative membership in the Council of Parent-Teacher Associations of Springfield. In this way, chances for solving individual school P.T.A. problems are afforded through the school's

P.T.A. and yet the power of united planning can be preserved in the Council of Parent-Teacher Associations of Springfield.

The January meeting of the Springfield P.T.A. will be held in the Florence M. Gaudineer School on Monday, January 28, at 8:15 p.m. It is at this meeting that P.T.A. members will be given an opportunity to vote upon the question of reorganization of the P.T.A. An attendance award banner and a book will be awarded to the class in each school which has the highest percentage of parents in attendance at this meeting.



TAKING CARE OF YOUR GARDEN

By Edward A. Cardinal
Chairman, Springfield Shade Tree Commission

This is the time of the year when you should start thinking about repairs to your lawn mowers. If it has been operating well during the past season the chances are that sharpening is all that is required, but if it is in need of repairs don't wait until you are ready to cut the grass and then expect the repairman to drop everything to put your machine in shape. Many machines on the market today, especially those bought at low prices, are difficult to repair because parts are not readily available. Only the top brands have parts suppliers handy and it is not wise to wait too long for repairs. Bring your machine to the repairman now and chances are it will be in tip-top shape when you need it.

QUESTION: I have seen my neighbors spend hours trying to start their gas engines and wonder if I shouldn't buy an electric powered machine. What is your opinion?
ANSWER: A good gasoline engine should start immediately if in proper condition. Here is obviously a case where it should be brought to an authorized repairman who is equipped to do a satisfactory job. An electric machine has advantages in starting, but most are under-powered, have a nuisance value in the form of an electric cable, and the battery increases in proportion to the dis-

ance of the lawn's most remote edges. It is very annoying to have a hundred feet of wire all tangled up in the shrubbery. In wet weather an electric machine can be an extreme hazard if a short circuit should develop. Hardly a month goes by that someone doesn't come to our shop and ask to trade in their electric machine.
QUESTION: Which is best, a reel type mower, or a rotary?
ANSWER: Both have their fine points. Rotary types are excellent for cutting tall, rough grass, especially if you are one that is not interested in maintaining a fine lawn. Rotary cutters by impact and it is important to have a sharp, properly balanced blade to avoid tearing the grass. Be certain it is well shielded to prevent stones and other debris from being ejected to maim someone. They are dangerous and I can give you names of people in Springfield who have lost fingers, or suffered injury. If you get a rotary by all means get a good one.

Reel type mowers make a cleaner cut and most professional men prefer them for fine lawns. Here again you get what you pay for and can't expect something sold below manufacturer cost to perform properly. Chances are that company is out of business because the machine was a "chuck". Don't buy a mower in the box, any more than you would buy an auto in the box, but purchase your machine from a reputable dealer who will give you satisfactory service. Let him assemble and service the machine and show you how to operate it properly.
QUESTION: Which is best in a

rotary, a two or a four cycle engine?
ANSWER: Both can be good, but here again it depends on the engine. Some two cycle engines, especially the under-powered ones found on cheap machines, are extremely noisy, because they must operate at terrific speeds to develop sufficient power. An engine with plenty of power can maintain cutting speed without operating at full throttle and will not make as much noise. Before deciding on a machine visit several reputable dealers and inspect the leading brands. Go to a dealer with a wide selection to choose from and you will be more apt to find a desirable machine.

\$1,000 Worth Of Pups Born Here

If you aren't a connoisseur of dogs, you'd think the Norman Le Boeufs of 100 Adam Terrace have a bad case of mice in their bedroom.

Their big grey dog has just delivered 10 small grey pups in the Le Boeuf master bedroom, and nobody is fool hardy enough to suggest that they be moved. The mother gives anyone who comes near her pups the same reception that the Mad Bomber would get at Flatiron.
