Plan Elaborate Renovation Job At 59 Mtn. Ave.

As soon as the necessary funds are placed in the budget, the Springfield Recreation Commission will formally appoint Edward J. Ruby as full time Recreation Director. Mr. Ruby is currently an assistant coach at the Jonathan Dayton Regional High School and has been part time director for the Recreation Commission.

The Township Committee has given its approval of the Recreation Commission's program for the coming year and, at the regular meeting last Wednesday, formally turned over the town owned building at 59 Mountain Avenue to be used as a recreation center.

The governing body also voted to release \$2,500 of the \$11,000 being held in escrow, which was turned over to the Township when the Springfield Girl Scouts were merged with the Washington Rock Girl Scout Council. This money is to be used to convert the property for use as a recreation center.

A very elaborate alteration job to transform the building in Mountain Avenue was presented to the Township Committee, accompanied by blue prints and a letter which gave details of the proposed renovation.

ONE BIG ROOM
The plan calls for the removal of certain partitions downstairs so as to give a room approximately 29 feet long by 14 feet wide. The kitchen is to be in the center of the room and will be divided into a lavatory and a kitchenette, with additional closet and storage space.

"Upstairs the existing closets off each bedroom will be torn out," the letter continues, "and one large room made available. We plan to have a divider, folding door or such, so as to use the area

as two rooms when necessary." The Recreation Commission plans to use the house, when these renovations are completed, as a center out of which will stem all activities, the letter further states. "In the downstairs room," the Commission continues, "we will have a combination table for ping pong, tether ball and other games. There will be checker top and billiard tables. A shuffleboard is under consideration.

PLAN PLAY ROOM
Upstairs the Recreation Commission plans television, card and checker top tables, and a list of necessary equipment was submitted to the Township Committee which means an immediate expenditure of approximately \$2,500. The list includes 36 chairs, combination card and checker tables, a billiard table, television radio combination, shuffleboard, pressure cooler, gas range, refrigerator, kitchen supplies and various other incidentals.

The Recreation Commission has figured that the alterations will cost approximately \$2,500. The plan is to advertise for bids for the alteration job, very shortly. A. Panconi, local architect, has been working closely with the Recreation Commission and submitted the workable plan that has been accepted by both the Recreation Commission and the Township Committee.

Ruby Unanimous Choice As Recreation Director

Edward J. Ruby, who is to be named as full time Recreation Director by the Springfield Recreation Commission to take full charge of all activities in the Township, has had considerable experience in such work and his recommendation received the full support of members of the governing body.

A letter from the Recreation Commission to the Township Committee pointed out that "for several years the Township has felt the need of a full time director. As our town has grown, our program has grown too. It is almost impossible to keep on top of all the activities and plan new ones when we depend entirely on our volunteer services and those of a part time Recreation Director."

"With the formal transfer of the Township owned building at 59 Mountain Avenue to the Recreation Commission and the plan for transforming it into a community center for all activities, the Recreation Commission's letter stated that 'if 59 Mountain Avenue becomes the hub of all activities, the services of a full time director will be needed to guide and supervise activities there. . . We feel that the time has arrived for a full time Director and we urge that you give out request favorable consideration.'"

The Recreation Commission then went on to state that "we are unanimous in the recommendation that Mr. E. J. Ruby be given that position. He has served the town in the capacity of a part time director since 1947 and has endeared himself to all the youth in the area. This alone, we feel is recommendation enough, but

we know from our years of working with him that he qualifies as one who can administer our program and organize where necessary. He can build good will in our town of Springfield. . . His background in recreation work needs no further word from us."

"The letter to the Township Committee concluded with information that the Recreation Commission anticipates we would offer him between \$5,500-\$6,000. The Recreation Commission has not worked out a budget as yet, the letter continues, but it would probably mean approximately \$3,000 more than under the present budget.

Formal appointment of Ruby will probably be made after the first of the year.

Number Of School Kids Doubles Here

The number of children attending school in Springfield has doubled since 1952 according to figures released this week. The five-year span shows Springfield running far ahead of the rest of Union County in percentage of increase in school-age children. In 1952 only 1,228 children were enrolled locally—this Fall 2,441 children answered the school roll.

This total included both public and parochial schools. Attendance of school children throughout the county is up about one third for the same period.

40 Percent of Regional Grads Are At Colleges

A count of graduates from Jonathan Dayton Regional High School last year shows that 40 percent are attending four year college courses. Of the 1957 boy graduates, 45 percent are now attending college while the percentage of the girl graduates is 35.

Girl graduates of Regional are enrolled at State Teachers Colleges, four attending the Newark Teachers College. One young lady, Barbara Boyd, is at Iowa State College, another, Doreen Haupt, is at Miami University, and Lorraine Mischler is studying at the University of Wisconsin. The Newark College of Engineering has the greatest number of last year's Regional graduates as students, among them being Richard Boylan, Max Hentschel, Raymond Hawryluk, Raymond Seltsman, John Cleveland, John Haseimann, Rudiger Tietze, and Edward Kent.

Seton Hall University has two Regional graduates, William Motter and Richard Gardella, and Upsala College has three, Russell Cera, Richard Ryehlik and Robert Miller. Two boys, Douglas Fay and Thomas Doherty, are at Lehigh University.

New York Times Retells Story of Old Home Here

The New York Times carried another Springfield item in a recent Sunday's edition, retelling the story of the two century old house which is now the residence of the Heaths.

Under the heading "Antiques Adorn 2-Century House," the feature story, by Milton Honig, appeared as follows: Mr. and Mrs. Clyde W. Heath have a practical conversation piece. Their possession is a small fieldstone house here at least 200 years old. It is rich in legend and history.

The two-story structure and basement was built by Isaac Sayre Jr., Revolutionary War patriot. According to local historians, George Washington not only slept in the house but also used it as his secret headquarters during New Jersey campaigns.

It is still secluded. Hidden among wooded hills, the house is reached by a mile-long gravel lane that runs off Baltusrol Road. For more than two centuries direct descendants of the Sayre family have lived in the house. The last occupant was of the sixth generation, Miss Nellie Charlotte Sayre, who died in April, 1954, at the age of 84.

The Heaths bought it two years ago from Ralph T. Sayre of East Orange. Mr. Heath, who is associated with the United States Trust Company of New York, looks upon the acquisition as an adventure and a challenge. He and Mrs. Heath, a piano teacher, have long been interested in Revolutionary and Colonial life in New Jersey.

Over the years they have been buying antiques and restoring and preserving them. Before

Bonadies In Attack On Freeholders; Protest All Tax Budgets, He Urges

Industry Here Says Nuisance Is Now Abated

Officials of the Investment Casting Company, at 60 Brown Avenue, reports this week that a great deal has already been done toward eliminating the charges of "smoke and odors being emitted from our chimney."

The Investment Casting Company has been called before the Springfield Board of Health to answer charges by residents in that industrial area alleging that the plant should be compelled to eliminate "any such odors."

Following is the letter from the Investment Casting Company:

"The Investment Casting Company has recently completed the installation of equipment to eliminate most of the smoke and odors being emitted from our chimney. Our progress toward a solution of this problem no doubt appeared to be painfully slow to the irritated eyes and noses of our neighbors during these past months. Promises to install a taller chimney for better draft and other similar modifications, although carried out in great detail, proved to have been inadequate. However, by continuing to experiment, a radically new technique was introduced on a pilot scale during August and September with a significant reduction of smoke.

Based on the above results, a production unit was constructed and its installation completed and tried out during October. Sanitarian, Mr. A. Marshall and Dr. Mulligan of the Health Department were invited to inspect the completed installation in November, and they advised that great progress had been made to eliminate the smoke and odors.

Investment Casting Company wishes to extend to all of its neighbors holiday greetings and reassure them that the coming year will certainly be a more "smoke-free" one.

Township Committeeman Vincent J. Bonadies, lone Democrat on the Springfield governing body, is not letting the holiday spirit dissuade him from firing a few parting shots at the Republican controlled Union County Board of Freeholders, and threatening to continue the fight through 1958.

He did this in a statement issued this week in which he urged all municipal bodies in Union County, regardless of political affiliation, to adopt their local 1958 budgets under protest.

Mr. Bonadies says "these budgets containing county taxes assessing homeowners for the wanton spending of the Benninger Freeholder clique" should not get the formal approval of the municipal officials.

Bonadies, statement declared that "while municipal governing body members such as myself have no recourse in the shaping of county taxes which are handed down to us for incorporation in the municipal levy it would be outrageous to sit passively and accept such Benninger-inspired assessments that are uncalled for, unjustified and even under attack by Republican officials themselves."

ATTACK BENNINGER
"The high salaried county posts created by the Benninger Freeholder clique," Bonadies said, "coming on the heels of the most infamous political spending spree of taxpayers' money in the guise of publishing the Route 22 maps typify the wanton disregard for the taxpayers' money held by this power-thirsty clique."

The latest spending, Bonadies said, has been attacked already "by members of this same clique's political party as a 'patronage grab-and-a-power-play-sure-and-simple . . . bearing the stamp of one faction—a most unnecessary aggression to a waning political power.'"

PROTECT TAXPAYERS
Bonadies asked: "What about the taxpayers in every community who once again will have to dig into his pockets to foot the bill?"

Every governing-body member in every community in Union County can rise and be counted on this issue by vigorously protesting the spending of the freeholders led by Albert J. Benninger when the respective communities are confronted with their county tax bills for municipal budget adoption, Bonadies continued.

To let this taxation go without protest, Bonadies said, would be unforgivable.

"I personally am going to ask every municipal governing body member in every community to take such action so that we may see and end for once and for all to power politics in Union County," Bonadies concluded.

Jobs In Offices Claim Most Grads

A list of occupations of last year's graduates at the Jonathan Dayton Regional High School gives office positions as the most popular of jobs being held; total of 65 being employed in that capacity. Of these 57 are girls and 8 boys.

Fifty three boy graduates are attending a College of Arts, as compared to 43 for the previous year's graduates. This list is made up of 33 boys and 20 girls. Nine of the graduates are studying at State Teachers Colleges, and the same number at engineering schools. Five of last year's girl graduates are in nursing schools and six are attending technical schools.

Trade and Industrial positions claim 23 of last year's graduates, a total of 102 being employed. Nineteen of last year's graduates are in the service and only five are neither in school nor employed.

... total price of all: Total price \$35.91 if given.





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

New Year's Day and New Year Resolutions are two thoughts which march along together. A couple of years ago the readers of the Springfield Library were urged to make a special resolution. It was to resolve that for the year 1958, they would bring their books back on time. At that time there was a noticeable improvement and ever since readers have been more careful. Miss Phoebe Briggs has done a wonderful job: sending notices, calling them up, and visiting their homes to remind

them when books were kept out too long. While the library was closed and then reopened there was a bit of confusion. The books taken out for the summer were returned more promptly than they had been for years. However, there are still too many people paying large fines and there is room for improvement. Therefore, for 1958 let every reader make it his library resolution number 1, to return books promptly? Library resolution number 2, should be to pick up request books as soon as notified.
