## Condition Of Old Cemetery Here Deplored

SPRINGFIELD—Residents of this historic community, rich in Revolutionary lore, are up in arms because of the condition of the old cemetery, opposite the Presbyterian Church in Main street, and plans are being launched to do something about it.

A letter from Harold A. Sonn, former president and now Registrar of the Passaic Valley Chapter of the New Jersey Society, Sons of the American Revolution, describes the present condition of the cemetery.

His letter suggests that a committee be formed, funds solicited and maintenance people be assigned to take care of this Revolutionary Cemetery throughout the year.

Mr. Sonn stated that he believed his chapter of the S.A.R. would be glad to start the list of contributions but he wanted to make certain that the work of restoring the cemetery and maintaining its appearance would be in the hands of responsible people throughout the year.

Springfield Resident

Mr. Sonn is now a resident of Springfield having moved here recently from Short Hills. His letter on the subject of the "Springfield's Historic Revolutionary Cemetery" follows:

We have recently witnessed in Newark the forthcoming passing of one of its famous cemeteries in which are buried many of the early settlers and Revolutionary soldiers, that of the Old First Presbyterian Church on Broad Street near Market.

Permission was granted by Court for its abandonment due to neglect, as one of the reasons, the other being need of the church for income by converting the area into commercial purposes.

Springfield should awaken to this situation immediately and come to the rescue of the Old Revolutionary Cemetery, opposite the Presbyterian Church on Main Street before it is too late. This historic cemetery is in great need of attention as it is in deplorable condition.

Memorial Day will soon be upon us when Passaic Valley American Revolution will place flags on the graves of veterans of the War of Independence and the War of 1812, as it has done for almost forty years. In making preparations for this annual event,

## UNICO Will Give Honor To Former Police Chief

SPRINGFIELD—Chase Runyon, former Springfield police chief, has been picked as Springfield's outstanding citizen of the year by the Springfield-UNICO and will be honored by UNICO's and will be honored by UNICO's third annual "I Am An American Day" in ceremonies held at the Essex House, Newark on May 9 at 6:30 p.m.

UNICO, in the past two years, has named Florence M. Gaudiner, school nurse; and Phoebe Briggs, Librarian as recipients of the honored title.

Chase Runyon was born in Newark, New Jersey October 15, 1899, is married and has three children. He has resided in Springfield since 1919.

He served in the Navy from July 1916 to July 1920, was assigned overseas for two years and three months in World War I, where he advanced to the rank of Chief Petty Officer in the gunnery division.

He joined the Springfield Police Department in 1923 and was appointed Chief of Police in September, 1927. He retired December 1, 1950. He served as Commander of the Springfield Civil Defense during World War II.

He majored in psychology in Dana College and studied Criminal Law for two years at the New Jersey Law School. At Rutgers University, he attended the Traffic Officer's Training School, Advanced Traffic Training Course, Scientific Detection course, Criminal Law course and the Police Administration course. He also holds certificates for attendance at two State Police and four F.B.I. police training courses.

In 1951 he received the Lions Club award for outstanding service to the community.

He has served as secretary and was later elected President of the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police. He is a life member of the Patrolmen's Benevolent Association.

## Springfield Invaded By State Highway Surveyors

SPRINGFIELD—The New Jersey State Highway Department engineers are swarming all over the Township with surveying instruments—but no one has or will give any information, even to the Springfield officials.

However, it is clear to everyone that the Highway Department surveyors are plotting the area for the coming of the new federal highway No. 78, also known as the new Route 22.

Springfield officials have asked questions but the Highway Department boys just keep rolling along, and hammering down the stakes without offering much of an explanation.

It appears, however, that these stakes are part of the plotting survey for the coming of the new federal highway. The plotting has been following the route already discussed by Highway Department engineers but it varies in many cases.

For instance, some of the surveying indicates that there may be a slight change in what residents in Springfield had planned.

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## Here Are Some Things You Should Know About Roads

SPRINGFIELD—With surveyors and engineers of the New Jersey State Highway Department becoming very active in the Township, property owners and residents, in general, will be interested in the methods employed by the state agency in carrying out such an ambitious program.

(Following is the first of two installments on the procedures employed by the Highway Department in acquisition. The second installment will appear next week.)

The overall long-range plan calls for building more than 800 miles of new freeways on entirely new alignments and widening and dualizing about half of the routes that constitute the present 1848 mile highway system. Most of the work will involve the acquisition of at least some new land and precipitate a new experience for many who will be approached by State Highway Department right-of-way acquisition negotiators for the first time.

The procedure for "right-of-way" property acquisition by the State Highway Department is frequently misunderstood since it is an operation that relatively few people are acquainted with. It is sometimes looked upon with apprehension and even suspicion.

**Simple Process**  
Actually the process is a simple one, quite the same in most instances as any individual would experience in conducting a private person-to-person sale of property—the exception being that the State, because it is acting in the public interest, has the right to require that the owner sell his property at a fair price.

An appropriate illustration of what is meant by the term "public interest" was recently contained in a Departmental study concerning one section of a proposed new urban freeway. The study pointed out that about 500,000 people will come within the facility's area of influence—but less than 2 percent of them will be involved in right-of-way transactions. The point illustrated is a basic tenet of government within a democracy—the benefits to the majority must take precedence over the inconveniences to a few.

The State Highway Department's policy makes certain that all transactions be eminently fair and as convenient to the property owner as is possible. Though occasionally

## Tax Collections Ahead of 1958

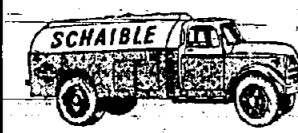
Markers Overturned

During the past year much more deterioration has occurred to many stones; some score of new markers placed two years ago for Revolutionary soldiers, have been partially hidden by grass and dirt, dead limbs have fallen, many stones are badly leaning and need straightening.

The pile of old stones, removed from their grave locations has been increasing in size, and in many places stones that have fallen flat in past years are almost covered with several inches of sod.

I realize that it would take quite a sum to clean up and straighten up this cemetery, but once it was done properly, it would require

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less each year to maintain it. While the cemetery belongs legally to the local Presbyterian Church, it belongs to Springfield with its great historic background and as such it should be the concern of all citizens to help in maintaining this hallowed spot.

It is right in the heart of town, passed daily by thousands of people, many of them visitors, and even a fleet passing glance from car windows bring to light the conditions of which I speak.

I would like to recommend that a local committee be formed of a permanent nature to raise funds for this needed work and I am sure that my Chapter of the S. A. R. Passaic Valley would do its share.

On this committee should be representatives from all patriotic and civic societies such as Springfield H. I. S. T. C. A. I. Society, American Legion Veterans of Foreign Wars, Chamber of Commerce, Daughters of the American Revolution, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and yes, even churches of all denominations.

It should be the pride of all citizens of Springfield, this famous Revolutionary Cemetery.

Suggests Map  
I believe that such a committee has several things to do in connection with this project. First, as complete a list of burials as possible to get, be prepared together with a map showing grave locations (I realize this seems impossible, as many stones are not in their original places, but before more stones are completely erod-

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ed and identification lost, that their locations be marked on map before these stones join the pile of debris).

All stones that could be straightened should be corrected, and all stones completely unrecognizable should be removed completely from the cemetery grounds. Stones now completely buried by several inches of debris and sod, should be dug up and erected.

And finally, that publicly be given to as many surnames of those buried in this cemetery, with names and dates where possible, and sent to genealogical and historical magazines in an attempt to locate descendants urging them to join such a committee and contribute for its support.

Are we Americans growing callous to our Great American Heritage?

ready accepted. While no information has been made available by the state engineers, the surveying shows that the highway may come further east into the Jenco property which is the vacant land in the rear of the north side of Morris avenue.

Route Changed?  
This may probably mean that the Highway Department is planning to move the new road so as to miss the post office building in Morris avenue but it also may take out the Bunnell property where the Good Deal Markets are planning a brand new operation. This slight change in the route of the highway will bring it over Main street on its way out of town between the two cemeteries.

Surveyors are also busy in other parts of Springfield which it is said is important as part of the general plotting program so that the engineers may be able to make a thorough study of the area. Reports from Washington state that the plan of the New Jersey Department for this new roadway has already been accepted by the Federal Bureau of Roads.

The survey on the new Route 24 (Morris Avenue) linking with the federal highway in Springfield is continuing but that has nothing to do with the work of the surveyors in the Township this week.

As soon as that report is submitted the State Highway Department states that it will hold a public meeting here to discuss the findings of the survey for rt. 24.

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**Don't Ignore Faulty Wiring; It's a Major Fire Cause!**  
By FIRE CHIEF RONALD HUTER  
Faulty electrical wiring causes the majority of fire losses to tax payers. Check the wiring to all motors and appliances. Fuses, switches, wires and cables that feel hot to the touch are a danger signal. Call your electrician and get his advice.

Home appliances, tools and other electrical equipment that does not perform properly should be checked immediately. Fuse blowing is not an excuse for increasing the size of the fuse. Under no condition should the fuse exceed the capacity recommended for the wire. Complete all electrical wiring to a point. Never leave unconnected wires or uncovered boxes. If you must do the job in stages, complete it by rooms, partitions or outlets because it often is a long time before you get back to it again.

See that all cables and boxes are properly fastened. Under no condition hang anything on a cable or romex. The weight can readily pull the jacket or armor apart and cause a short circuit. Drop lights and extensions are only a temporary means of light and power and ordinarily should be used only for the day or until your electrician can schedule your request. The so-called temporary wiring jobs often run into years, and wear through or crack where they are run over nails or hooks, causing short circuits.

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## YOUR LIBRARY

SPRINGFIELD — This year an ideal book for Mothers' Day has just been published. It is Charles Van Doren's "Letters to Mother." This is such a perfect answer to the gift for a mother who loves reading, that it is in danger of becoming the stereotype that Whistler's Portrait of His Mother has become.

In his book, Charles Van Doren has collected letters written to mothers by men and women famous, or literary, or even not particularly well-known. Of particular interest is a letter dated "2 Sep 1814" in which Frances Scott Key told his mother why he was going to seek the English Fleet in Chesapeake Bay. To the mother of portrait fame, Whistler wrote from London in 1878, telling her how delighted he was with the almost finished painting of the Peacock Room. The beloved "Marmee" of "Little Women" received from her daughter Louisa May Alcott a Christmas letter and a copy of "Flower Fables," one of Louisa's first books.

"Letters to Mother," "Letters from Explorers and Travelers," and "Letters from Fighting Men." Some of Van Doren's other groups are "Statesmen and Rulers," "Historians and Philosophers," "Revolutionaries and Humanitarians." This makes a perfect bedside companion, the type of book you can pick up, read a bit, and then save for the next evening.

Mothers of course have families, and the Van Dorens as a family are outstanding in literature and scholarship. This week the display in the hallway of the Springfield Public Library is featuring their works. Charles' mother has just published her book, "The Professor and I," about the little incidents of home life in their New York apartment and in Connecticut. These sketches are similar to her former work "The Country Wife." Her novel "Dacey Hamilton" is likewise in the display.

Father, Mark Van Doren, has gotten one ahead of mother—two books of his, "The Last Days of Lincoln," a play, and his autobiography have come out within the last six months. He also has the largest number of books to his credit: "The Noble Voice," "Masterpieces of American Poets," "Don Quixote's Profession," and his book of poems, "The Careless Clock."

Uncle Carl Van Doren is represented by his great biography of "Benjamin Franklin," "Secret

History of the American Revolution," and "An Anthology of World Prose." His "Great Rehearsal," about the U.S. Constitution, is in use.

Although the other members of the family have more works to their credit than Charles, he is the youngest and beginning to catch up. Recently he worked with R. J. Roske on a biography of Commander W. B. Cushing, U.S.N., called "Lincoln's Commando." He may be the best known member of the family because of his television appearances. His father has been in the news too because this year he is retiring from his post as professor at Columbia University. At this great school he has been so popular that many honors are being awarded to him, and many fetes arranged to show appreciation.

All the Van Dorens' books are arranged in front of the spring flower poster, which was used last week as a backdrop for a collection of books on youth and spring. Miss Phoebe Briggs had made this poster for the library before the building was enlarged.

SPRINGFIELD—When the National Library Week was over and the Library Staff sorted out the answers from the sixty-seven interviews, they found that seventeen people could not remember any particular book which had been especially enjoyed. Some had been too busy to read recently. All but four of these seventeen, were people who had not been to a library within six months and who read very little. Two readers had borrowed so many books (over a hundred in six months) that no one title stood out.

The lists of titles fell into three groups: (1) those enjoyed by adults (2) those enjoyed by young people and (3) those who remembered types rather than specific titles.

The older group numbering 28 liked:

ish, by Savage; The Russian Revolution, by Trotsky; Scarlet Letter, by Hawthorne; Silver Chalice, by Costain; Sound and Fury, by Faulkner; Sound of Thunder, by Caldwell; Tontine, by Costain; Victoria Albert and Mrs. Stevenson, by Boykin; Winthrop woman, by Anya Seton.

Weeds and crabgrass a great deal more than reel machines. Q: Is there any special brand of machine you suggest? A: I can't use this column for advertising machines, but I do believe you should use the same judgement in buying a mower as you would a car. Get a model manufactured by a reputable company that has been in that business for many years.

Q: I was fascinated by a rotary mower with a vacuum type attached to gather up the clippings. Is his machine practical, but a must for the person that wants a spotless lawn with a minimum of time spent in maintenance. This machine also prevents the scattering of weed and crabgrass seed.

Q: The seed I planted three weeks ago has not germinated yet. Shall I reseed? A: Good seed takes a few weeks to germinate in cool weather, so give it time. Make sure you keep the soil surface damp to hasten germination.

Q: There are little bugs at the tips of my roses and flowering crab apples. Do they do any damage? A: These insects are plant lice, commonly called aphids. They usually attack the soft, succulent growth of plants, and sometimes cause severe stunting.

Q: Should my fruit trees be sprayed now? Last year I sprayed them, but the fruit was bad. A: Fruits should have been sprayed weeks ago, but better late than never. Use a prepared fruit spray according to directions on the can.
