Everybody Should Attend

The Board of Education of the Regional High School District, which serves Springfield, Berkeley Heights, Mountainside, Kenilworth, Garwood, Clark opened the door and the Parent-Teacher Association of one of the schools in the district—Jonathan Dayton High School in Springfield—walked right in.

As has been reported in this paper, the school board is deeply concerned over the possibility that financing the proposed county vocational school may place what it considers an unfair tax burden on the six municipalities in the Regional District by assessing them for the costs of a project of which it will take no or very little advantage.

Realizing the importance of the attitude taken by the trustees and appreciating that the Board's position has brought the matter of a county vocational school into sharp focus, the Parent-Teacher Association has arranged a discussion of the subject.

This will take place tonight, Thursday, at Jonathan Dayton School in Springfield. The public is invited to attend. The P.T.A. has arranged for Dr. Albert E. Jochen and Dr. Minor C. K. Jones to speak, with County Supt. of Schools Dr. William H. West to be on hand and Dr. Kenneth W. Iversen, Dean of Union Junior College, to serve as moderator.

Dr. Jochen is Assistant Commissioner of Education for New Jersey, in charge of vocational and technical education. Dr. Jones is a longtime member of the Regional Board from Mountainside. He has spearheaded the school body's action in the vocational school matter.

This is indeed an imposing array of talent and knowledge. The school auditorium should be well-filled for the discussion this evening.

Send The Young Folks To San Diego

The problem now is to acquire the funds to send our district champions to the national tournament in San Diego.

Thus ends the story on page one of this issue telling about the thrilling success of Jonathan Dayton Regional High School's speakers and debaters in winning about everything there was to win in the National Forensic League's annual district speech tournament at the Springfield school Feb. 27 and March 5. Need this be the end?

The young folks who brought so much honor to Dayton should be sent to the national competition in California in June... and should be sent there with the rousing best wishes of the people in the Regional District.

Money for the trip is required. How about a Committee for Sending Jonathan Dayton's Speech Teams to San Diego? Who will volunteer?

Who wants the honor of sending in the first contribution?

THANKS TO MRS. H. H. DAMPMAN of the staff at Summit YWCA for her fine letter of Feb. 18 and particularly for the invitation to tour the building at 282 Morris Avenue. Having had the pleasure of a trip through the YMCA in Summit, I look forward to accepting Mrs. Dampman's invite.

FRANK RYAN, THE MORRIS AVENUE restaurateur, was discussing the weather in this area. "We are not so badly off," he said, commenting on a radio report on weather conditions in the Mid-West. "We have winter weather, it is true (there was snow on the ground), but we do not get the mountains of it they're getting elsewhere... nor do we get the floods or the high winds that seem to make living elsewhere so hazardous." Nodding his head for emphasis, Frank opined that "we don't have it so bad here." P.S.—There's a grandchild in the future for Frank and the Mrs.

Traditionally, Boards of Education and governing boards—be they Township Committees or Mayors and Councils—do not get along well together. Why this should be, is a mystery to me. Both groups are elected to serve the people in different, non-conflicting fields... both spend huge wads of public money... basically, both have (or should have) the same aims, purposes and ambitions. Yet friction is common.

Springfield—and I am happy to write these words—is doing something about the situation. Something constructive. Something worthwhile. Something commendable. "Way back in my first week on your hometown paper (the first week of this year), I heard rumblings at a Township Committee meeting of the governing board's dissatisfaction with the relationship between the two boards and of the hope that it could be improved.

At the moment the Board of Education was heading for the end of its life and there was a campaign under way for election to the board. Obviously, it was no time for the board to pay attention to a suggestion from the Township Committee. Feb. 9 came and there was an election. Feb. 15 arrived and the new school board re-organized. At this very first session, the new board voted to invite the Township Committee (or a representative thereof) to its meetings on the third Tuesday of each month.

Last week the Township received the invite and reminded the school board of the two-months-old suggestion by the Municipal Building group. "Now each unit knows how the other feels about getting together. All that remains is working out the mechanics.

If similar circumstances prevail in YOUR community, I recommend the Springfield treatment for quick and desirable results.

Here's a young fellow who should go far: Sam Zagora. You may recall my recent reference to having met him at the Union County Republican Committee Lincoln Day dinner. I described him then as Sen. Case's press assistant. I learned that this was in error: he is the Senator's administrative assistant.

At the dinner on Feb. 11, Sam mentioned that he and his

boss were going to the Bergen County Lincoln Day dinner from the Union County affair. I asked him to give my regards to Wilma Marggraff when he got there. (Wilma is the first woman ever to be elected to the Bergen County Board of Freeholders and this year she is director of the Board.) Sam said he would try to do so.

I have received a note from Sam in Washington regretting that he had no opportunity of speaking with Wilma (a close friend of mine) at the Bergen event. Now my point: anyone who takes the trouble to write a letter on such an insignificant matter certainly is up on his Madison-Avenue... and touches of this nature can carry a fellow a long ways.

A tax rate under \$81. This is something I have not seen in years and which, I regret to say, I had given up hope of ever seeing again. Yet there it is staring me in the face from the front page of my favorite local paper—SPRINGFIELD TAX RATE IS \$55.41

With schools costing what they do... with a new local school being constructed and a new regional high school almost completed... with increases in salaries almost mandatory... with the cost of municipal government going up like costs in all other fields of endeavor... with the county taking a larger tax bite than ever—this is truly a remarkable achievement.

The taxpayers should, of course, feel highly elated. The municipal administration has a right to feel quite proud of itself and deserves the plaudits of the townspeople. Why not drop a line to the Township Committee to this effect?

If you want to appreciate fully the unique position of Springfield in this tax rate category, suppose you compile a list of the

tax rates in all other Union County municipalities, and of some in next-door Essex County.

MIKE RIZZO was a visitor this week. Mike is communications chief for the C.D.—D.C. setup in Springfield and knows a lot about radio and broadcasting technique. He came in with the answer to my appeal for an explanation for the jamming of my radio as I drive along the Garder Staff Parkway. The answer: The Parkway is so close to these lofty steel poles from which electronic waves enter the air, their power overwhelms radios until the range of influence is left behind. Simple! Of course I had noted the pillars jutting into the sky but never had bothered to figure out their purpose.

If you have attended a meeting of the Springfield Township Committee in recent months—and few of you can claim to have done so—you may have noticed how quickly and methodically most of the business is transacted. Hardy has the Mayor mentioned that such and such a situation has developed when the Committeeman in charge of the department concerned presents a resolution disposing of the matter.

Is this super-efficiency? Hardy. The answer—if you have not already figured it out—is the caucus meeting of the governing board which takes place the day before the open session. These deliberations are closed to the public—and to the press. So this reporter cannot tell you what happens at the informal, unofficial gatherings.

Passengers in the Kuehnle car were Warren Sellars, Florence Sellars and Caroline Kuehnle. They received minor injuries and cuts.

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
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March Scholarship Month For ORT

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Dr. Poling To Address Westfield Presbyterians

"How Small Is Your World?" is the topic of the sermon to be delivered tonight, March 10, by Dr. Daniel A. Poling, at the 8 o'clock service in the Presbyterian Church in Westfield. Poling talk is being sponsored by the Westfield Council of Churches.

This is the second in the 1960 Lenten Preaching Series for Westfield and vicinity featuring nationally known preachers of various Protestant denominations.

Poling is minister of religion, editor, novelist, radio speaker, leader in civic movements, counselor of philanthropists, and youth worker. Born in a pioneer minister's home in the Pacific Northwest, he is a graduate of the University of Michigan, the University of California, and the University of Wisconsin. He has been president of the World's Christian Endeavor Union since 1957.

Poling is also a member of the 300-year-old Marble Collegiate Church in New York City. In 1956 he became the pastor of Baptist Temple in Philadelphia. He continues there as Chaplain of the Chapel of Mourning to the four young clergymen of three faiths who lost their lives in the sinking of the S.S. Dorchester. His son, the Reverend Clerk V. Poling, was one of those Chaplains.

Alertness Pays Off For Police In Mountain Side

Alert police work by Patrolman Edward Honecker of Mountain Side Police Dept. on Nov. 1, 1959, paid off this week.

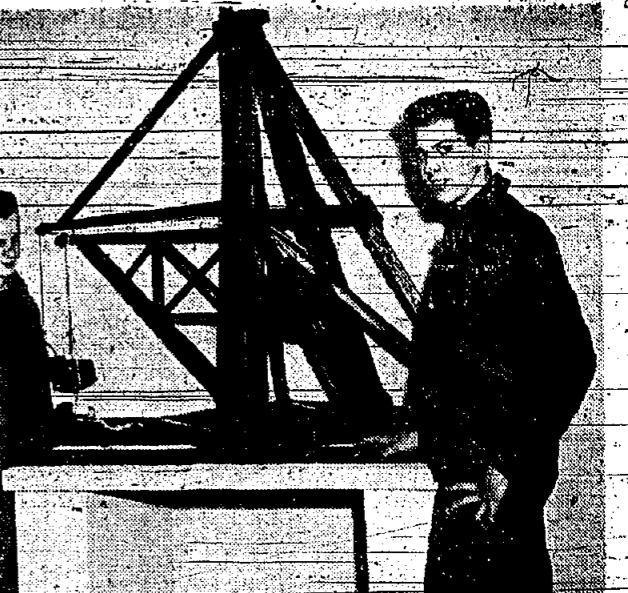
Honecker, while on patrol on Route 22 in November, noticed Joseph W. Breese, 22 of 179 George Street, New Brunswick, loitering near a gas station on the highway.

Police Chief Christian Fritz, remembering the action of Patrolman Honecker, left for Hunterdon County with Sergeant James Herriek to question Breese on any robberies he may have been involved in.

Breese told Fritz, after the latter took him to the Route 22 gas station, that he had burglarized it on Feb. 22. Having pleaded guilty in Hunterdon County, he will be sentenced tomorrow, March 11.

Breese may draw a fine of \$1,000 or a term in jail not to exceed three years, or both, for his crime. Fritz already has filed a detainer in the Hunterdon court to have Breese transferred to this county when he completes his sentence.

Self-Help for Survival

NO. 5 — SIGNALS
(Fifth and Last in a Series)

One day distant or near an enemy aircraft may fly over Springfield, so high it can't be seen, and drop one bomb that in its blast power and destruction will surpass all the bombs of all the planes that flew for the United States in World War Two.

Today's planning for Civil Defense is based on the use by the enemy of a 20-megaton bomb, equal to 20 million tons of T.N.T., used in "olden days."

When that bomb hits, there will be survivors. Even in the face of distressing public apathy, Civil Defense measures have made that much certain.

For example, the Japanese who lived in Hiroshima had no warning that a bomb would hit. Their first inkling of the immensity of their foe was the giant mushroom that followed up, miles high into the sky...

Freeman says, patiently (he's said this over and over): "There are just two air raid signals."

"One is a three-minute blast at steady tone. It means 'alert,' and when you hear it you are directed to turn to the regular radio channels for instructions. If those channels are silent, then turn to 'concord' at 640 and 1240 wave-lengths. Under no circumstances use the telephone. The wires are needed for more urgent business than yours."

"The other signal is a three-minute blast in a fluctuating tone, high and low, high and low. It means 'take cover'."

"When the 'take cover' is given you are under orders to put your personal or family survival plan into immediate operation. Proceed in haste to the family shelter. Then tune in 'concord' on your battery radio: 640 or 1240 on the dial. Listen for Civil Defense instructions. Do not use the telephone."

"That's when Freeman and his men will be forced for action. Their job will be difficult, some 200 trained volunteers against the atom bomb.

But their job sometimes seems nearly that difficult now, when it's the few trying to persuade the 16,000 plus people of Springfield that there is an enemy, and that the enemy has the bomb, and that we'd better think now of how to save our families later that to be alert today means to be alive tomorrow. That's the byword of Civil Defense.

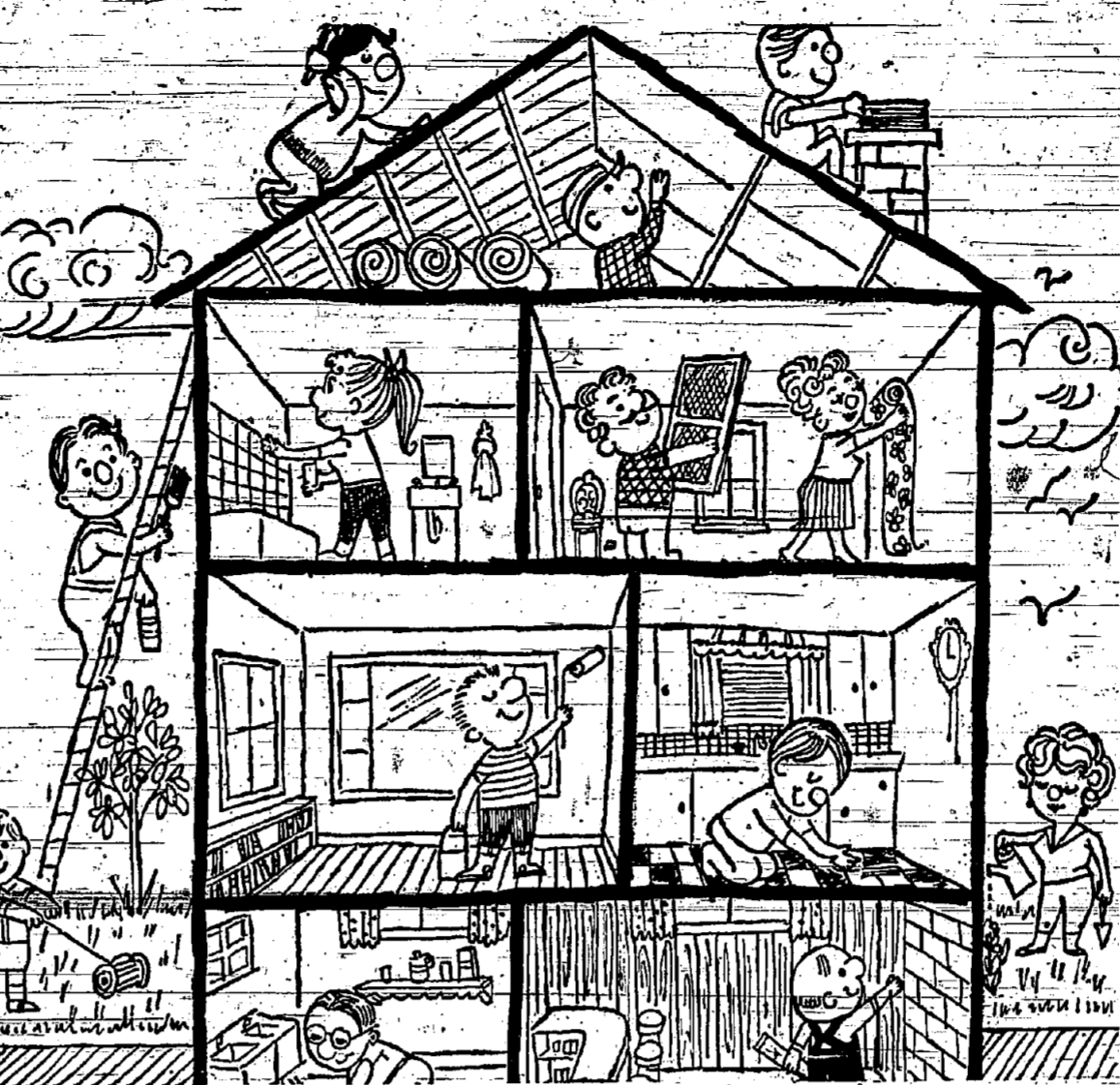

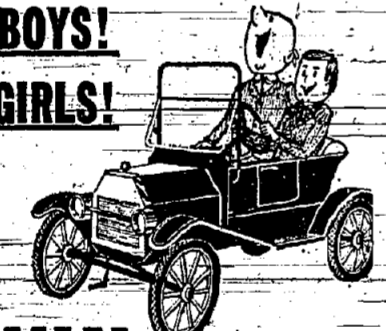
