## State Road Dept. Scored By Town Board For Action Against Troy Village; To Fight Court Action

The State Highway Department was blasted with anger and indignation by the Township Committee of Springfield at its regular semi-monthly meeting Tuesday evening, April 26.

The outburst was precipitated by a report by Mayor Vincent J. Bonadies that Township Attorney Irwin Weinberg had been served with a show cause order in connection with the proposed condemnation by the state agency of property in the Troy Village development.

**In Route's Path**  
The newest section of the Village—now under construction and estimated at about 65% completed—lies in the path of the projected new Route 78 and the State Highway Department is taking steps to obtain the land for use as a part of the highway.

As Mayor Bonadies put it, the show-cause order was the first official notice received about the definite route laid out for the highway, and it gave the municipality an opportunity to express its opinion as to whether or not the highway should be built as presently routed.

**Sibole Against**  
Township Committeeman Russell W. Sibole triggered what developed into a general castigation of the Highway Department when he voiced an objection.

## Rule On Polio Made Broad

Springfield Board of Education took action Tuesday evening, April 19, to broaden its policy to immunization requirements for entrance into the local school system.

At the suggestion of Superintendent of Schools B. F. News-wanger, supported by a recommendation by the school government committee of the board, it was voted to expand the policy established in 1957 to require more complete protection from polio.

Three Shots Needed  
Effective with the 1961 school year, all children to be eligible for enrollment in the Springfield public schools "shall have three injections of polio vaccine, followed by a booster injection in one year."

A pupil who has had only one or two injections will be required to have a certificate from his family physician stating that the required immunization has been completed or a new series is being started.

"The only exceptions to these requirements may be on the basis of religious principles or medical contra-indications," Mr. News-wanger's recommendations stated.

Ten, Not 25 Acres  
The Sun was in error in reporting last week that Springfield Board of Education was negotiating for the purchase of 25 acres of Balltown Golf Club property. The board is seeking to obtain TEN acres of land from the golf club at a cost of \$25,000.

## Highway Dept. Ready To Cover Tracks and Widen Morris Ave.

Following is a statement issued by Mayor Vincent J. Bonadies relative to the proposal for removal of tracks in Morris Avenue.

"During our recent conference with Commissioner Dwight G. Palmer on our highway problems, we explored a possible solution to the removal of the trolley tracks on Morris Avenue.

"The Commissioner continued his adamant stand that before any consideration could be given to the removal of the trolley tracks, the municipality must prohibit parking entirely on Morris Ave. on a 24-hour basis.

"We informed the Commissioner that we wish to continue our parking privileges as they now exist on Morris Ave.

"In an attempt to bring about some solution to this problem of covering the tracks, we and the Commissioner discussed the proposal that the state widen Morris Ave. by 4 feet on each side of the road and repave the entire new width of Morris Ave.

"The State officials felt that they could expend up to \$300,000 for such a project, including new curbs and paving. Commissioner Palmer insisted, however, that the municipality would be responsible for replacing and repairing sidewalks removed or broken as the result of the new widening.

## Officials In Huddle With Comm. Palmer

Springfield officials appreciate that it is useless to think of making any changes in the route of the new highway 78, but Mayor Vincent J. Bonadies, Township Attorney Irwin Weinberg and Township Committeeman William Balentine are not finished protesting.

They visited with State Highway Commissioner Dwight R. G. Palmer recently and were told that the direction of the new highway has been approved and is the same as the map shown at a public hearing in July, 1958.

As in the other episode, Committeeman Daniel M. Lucy took a leading part in the discussion. In fact, he brought the subject up for comment and spoke at length on it.

that the people of the municipality were entitled to know what was being planned and done.

Mr. Lucy brought out that there are plans for the widening of Morris Avenue which would eliminate the trolley tracks still imbedded in the roadway although trolley cars long since have passed from the local scene.

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

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

# Departments At High Schools In Regional To Be Re-organized

A school personnel reorganization plan is under way in the Union County Regional High School District, Superintendent Dr. Warren M. Davis has been given authority by the Board of Education at its meeting Tuesday evening, April 26, to proceed with the reorganizations in his report to the Board.

Purpose of the plan is to set up a supervisory system that will coordinate the efforts of the several academic departments in the Jonathan Dayton School in Springfield, the Arthur L. Johnson School in Clark and the new school being built in Berkeley Heights, to be known as the Governor Livingston School.

The reorganization, which will be in force for a trial period of one year beginning with the 1960-61 school year, will be put into effect via a gradual step by step process.

Another aim of the plan is to release the superintendent from routine duties so that he can concentrate on long-range planning.

The general governing board for the high schools will be the Council of Principals, composed of the principals of the three schools. The council will be subject to the veto of the superintendent and the school board.

The Board's suit against Globe Indemnity Company of New York was settled for \$11,325, Board Attorney Bernard Steiner announced. The Board brought action against the company after A&P Excavating Company, bonded by Globe, defaulted on a contract last June. Steiner was commended by the Board for his work on the matter.

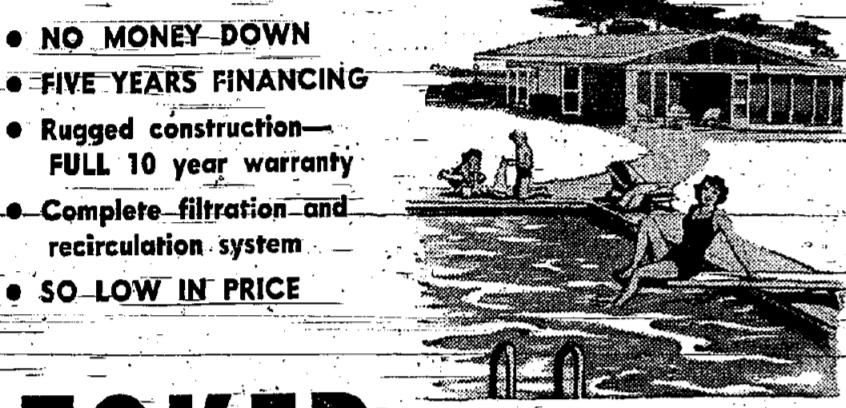

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### Experiences Of "Friendly Town" Mother Are Told

With the approach of Summer, which means visits to suburban Friendly Towns for thousands of needy New York children, readers may be interested in recent experiences of local families with their Fresh Air Fund children. Mrs. E. Klingsberg, of 1257 Cedar Avenue, Mountaintide, who is this year's co-chairman of the Mountaintide committee, tells a story that is in many ways typical.

**How I Started**

Two summers ago, the Klingsbergs rented a housekeeping cottage in a rather remote spot in the Catskills and were concerned about providing playmates for their two girls, aged five and six. That Summer their neighbors the Blumers, were hosts to a lovely eight-year-old Susan. From the Herald Tribune

in chatting to the Klingsbergs two-year-old, she commented "You know you have a very funny baby in your house." After an outing of swimming together, Lorri felt more comfortable and got along beautifully with the Klingsbergs and all the kids on the block.

Lorri lived in a basement apartment, which may explain why she spent her first day at her host's home running up and down stairs. She had trouble remembering the names of her ten brothers and sisters who shared the crowded, hot city apartment.

It was a pleasure to feed Lorri. Those appetites was always ravenous and who would eat everything served to her with gusto. She was quite thin when she came, but within two weeks filled out noticeably and grew very attached to the Klingsbergs. She had difficulty expressing her feelings, but when it was time to leave her eyes filled with tears of gratitude.

**Both Here Together**

After these two different but rewarding experiences, the Klingsbergs didn't know which child to invite to invite back the following Summer. Their dilemma was solved by their kind neighbors, Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Honecker, whose daughter had become friendly with Lorri. So the Honeckers opened their home to a needy youngster last Summer and took Lorri while the Klingsbergs took Susan again. Their two weeks stay, though a bit hectic at times, was most successful, as all the children got along well and all had playmates. The neighbors felt it advantageous to have their Fresh-Air Fund children at the same time and thus became an even closer neighborhood group. In fact, Susan stayed a third week so that it wouldn't become too empty at all.

All in all it was a wonderful experience for adults and children alike, and everyone is looking forward to a repetition this Summer.
