Owners of Springfield properties in the area where new highways (Routes 78 and 24) threaten to slice through the finest residential section of the Township cut up Springfield in many pieces of apple pie. The township committee met in the auditorium of the Florence M. Gaudineer school Saturday morning to look at some maps and answer questions on the effect of the proposed new highways.

Township Committee Plans Protest at Rt. 24 Hearing

Members of the Township Committee sent out a call to all residents to "continue the fight against the arbitrary alignment of both Routes 78 and 24 through Springfield by the State Highway Department without any regard for the effect on our finest residential section."

...the full Township Committee, assisted by Township Attorney, Alfred Weinberg and Engineer, Alfred Weinberg, did a very good job of presenting the effects of the impact of these two roadways.

The highway department has been very reluctant to make available more explicit information, the property owners were told, and "now Springfield is upset in sending Route 78 right in the heart of some of our very best homes."

Questions from the irate and very disturbed property owners were confined primarily to specific information on how the right-of-way for both highways would affect their homes. But,

In many cases, speakers insisted that the fight against "the arbitrary alignment by the Highway Department, without any regard as to the nature of the area, the homes destroyed, the fatalities lost and the general effects on Springfield be carried to not only the public hearing June 14 in Millburn but to Gov. Meyner and every other government agency."

Robert Planer, 123 Short Hills Avenue, announced that he has a petition, signed by 192 residents in the area affected by the highway, asking State Highway Commission to reconsider diversion of the present Route 78 to save Springfield's residential area.

Such an alternate plan had been submitted to the State Highway Department some time ago which would have moved the Route 78 on the outskirts of Springfield, continuing through a portion of Millburn into Irvington and Union. The Highway Department engineering offices, at that time, said the cost of moving the highway would add several millions to the present estimates for construction. There was no engineering reason for not moving the Route 78 but the Highway Department has done nothing to change its original plan for the highway as submitted at the public hearing in Springfield 2 years ago.

Mrs. Amy Petz, 20 Crescent Road, and one of the early settlers in Springfield, told the people that "the Highway Department isn't emotionally upset in sending Route 78 through the best residential section of Springfield. You might as well make up your minds that this is it. If the highway department says the highway goes here, that's where it is going and there's nothing that can be done about it. Mr. Palmer has no heart. They'll do what they want."

Others who asked specific questions or suggested that "the fight against the present alignment be continued" included Otto DeBercois, 372 Morris Avenue; John Keith, 77 Spring Brook Road; George T. Ward, 166 Baltusrol-Way; Edward Ryder, 170 Bryant Avenue; Mrs. Howard M. Vrowell, 32 Salter Street; J. W. Beyer, 42 Woodcrest Circle; Dwight Boss, 35 Salter Street; Mrs. Douglas Smith, 38 Springbrook Road; John Menth, 123 Bryant Avenue; and T. August Herman, 15 Park Lane.

Loss of fatalities resulting in a possible increase of 18 points concern the Township officials as well as the esthetic impact of both highways on Springfield.

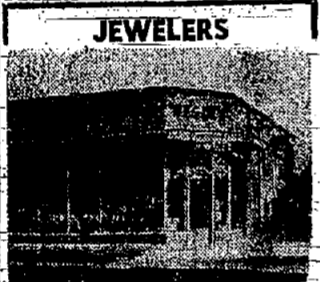

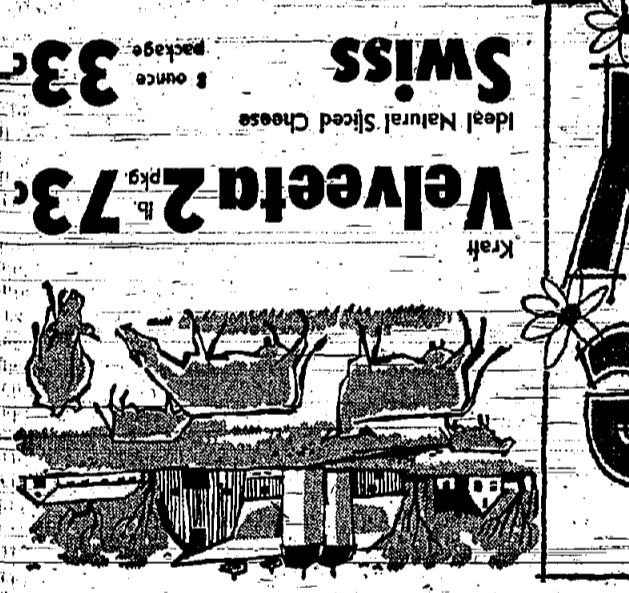

TAKING CARE OF YOUR GARDEN

By Edward A. Cardinal



Insects are plentiful this year, and anyone having azaleas, andromeda or rhododendron should spray them soon because the lace bugs are doing a great deal of damage. These insects, as many others are not apparent until the foliage is badly damaged so spray with malathion—lindane, Black Leaf 40, or one of the all-purpose mixtures available at garden centers. I have many free booklets available which cover this subject thoroughly, so just write to this column, in care of your local paper for a copy.

Q: Last year my blue spruce turned all brown inside and the needles started dropping off. What caused this?

A: Probably red spider mites. Hold a white sheet of paper under a branch, and tap the branch sharply. If you see many minute insects moving on the paper it is mites. Spray immediately with malathion, or dust with sulphur. This insect also attacks hemlock, junipers, arborvitae and many other plants.

Q: I bought a garden dust and burned the leaves of my

plant. Is spraying safer?
A: You probably over-dusted. Many people apply the dust until the plant is black, and this is not necessary. One light cloud of dust will do the job well. This week I dusted over a thousand plants in our nursery with two pounds of malathion dust. Spraying is less visible, and preferred by many who dislike the dust flying around, but dusting is faster, with no tanks to clean out.

Q: Crab grass is starting to show up in my lawn. What shall I use?
A: Applications can start in late June. Use dry powders such as Clout, or Action, or liquids such as Sodax. Consult your garden supply dealer for the best one for your particular conditions. Do not use TMAS or merlon bluegrass lawns.


