Township Comm. Names Building Inspector; Paving Bids Withheld

The Springfield Township Committee met in the Borough Hall, Tuesday evening at 8 p.m. and appointed Robert I. Pellegrino Building Inspector. He fills the vacancy caused by the resignation of Wilbert Binder.

Mr. Pellegrino previously held the post of assistant to the town engineer in East Orange. He is presently attending Newark College of Engineering and will graduate this fall with a degree in civil engineering. In addition to his civil engineering courses, Mr. Pellegrino has

taken courses in construction which make him exceptionally suited to the position of Building Inspector.

He will receive an annual salary of \$8,400, effective July 1. The Committee appointed Wilbur J. Binder to the Planning Board. He will serve from July 1, 1960, to December, 1961.

Lang Appointed
Tax Assessor Wilbur Lang will be acting tax collector; he will fill Charles Huff's vacancy who is taking a leave of ab-

sence until October.

The Committee announced that Mr. Lang will receive \$100 per month.

The position of tax searcher, also held by Charles Huff, was appointed to Wilbur Lang, too. The salary for this position will not exceed the monthly prorated fee of \$550 annually.

Burglary Prevention Week Announced, July 3

Police Chief Wilbur C. Selander has announced that the week of July 3-9 is being observed as "Burglary Prevention Week" in Springfield, as proclaimed by Mayor Bonadies.

He explained that the observation is being held in conjunction with a statewide program inaugurated and sponsored by the Honorable Robert B. Meyner, Governor, and the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police, to educate the public on how individual citizens can help reduce burglary losses.

Take Precautions
Police Chief Selander stated that many burglaries could be prevented if the people would take some simple precautions to protect their homes and property.

People often leave their homes for an evening, weekend, or a vacation without a thought given to the precautions recommended by their local police department. Windows are left open... a completely dark house... or even worse, lights burning 24 hours a day. All the ear marks that tell a burglar "this family is away."

Double Sessions Planned For Spfld. Kids In Fall

Last week Superintendent of Schools Benjamin Newslinger sent to the Springfield parents via their children a brochure stating that double sessions would probably be in order for the fall of 1960.

No one, stated Mr. Newslinger, knows for sure

General contractors for the new Sandmeier School now under construction in South Springfield Avenue, told the Springfield Sun yesterday that the school will definitely be ready for occupancy in September.

"We have set August 31 as the target for completion of the job," said officials at the Dan McCarron offices in Elizabeth, and we cannot see anything at this time that might disrupt this schedule.

"As a matter of fact," continued the McCarron official, "our part of the construction job is now approximately 98 percent complete and the subcontractors are working on top of us. Material is on hand or available and we have every assurance that the school will be ready for the Springfield Board of Education by August 31."

With more than two months before the August 31 date, the McCarron offices feel confident that the school will be ready for the coming September term.

Most of the job is now indoors and inclement weather cannot seriously delay the work.

Announcement by the general contractors that the new school will certainly be ready for occupancy this September

is good news to the parents who received notices last week that a double session program had been arranged. Notices were given parents despite the fact that the Board of Education had no discussion on the probable impending double sessions at its regular meeting last week.

The property that will be purchased by the Board, now belongs to Baltusrol Golf Club. They are planning to buy 10 acres of land at \$2,500 an acre.

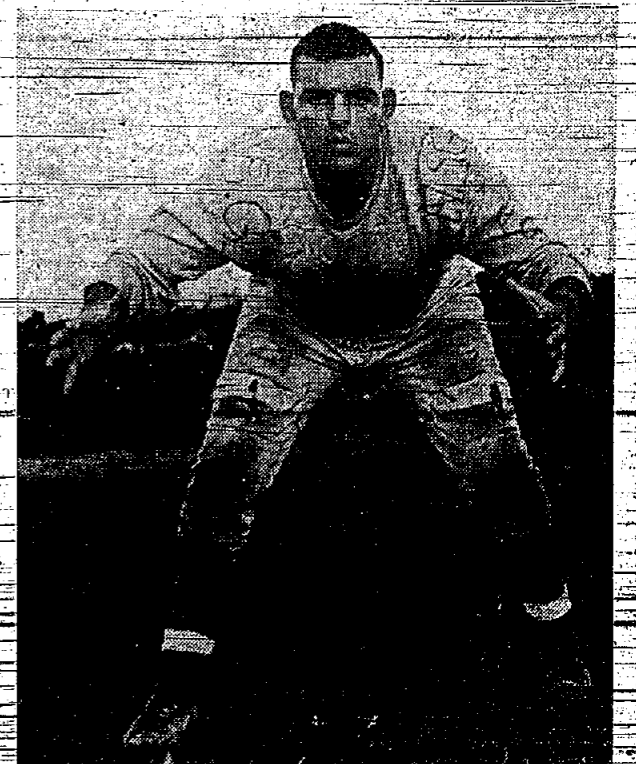

 same time, this growth requires us to make an increasingly heavy investment in new plant and equipment to meet these needs as they arise. Thus, during the 3 1/2 year period ended last March 31, the Company spent about \$6,182,000 for additions to its utility plant in service and an additional \$2,375,000 is earmarked for needed additions and improvements this year and next."

While one would expect the added business which makes this investment necessary to be profitable, this is unfortunately not the case. Mr. Greco stated that so long as the Company's rates are based on original cost, as they were 3 1/2 years ago, the rates will not produce an adequate income on property installed at present day inflated prices."

Mr. Greco also noted that the proposed rate adjustment (about 25%) would amount to a little more than 3 cents per day on the basis of the average household water bill. "Even with the proposed increase," Mr. Greco said, "water is still one of the least expensive items in today's household budget, particularly when you consider its importance in our daily lives."

Mr. Greco noted the following major improvements by his Company between October 1, 1956 and March 31, 1960:

- A 1,650,000 gallon water diversion reservoir and related facilities, including nearly 10,000 feet of 30-inch diameter pipeline and three pumps with a combined rated capacity of 30,000,000 gallons per day.
- A raw water intake on the Passaic River with a low head dam and weir, two pumps with a combined rated capacity of 32,800,000 gallons per day, and appurtenances.
- A 10,000,000 gallons per day filter plant with a clear water basin, wash water tank, chemical feed equipment, six pumps with a combined rated capacity of 80,000,000 gallons per day, and related equipment.
- Two 2,000,000 gallon concrete reservoirs with connecting pipelines and appurtenances.
- Installation of 49 miles of mains, 300 miles of water service meters, and many other facilities necessary to good water service.

Boro Council Applies For Rt. 22 Fence

Mountainside Borough Council has petitioned the state to install a fence along the west side of Route 22 in the vicinity of the Echo Brook School.

Councilman Lyman Parrigin said that the fence would provide additional safety for pupils who will be using the new footbridge across Route 22.

Councilman Parrigin noted that workers had installed the steelwork for the bridge and then had not returned to finish the overpass.

He noted, however, that work was being completed on a similar project in Union and said that he expected the workers would come here when that project was done.

A heavy wire-mesh must be installed on the footbridge before it can be used.

Parrigin said that the state has been asked to install a spit-rail rustic-type fence along

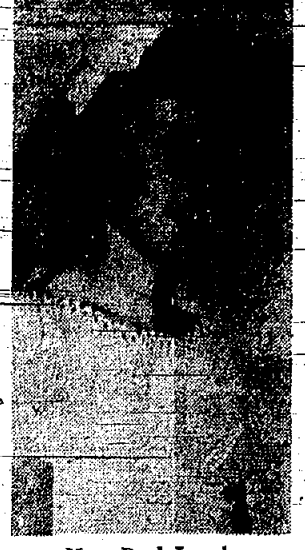

Highlights of the convention included reports on the mission expansion throughout the District and a Lutheran Evangelism Mission scheduled for the fall of 1960. The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod has set as its goal for the next decade the establishment of 1,350 new congregations from coast to coast. One hundred fifty of these are to be begun in the Atlantic District which comprises the metropolitan New York area, New Jersey, Long Island, Connecticut and New England. Membership in the District currently is over 140,000.

The Lutheran Evangelism effort, termed "Lutheran Open House Week" will be held from Oct. 30-Nov. 3, 1960. With over 300 Lutheran congregations taking part, it will be the most extensive evangelism campaign ever to be conducted by Lutherans in the eastern part of the country.

TAKING CARE OF YOUR GARDEN

By Edward A. Cardinal



With so many rotary mower blades are much the same as an electric fan, and cannot be seen when revolving at high speeds. Do not attempt to tilt the machine on its side with the engine running. Never run over any subject that might be hurt by the machine, and when people are near be careful that the discharge chute is not directed toward them.

Q: Young shoots are growing from the base of a tree. Should I remove them?

A: This is sucker growth and should be removed. The extra energy will then go into the tree itself.

Q: My gardener plans to put in my lawn in a few months. He prefers red fescue seed, but I have been advised to use bluegrass. What is your opinion?

A: A reputable lawn maker should know the best grass for your particular location. Fescue prefers well-drained soils and is tolerant to sun and shade. Bluegrass likes a sunny location, and will stand up better in heavy soils than the fescues. For the clay soils of this immediate area I prefer a mixture of at least 50% bluegrass along with creeping red fescue and a nurse grass unless you have time to sprinkle the newly seeded lawn often. More about seeding a lawn in a few weeks.

Q: My peach tree has suddenly lost the leaves on one branch. Shall I spray it?

A: Spraying would not help. There is probably a borer in the branch. This is common with peach trees. Look for saw coming from the tree. This forms a gum, which when removed will show a hole in the branch. Use a paste such as Borek in get rid of the borers that have tunneled into the tree. If the branch is completely dead remove it and paint the wound with tree wound dressing.

Q: My Juniper strictea ever-

greens are turning color. Do they need spraying or fertilizing?

A: Check first for dog damage. If this is ruled out, hold a piece of white paper close to the plant and tap sharply a few times. Look on the paper for tiny insects. These are red spider mites which should be sprayed with malathion or other miticide. In an emergency a Rose dust containing sulphur is usually effective.

Q: I have a vegetable garden containing beans and corn. What can I use as an insecticide without worrying about poisoning myself?

A: Rotenone dust, or spray is non-poisonous. It is very effective against the Mexican bean beetle as well as corn ear worm if applied at the proper time.

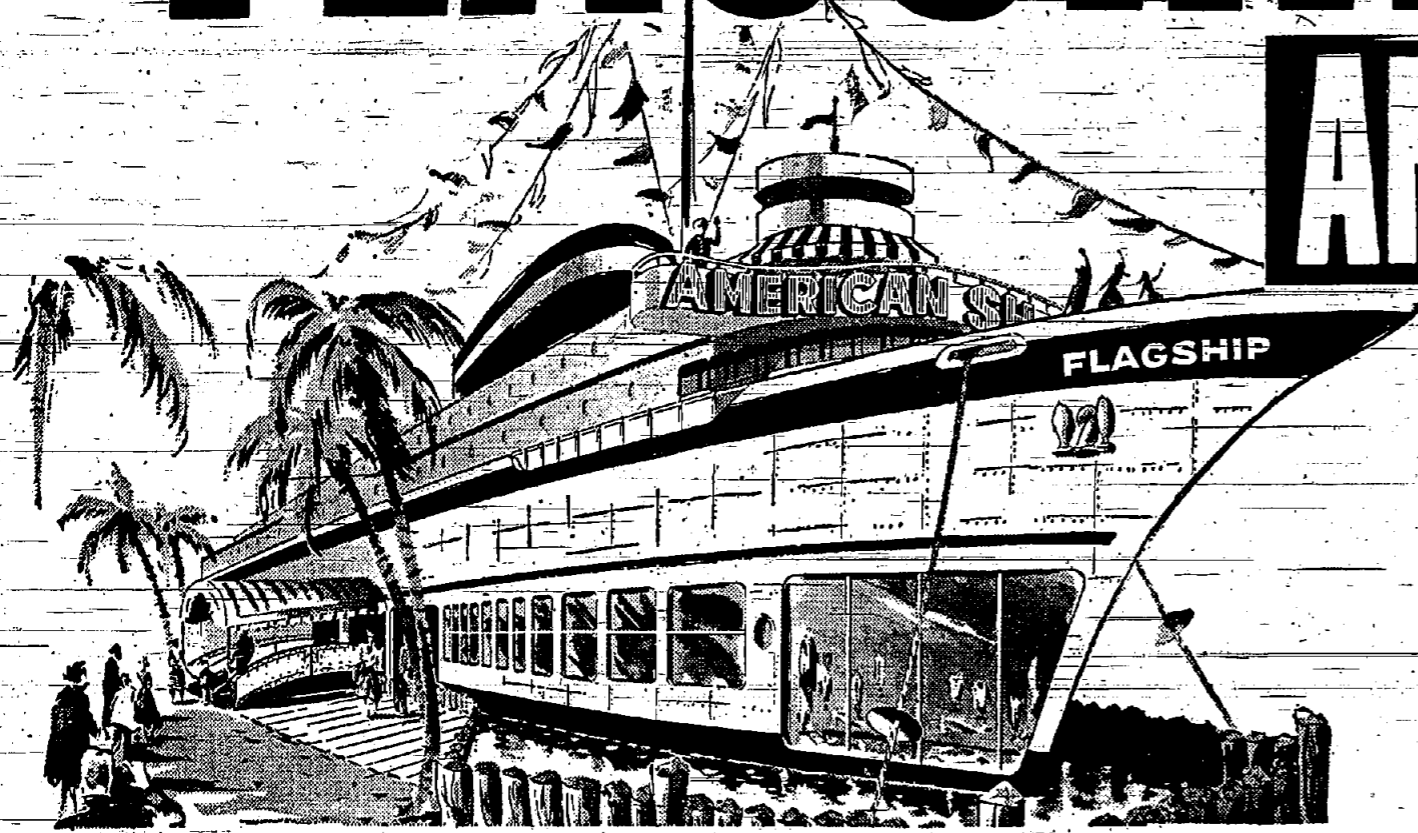

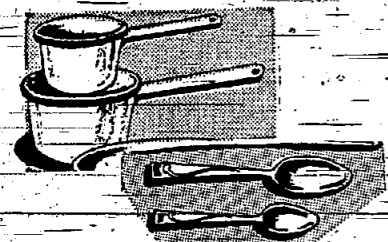

W. Germany**

"The B'nai B'rith Leaders and the West German Government have set up an exchange program of youth leaders and human-rights experts concerned with problems of democracy," Mrs. Selma Fox, President of the B'nai B'rith Women, Springfield chapter, announced today.

The program, which begins July 25 was first proposed by Benjamin R. Epstein, national director of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, and Nathan C. Beth, another official, during their visit to Germany last January to study attitudes toward democracy.

Dr. George Federer, German Consul General in New York, notified the league officials of the West German Government's desire to implement the plan as soon as possible. The first group of B'nai B'rith specialists will leave for West Germany next month under the sponsorship of the West German Government.

Mrs. Fox said, "The program involves an exchange of trained Jewish community relations leaders and B'nai B'rith youth workers concerned not only with education itself but with all aspects of civic affairs, citizenship and democratic attitudes."

"B'nai B'rith leaders will meet with German officials and youth and community leaders in Bonn, Dusseldorf, Berlin and other cities. A return visit by German and communal leaders will come later this year."

Local chapter members are urged to increase their efforts and bring in new members so that worthwhile programs of this caliber can be continued and enlarged.
