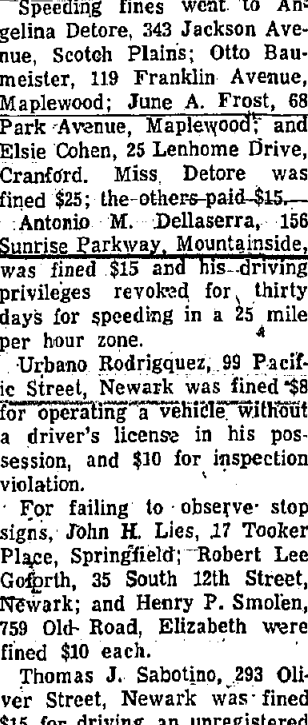

 tion of a great many homes but the Highway Department has ignored this alternate alignment.

Henry Such Smith, New Jersey transportation specialist, urged at the Friday hearing that Route 22 be immediately

revisited eastward to Union and supplemented with a 6-lane viaduct to be built over the Lehigh Valley Railroad tracks instead of the contemplated wasteful construction of Interstate 78 through Union and Essex Counties.

Smith reintroduced his revitalization proposal of March 19, 1958, which has been ignored until now by the New Jersey State Highway Department, and issued the following supplementary statement:

"The time has come to declare the proposed Interstate 78 plan to cut through Springfield, Union, Maplewood, Irvington, and Newark as probably the worst and most unnecessary catastrophe that could befall the North Jersey Area. East-West 280 Freeway is also unnecessary.

"Our proposal is to make existing Route 22 a semi-freeway eastward to Union; build a new limited access freeway eastward in the undeveloped upper Elizabeth River Valley; and build a viaduct over the Lehigh Valley Railroad mainline to form a junction with

Routes 1, 8, and the New Jersey Turnpike at Newark Airport.

"Local traffic and most Newark-bound traffic can best be handled by a revitalization of Meisel and Mountain Avenues in Springfield—providing some predominantly underground grade separations at Springfield center—a semi-freeway revitalization of Springfield Avenue into Newark—d semi-freeway revitalization of parts of Route 24 and a semi-freeway revitalization of Central, Park, and Bloomfield Avenues.

"This proposal will satisfy all local and long-distance traffic requirements for capacity, safety, comfort, and speed even to 1980 at a great saving of money and human sacrifice.

"These combination revitalization proposals make use of existing rights of way, relocate less people, provide more high speed high capacity arteries, and place the arterial highway improvements in better locations to give more motorists shorter and quicker trips with less interchange congestion to be thrown onto the existing street systems, than do the Interstate proposals.

"Even today, we are spending only about 30% of the money required for our vast Federal primary, secondary, and urban systems on which we drive 48% of all our vehicle miles.

"On the other hand, we are over-spending for the Interstate Program.

"The stated needs above referred to were determined by a Congressionally-ordered U.S. Bureau of Public Roads study aided by the various State highway departments. Of this President Eisenhower said: 'This study... is the most comprehensive of its

"The Highway Department's so-called 'Study and Report for the Rehabilitation of U.S. Route 22,' prepared by Madison-Hyland, and submitted to the New Jersey Legislature, January 7, 1959, merely reports on the inadvisability of building a limited access freeway along the Route 22 alignment... which was not the

kind ever undertaken." "Boston's record 15.4% population drop despite a tremendous and nearly completed freeway building program shows that the wrongly directed bulldozer is not the panacea.

"New Jersey can be the state to lead a national return to common sense in road construction.

"Under existing law, the above recommended revitaliza-

tion program is so much less expensive that, with only 50% Federal aid, it will still cost the people of New Jersey less than would their 10% share of the rejected Interstate 78 and 280 projects.

"The New Jersey State Highway Department should now act with complete candor on this issue.

"So far, the New Jersey State Highway Department has not adopted the revitalization

### LIBRARY NEWS

#### WHAT ARE THE CHILDREN READING THIS SUMMER?

Having just recently expounded upon the multitudinous variety of children's reading interests, including all the relative merits of fantasy, poetry, historical fiction, career stories, and factual books, we now attempt to give a picture of children's reading this summer in the Springfield Public Library reading program. Are they branching into these many different areas of interest and learning? Using an average day's circulation as an example, a definite answer can easily be obtained. On one particular day, 197 books were read by or read to children ages 3-5; 94 non-fiction books were circulated on all levels; 82 fiction books in the 4-7 grade level. This gives a fairly obvious report of the age representation.

What are their interests? What authors do they favor? What books do they prefer? There is so much to be learned from children that perhaps some of their reading interests might be a key to their "mature" curiosity, their eagerness to understand, their freshness, and their infinite love of beauty and decency. Childhood is a world-wide nation without boundaries, or wars. How is it they understand each other so easily? The world over they seem to know the same rules for understanding the game and playing it fairly. They know the difference between fantasy and reality. On this particular day the "small fry" were turning to authors of great fame, such as Dr. Seuss, Margaret Wise Brown, Lois Lenski, Robert McCloskey, H. A. Rey, Wanda Gág, Miriam Schlein, Laurend de Baumhoff, etc. They appeared to favor animals, airplanes, boats, fire engines, dolls, cowboys, circus stories, etc. They preferred the larger illustrations in color to the smaller variety found in the Beatrix Potter "Peter Rabbit" book. Their favorite characters were "Curious George", "Babar", "Madeline", "Happy Lion", "Jeanne-Marie", and "Flicka, Ricka, and Dikka". They, too, read non-fiction books, about astronomy, animals, shell cluses, insects, and prehistoric animals. They like the "I Want to Be" series about policemen, nurses, doctors, etc.

The older group of boys and girls are reading almost as much in the non-fiction class as in fiction; which is surprising for summertime leisure reading. In the series, they like the "Landmark", "All About", and "We Were There" books, supporting studies and science interests. On the average, one day they read biographies of the presidents, Paul Revere, Mary Queen of Scots, Francis Marion, Edison, Lou Gehrig, etc. Books on experiments, rockets, atomic energy, snakes, comets, prehistoric animals and tropical fish, placed in top position.

Girls were reading girls' stories - career stories, mysteries (i.e. Carolyn Keene) and fairy tales. The favorite fiction authors (excepting Keene) are Carolyn Hayward, Catherine Woolley, Louisa M. Alcott, Cleves, Baum (Oz books), etc. The boys seem to have a much wider scope of interests, i.e., sea stories, skin diving, sports, animals, science, mechanics, army, navy, F.B.I., history, pirates, Indians, etc.

of an accident as defined by law. Your next step is to immediately notify the police. Be sure to be on hand for the police squad car for the usual answers to questions.

If your accident resulted in very minor damage to the automobile involved and, if it appears that the total damage does not exceed \$100, the accident need not be reported.

Accident report forms are available at Police Headquarters and the law requires that you fill out and mail the report to the Division of Motor Vehicles in Trenton.

All accidents involving injury must be reported. Failure to report such accidents may result in revocation or suspension of both driving and registration privileges.

In general these reports are confidential and cannot be used either in civil or criminal trials.

Insurance companies advise their clients to say as little as possible about the accident. Never tell the other party that you are covered by insurance because this leads to exaggerated claims. But you must get

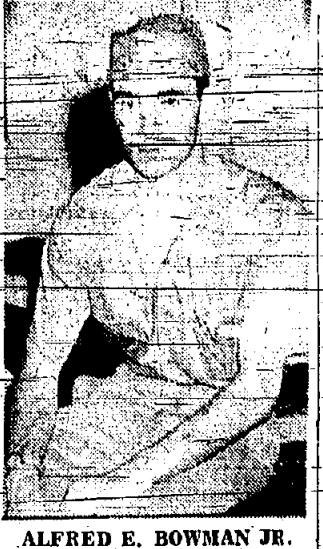

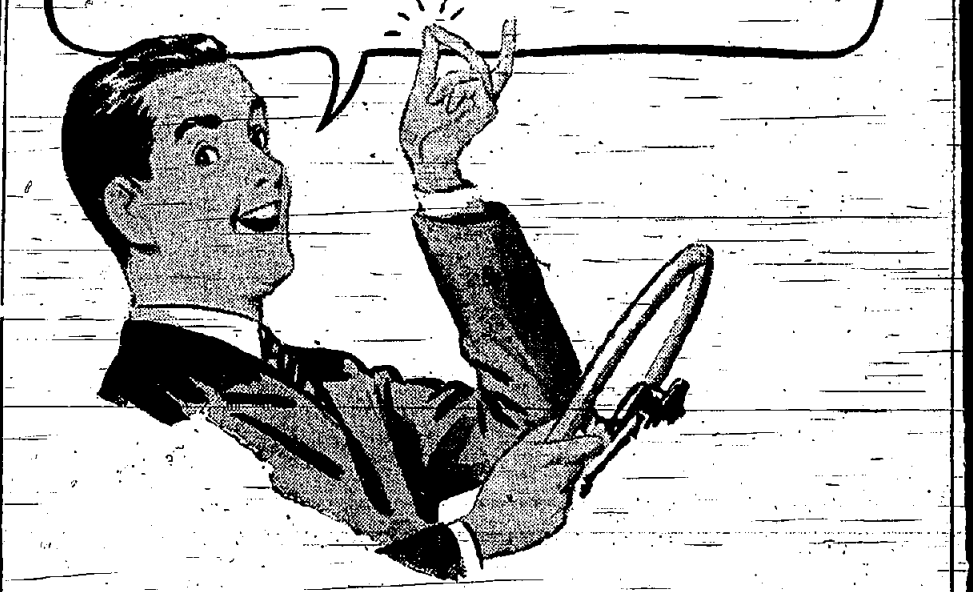

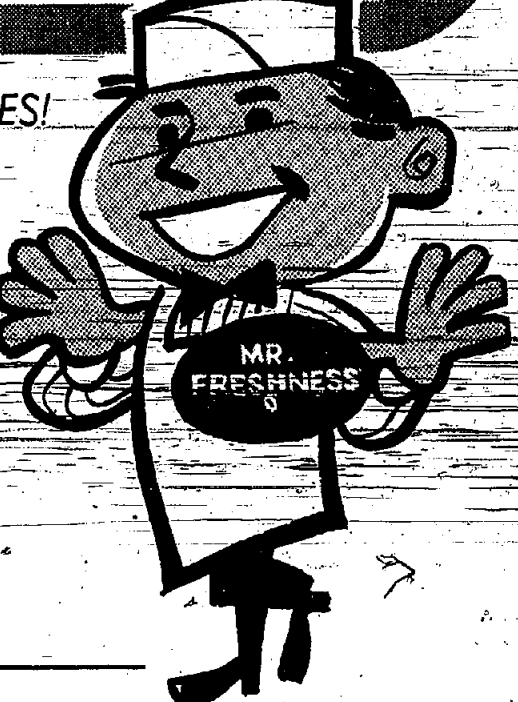
