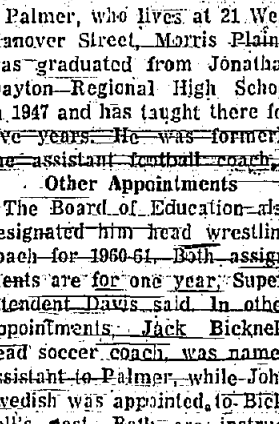

"The Bureau of Traffic Safety," said a Township official, "needs proof that a traffic light is necessary. And the formula they use to arrive at a decision is the number of accidents reported at that corner."

Investigations are continuing, but there isn't anything in the preliminary observations by the survey engineers to encourage those who see a real need for such a traffic light.

The Bureau of Traffic Safety does not believe traffic lights always help and there appears to be some doubt that the investigators will recommend the installation.

nue by some four (4) feet on each side.

"WHEREUPON, it is our vigorous statement that we OPPOSE the contemplated widening of the street with its potential danger, traffic snarlage and burdensome cost to the Township.

"IN LIEU THEREOF, we submit that the tracks can be covered by repavement but no appreciable advantage can be attained by widening the street. It is obvious that widening the street will depreciate property values, create a public nuisance, and make pedestrian traffic dangerous, besides the eventual restrictions to parking.

"THEREFORE, We petition your body to attentively consider this matter in light of welfare, progress and advancement of this Township. Your petitioners are presently restricted to residents and business people on Morris Avenue, but if future needs dictate, we will solicit signatories from the Township at large.

"BE IT THEREFORE KNOWN, that WE attest to our

desire that our opposition to the widening of Morris Avenue be noted and that we through a spokesman have an opportunity at public hearing to reiterate this opposition."

TAKING CARE OF YOUR GARDEN

By Edward A. Cardinal



Last Thursday twenty-eight members of the North Jersey Landscape Association, a group of lawn maintenance men, made a tour of lawns in this area. They were accompan-

ied by Doctors Engle and Enyke of Rutgers, Eric Peterson our County Agent, and his new assistant.

They were all impressed by the very fine general condition of Springfield lawns, and one conclusion was reached that what was built and maintained by the home owner had a better chance to survive than one which had itinerant gardeners changed from season to season. The reason for this was because the original builder had a better knowledge of what went into the lawn, and the materials that had been used upon it.

Many lawns were suffering from insufficient water, and many others had some evidence of disease. It is just as difficult to diagnose a patch of dead grass as it is to find a man's body and determine the cause of death by standing there looking at it. Only by a process of elimination can the cause be pinpointed, and only a pathological examination can determine the exact cause. It was felt that if the owner can be certain that the grass has had sufficient water and fertilizer, and the dead patches seem to be spreading, it would be a wise course to apply a good turf fungicide to stop further spread in the event a disease were present. There, a gain, get professional advice as to the fungicide most suitable for the existing condition, and one which will not apt to further injure the grass more than the disease. Do not use the mercury materials on merion bluegrass.



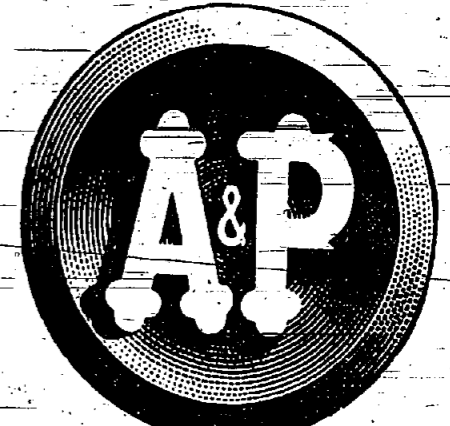
