

condition is Civil Service. This was first proposed some years back in the following statement:

"Of course the Republicans talk very little about a very few members of the police department and the breakdown of police morale. They say very little about the few who have besmirched the reputation of one of the finest groups of policemen any town has ever had. The good upright policemen of our town are crying for a ladder and a breath of fresh air in the department. The Democratic candidates have urged the immediate adoption of a civil service program to cover the police and fire department. A system where merit and not politics ascertains the future of our two important service departments."

"The Democratic candidate who made that statement is my mayor. Since he made that statement, he has had ample time to carry it out. He has failed to do so. The only thing he accomplished by the statement was to make every member of our police force by failing to identify the alleged villains.

"During my year of residence in Springfield, I have had occasions to deal personally or professionally with every department. I have found them to be well run. I do not believe that Civil Service is necessary at this time. It will not become necessary until such time as the number of employees becomes too large to be judged fairly on their merits.

"What is necessary is that each employee have the knowledge that his job is not at stake if the political complexion of the Township Committee changes. For my part, I promise that I will fight for any good employee regardless of his political party."

The breakdown of calls answered include 9 heart cases, 5 auto accidents, 5 home accidents, 2 stand-by calls and 29 miscellaneous home illnesses. Four tanks of oxygen were transported.

Squad members donated 163 hours of their time during the month for duty and the 2 ambulances were driven a total of 589 miles.

Also noted in the report was the great increase in squad activity because of the rapid growth of the town since 1952. In that year, a total of 17 calls were reported for the month of July including 10 emergencies.

activity, which I have condemned.

"As a citizen, I have no hesitancy in stating that I agree in principle with the formation of any group dedicated to the task of seeking the best candidates for office and of preventing partisan interference in non-partisan bodies. I would oppose, however, any group which excluded from its membership registered Republican or Democratic voters in an endeavor to be independent.

"I would oppose the formation of any group which presumed to select the sole candidate for any vacancy. In other words, I would dislike to see any group endorsement be tantamount to an election and thus amount to an effective disenfranchisement of those who do not belong to that group.

"My thought is not to eliminate contests for Board of Education vacancies but to have such contests, when they occur, be based on genuine differences of opinions - not political ones. I hope that the formation of your group will bring to the fore many excellent candidates to add to those capable members developed in the past from Parent-Teachers Associations and Civic groups.

"May I express my appreciation for your interest and your impartial approach."

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Know Your State-Learn Interesting Facts By Visiting Town Library

The Free Public Library of Springfield has a collection of many interesting books, pamphlets and guides concerning New Jersey. For those who may not have the time to travel far, travel-at-home can be entertaining and rewarding. A new book, "New Jersey is a state rich in history. It was the 'battle-ground of the Revolution.' However, a great deal of New Jersey history has never been recorded, and some verbal accounts are far from accurate. Fortunately this has aroused the sleuthing instincts of several able men. John T. Cunningham is busy tracking down information at this end of the state. Recently the southern end has produced several noteworthy books. One came out last Spring, "Smugglers Woods" by Arthur D. Pierce. Pierce tells a great deal about the region around Salem and an area reaching toward Trenton. This is his second book, "Iron in the Pines" came out two years ago. Both of these books are full of local stories and tell more than the titles indicate. This week another book by a South Jerseyman is published. Its title "Under Barnegat's Beam" by Bayard R. Kraft (Camden-Haddonfield-Moorestown). This is a delightful gossip story about Long Beach Island and the places lining the Mainland side of Barnegat Bay. The Barnegat Lighthouse is well known and loved by people at both ends of the state. Everyone will enjoy reading about it. Mr. Kraft concentrated on this middle portion of the Jersey shore. Steve Nagy, "alltime" great bowler, will appear at Echo Lanes, Mountside, on Saturday, August 20th.

Ray P. Bluth, named to the 1960 All Star team, will appear the following Sunday, August 21st.

They will be available for free instructions in the afternoons and will bowl a special exhibition match against an outstanding local star at 8:00 P.M. Always a threat in the toughest competition, Nagy was a pacesetter in the 1958 AEC Tournament in Syracuse. He rolled games of 244, 222 and 258 for a 729 series to lead the Fallstaffs to the team title on a 3-210 total, third-highest in AEC history. Nagy finished second in the individual all-events with 2,053, a scant 10 pins behind the winner.

Ray Bluth teamed with Dick Weber to set an all-time league doubles record of 1541 in 1955 and rolled an 824 series to lead the St. Louis-Budweiser to the nation's high three during 1957-58 and a world mark of 3853. Bluth's phenomenal contribution to the Budweiser record included a 300 game and 33 of a possible 36 strikes. Bluth reached a peak in televised bowling stardom in 1957, when he collected a \$10,000 award for a 300 game as part of an 823 series.
