"No Politics" School Board Is Acceptable

The proposal to organize an independent voters league to select and recommend candidates for the Springfield Board of Education has aroused considerable interest in the Township and Donald Lan, who suggested the plan, is very much pleased with the reaction and hopes to enlist the backing of a large group of citizens to work out the idea.

Letters, outlining the plan, were sent by Mr. Lan to various members of the Springfield Board of Education as well as to Mayor Vincent J. Bonadies and Paul T. Murphy, the Republican candidate for Township Committee in the elections this November.

Mayor Bonadies and Mr. Murphy responded to the Lan letter and their views appeared in last week's Springfield Sun.

In order to clarify the proposal and to answer some of the questions, the following statement was issued by Mr. Lan as well as responses to the letters published last week from Mayor Bonadies and Mr. Murphy:

"I wish to take this opportunity to thank our civic-minded newspaper, our Mayor Bonadies, Paul Murphy, and our many conscientious citizens for their fine response and attention to my proposal for an Independent Voters League to function in the educational field in our community.

"Many questions have been put to me. I will herein attempt to qualify my proposal with specific recommendations.

Purpose and Scope

"The Springfield Independent Voters League is proposed for the purpose of eliminating political interference, or temptation, in the Board of Education matters, including Board elections and referendums.

"In this regard this group would serve to enlighten the electorate wherever possible on a non-partisan basis, and in brief act as a citizens' watchdog committee. This organization would not be formed for political purposes, and would not participate nor make recommendations in political contests.

Function and Methods

"It is proposed that the Springfield Independent Voters League adopt a set of standards incorporating basic qualifications for endorsement by the League of candidates seeking election to the Board. These standards should include basic background requirements, and above all should include provisions requiring the candidate to be void of close political affiliation.

Lan's Letter to Mayor Bonadies

Dear Mayor Bonadies:

I thank you for your letter of August 17th and appreciate the promptness of your reply.

I refer to your second paragraph, which I consider tantamount to an endorsement of our basic principles, with gratitude. I likewise agree that all branches of our Educational and Administrative system should coordinate, where such coordination is in the public's interest and where this does not require any one branch to subordinate its State-given obligations to the other.

If my interpretation is correct, I believe your endorsement contained several reservations which are possibly based on the incomplete outline of my proposal. My initial proposal was intentionally not specific, as I desired to obtain public reaction. I will try to the best of my ability to alleviate any fears you may have. It is not our intention to impose our will upon the Electorate, as we are cognizant of their rights, and duty to elect all members of our Board of Education.

We only wish to protect the Township from politically supported candidates, and candidates who will be obligated through political support or political positions.

We intend to serve the Electorate through enlightenment and our "Watchdog" actions. We further intend to make recommendations on Board of Education referendums, without any consideration other than the best interests of our children and educational system. We will under no circumstances participate in political elections.

We will not discourage, but encourage, qualified candidates. We will set standards whereby each candidate that falls within these will receive our support. We would prefer to endorse a large rather than limited field of candidates.

The fact that a similar organization in North Jersey has not performed perfectly affords us the opportunity to review their weaknesses and endeavor to correct them. Likewise the successes of one organization cannot be predetermined by the failures of a similar one, as many variable conditions and structural differences must exist.

In this regard we would appreciate your advice as to the location of the municipally concerned.

I feel certain that while we are faced with many decisions which will require careful consideration, as we strive for the highest degree of perfection obtainable, you will be among the first to agree that the possible pitfalls should not defer the attempt.

Your carefully conceived comments and the time devoted are greatly appreciated. Certainly the high ideals which we are attempting to establish should have your whole-hearted support. This we shall always continue to seek.

Reply to Paul Murphy's Letter

Dear Mr. Murphy:

I sincerely appreciate your prompt reply and personal endorsement of mine dated August 12th. From the text of your letter I believe I understand your concern, personal and political, as well as apprehension over possible consequences. I will try to the best of my ability attempt to alleviate your fears.

Firstly, I do not believe that your endorsement of a non-partisan body which would be acting in the best interests of the Township could possibly be contrary to that which you have condemned, inasmuch as this group would be working directly towards the principles you apparently believe in.

I intentionally declined to include specific recommendations in my proposal, as I initially wished to seek out either active interest or possible apathy on the part of our Township. I at no time intended to exclude those electors who have in the past or at present exercised political preference through primary registration. To do so would be foolhardy, as it would eliminate many qualified people; however, we would insist on those with "Independent Political Opinion" and not those who consistently work and follow party line without deviation, people who are able to ferret out the basic pro's and con's of a given situation, people who are not obligated through party affiliation.

Frosh To Report Sept. 7th at Regional High School For Short Day

Disregard Politics In Highway Dept. Battles

Kids Form Civil Defense Club

Children are always looking for something to do during the summer. They have lots of time on their hands; they need a project to keep them busy and occupied.

Approximately twenty Springfield youngsters found that time lay heavy on their hands, so they decided to do something different this summer. They organized a Civil Defense Club. The club was formed to help those people whose homes will be blown up when the bomb comes. Anyone may seek shelter in the fort.

Some of the Club members are Jay and Corey Greenfield, Brian, Kevin and Dennis Doyle, Allan Gerber, Glenn La Boeuf, Sharon Zarelló, Leonard Burstein, Butch Drabik, Steve Di Benedetto, and George Gionitsus. Their ages from 4 to 13 years.

The Club members built a fort in the Greenfield backyard, 25 Mapes Avenue, Springfield. The fort is a two feet

hole in the ground, about four feet square. The bottom of the fort is leveled off with peat moss. A stone path leads to and from the fort. The children collected the stones from their own back yards.

The youngsters placed two first aid kits, toys, and noise-makers in the fort. One first aid kit was donated by the Doyle family, 29 Mapes Avenue, Springfield. The children received the other kit by sending tin and 5 good-humor-wrappers to a premium company. This kit contains adhesive tape, burn ointment, cotton, gauze pads, and bandages.

The members called a special meeting when the Good Humor first aid kit arrived. They started practicing on each other the methods of administering first aid treatment; so they would be able to help bomb victims. They also built a wooden stretcher and they have a wagon for an ambulance.

Anyone may visit the club to see what the boys have accomplished, but only four visits are allowed. After the

Mayor Urges Lawmakers To Allow Towns To Choose Highway Routes

Springfield Mayor Vincent J. Bonadies sent telegrams Tuesday to Senators Case, Williams, Congresswoman Dwyer and Assemblyman John Wilson in the face of the proposed Washington conference of county, state and congressional members seeking more money for highway construction.

The announcement of the committee came last Thursday when it was reported that this group wanted to expedite present highway construction and gain a more equitable share of the work for the state in the future under the Federal Government's interstate highway building program.

Mayor Bonadies telegram urged the lawmakers to reconsider devastation caused by the proposed construction in Springfield, BEFORE plans for expediting funds are made and

further suggested that Springfield and other affected communities be given opportunity to select location of highways through their towns lest construction destroy these towns.

The Mayor emphasized "... before any further funds be provided for FAT 78, rigid assurances are needed that our interest be protected against the proposed routes FAT 78 and Route 24 and alternatives be considered."

The committee was formed as the result of complaints following the refusal of the Federal Bureau of Roads to approve a depressed East-West freeway and highway construction plans for several areas of the state, including Bergen, Monmouth and Union Counties.

The committee also charges that "the state is being short-changed in highway allotments in ratio to the state's contribution to the Federal Government."

It would not be our purpose to endorse, as an example, two candidates for two Board seats, but to endorse all candidates who met our standards. This can, and we hope will, include most if not all candidates. We do not intend to assume the position rightfully belonging to the electorate. We do not intend to disenfranchise anyone but will serve to enlighten the electorate and protect where possible their interest through our "watch-dog" actions.

Our group would also make recommendations on other Board of Education referendums. Our group would not under any circumstances participate in political elections.

I should further state that while perhaps Parent-Teacher Associations and Civic Groups may be in a position to present candidates for the Board, this has not consistently been the case. I have good reason to believe that many aspirants to the Board of Education have felt it necessary to seek political assistance in their drive to a Board seat. I also am aware of several situations where political interference defeated Board members. Certainly the elimination of such poor judgment in our Township should have your support.

I compliment your clear and concise evaluation of this proposal and continue to seek your wholehearted support.

Library Circulation Goes Over 600 Mark Each Day

"Are you as busy in summer as winter?" is a question the readers often ask the Free Public Library of Springfield. Those who were in the library on the past Monday, either in the morning or evening, know the answer. They saw the crowd and can say "yes just as busy."

Several things contribute to this "busyness." The Library permits adults and children to take extra books on vacations and keep them until October 1st. Another activity which the children enjoy is reporting on books read and pasting the Presidents' pictures on their charts.

A great many days the total circulation has gone over 600 books and when open at night (Monday and Friday) has come closer to 800. July 1st was the big day with 829 books circulated in one day.

Besides this we must consider the number of books returned. They usually equal and sometimes exceed the number taken out. If it were not for the faithful assistance of the high school girls, in returning these books promptly to the shelves, many books would be difficult to find. In order to give the readers a chance to return books after Labor Day, the Library will be open on Tuesday, September 6th.

On their fourth visit, one must decide whether he wishes to join or not.

In order to get into the fort, the visitor receives a ticket at a toll booth in the front of the yard. Admission is free. Once in the fort, the club members tell visitors what the club does, why it was started, and how may one join. The club members would prefer that a prospective member have a relative already in the club. This is not a necessary prerequisite, though.

The children raised money by performing odd chores around the neighbors. The money was used to buy film to take pictures of the club members and the first aid kits. The boys landscaped Mr. Zarello's garden and received \$1.00 for their good job. They also carry packages and run errands for their neighbors. They raised \$2.60, took pictures and are now showing the photos to all interested people.

The fort is open every weekday from 10 a.m. to 12 midnight, all day Sunday and all Saturday night. The Fort closes when Jay goes in for lunch, but it opens immediately after he finishes eating.

The fort yard holds about 50 people, so Jay thinks the club can easily accommodate many bomb victims. These children wish to help as many people as possible when the bomb comes. As for food, the members said they would run to their homes, gather food, and run back to the fort. The club will not disband when winter comes. The members intend to shovel the snow from the stone path; so victims and visitors will be able to easily reach the fort.

Jay Greenfield and Dennis Doyle emphatically stated that even if one is not a club member, if someone needs shelter when the bomb comes they should feel free to come to the fort.

Just what progress has been made in determining the value of the property could not be learned. All inquiries were referred to Deputy Attorney General William J. McCormack in the Law and Public Safety Division, State Highway Department, in Trenton, but he was unavailable when attempts were made to telephone him.

It is assumed that since these three men were appointed June 28, considerable work has already been done to determine the value of the property but no definite decision can be made until a public hearing is held.

Efforts to ascertain when such a public hearing might be held failed since Deputy Attorney General McCormack could not be reached and all

such information, it was announced, must come from him.

The work of condemnation commissions in arriving at a report, sufficiently complete to call for a public hearing, usually takes two months, which would make the date of the public hearing early next month.

The Highway Department gave Troy Village orders to cease building the entire section which apparently is in the path of the proposed highway.

This official action was taken as evidence that the State Highway Department had already made a decision on the exact alignment of the new roadway despite the fact that Springfield authorities were still requesting that it be moved to avoid slashing through some of the Township's finest residential section.

Well-Fed Kids May Still be Undernourished

It's difficult to believe that with all the food consumed in the United States (by school children particularly) most of our youngsters are undernourished. This is the mass opinion from dietary studies by many leading nutrition experts.

It is true among children of all ages, particularly in the adolescent age range, and in all income levels.

So the problem is that growing children are eating, but not enough of the nutritious foods that contribute the energy they consume to rapidly and the foods they need for fortifying their fast growth.

Dietitians say that one reason, especially among teenagers, is that three meals a day are often not enough during this period of fast growth and tremendous expenditure of energy.

After school snacks are needed to keep the diet well-balanced. Often these snacks are filling, and that is about all they are.

Plan snacks with an eye to their food needs, just as you would plan a regular meal. The menu should emphasize proteins to maintain active growth and calories as required for energy.

Milk helps build strong bones and teeth. Carrots make excellent food for eyes, hair, skin. Green vegetables contain iron for blood building. Beef and other proteins help maintain normal function of body cells.

Fruit, custard, fruit gelatin, are good desserts to alternate to satisfy the desire for sweets. Puddings are desirable for youngsters who scorn milk.

The student who can be trained to eat what will do good healthwise, in preference to "fad foods," is well on the way toward developing a liking of what is essential for growth and health.

WELCOME BACK TO SCHOOL

Report to the People

By FLORENCE DWYER

The current special session of Congress may yet upset the "do-nothing" predictions of those who feared that election-year politics would cause a stalemate. Beneath the sound and fury of political attack and counter-attack, there are signs that some significant legislative ac-

complishments may be hampered during these few short weeks. If so, it will not be because Senators and Congressmen have abandoned politics. On the contrary, it will be because they are acutely sensitive to the demands of politics—that is, to the wishes and feelings and con-

ditions of a great many informed American people.

A strong case can still be made that this special session was unnecessary and unwise—unnecessary because proper planning by the Congressional leadership could have completed the legislative workload in the six months of the regular session, and unwise because in the midst of a national campaign important public decisions cannot fail to be obscured, if not distorted, by immediate

partisan considerations.

Nevertheless, the nature of American politics is such that both parties in Congress feel the compulsion to write a responsible record, especially at a time so close to the actual casting of ballots. If my observations during the past few weeks in Union County are correct, the situation is serious; they are concerned about problems of our economy, about jobs and about prices. And they are deeply involved with the stresses and strains of foreign policy: with Cuba and the Congo, the future of NATO and the Western European community, the increasing economic competition from abroad, with the growing power of Communist China, and the shifting patterns of Soviet aggression.

Our people expect performance from their Congress—not just fire-eating oratory. They expect that reasonable men and women can reach agreement on issues of such great importance to our country. They appreciate that there are differences in approach between our two great political parties, but these differences do not divide us radically and ideologically. Compromise is always possible.

Despite political speeches and maneuvers, therefore, neither party will want to risk national displeasure either by stubborn opposition to all legislation or by railroading through the Congress every free-spending proposal that has been advanced.

In addition, there are differences of opinion within each of the parties—differences of opinion which make it necessary in the case of much important legislation for the winning side to get some help from members of both parties. This fact, too, requires compromise.

Only the public works bill was non-controversial, and passage of the others—especially the compromise minimum wage legislation—were victories of political responsibility.

The fact that substantial numbers of Senators of both parties voted for the minimum wage bill in its compromise form indicates that there is no good reason why other priority items in the President's list of "must" legislation should not be considered now. Most of these bills have had lengthy and careful study. It remains to find specific formulas which can enlist the support of members of both parties.

Chief among these are: medical care for the elderly, school construction assistance, aid to depressed areas, and to mention one that OUGHT to be on everyone's list—commuter transportation legislation.

Convention incorporated recommendations I had sent to the chairman, including this plank: "A stepped up program to assist in urban planning, designed to assure farsighted and wise use of land and to coordinate mass transportation and other vital facilities in our metropolitan areas."

Next step is for the Congress to approve legislation, which I have co-sponsored in the House, to give effect to this recommendation.

Good news, too, from the Agriculture Department, which late last week agreed with my suggestion to transfer surplus grain from midwest storage facilities into the empty Liberty ships of the "moth-ball" fleet in the Hudson River. It will save taxpayers money and bring new business to our metropolitan area economy.

Our Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations is moving fast now to determine the best ways for Federal, State and local governments to coordinate their efforts in solving our mass transportation problems in such urban-suburban areas as New Jersey-New York-Connecticut.

One final word: As soon as possible after Congress adjourns in September, and as I have in past years, I shall send you a comprehensive report on the activities of the 86th Congress—its accomplishments and failures, its unfinished business, and an idea of how these things affect you in Union County.



Warns Against Worn Car Tires

Old and worn automobile tires are the cause of numerous accidents, many fatal which might have been averted if proper care had been provided for them previously, state the New Jersey Turnpike Authority.

An old tire on one of the rear wheels blew out while the car was traveling along the Turnpike in a normal fashion. The age of the tire was clearly evident from an examination of the rotted condition of the rubber. Practically all the tread was worn off so from this aspect, alone, the tire should have been long discarded as a potential killer. The car traveling at Turnpike speeds, thus causing heat to be generated and strain to be placed on the tire, caused the tire to burst with the resultant fatality. Tires in almost perfect condition are necessary for safe travel at Turnpike speeds for any length of time.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF SPRINGFIELD, IN THE COUNTY OF UNION, NEW JERSEY, that the gross debt of the Township as defined in section 40:17 of said Law is increased by the amount of \$10,000 and the said obligations authorized by the ordinance shall be within the debt limitations prescribed by said Law.

The following items as defined and authorized by section 40:17 of said Law are and shall be charged as a part of the cost of said several purposes to be financed by the issuance of said obligations: (1) not exceeding \$1,000 an account of the cost of issuance of said obligations, and (2) not exceeding \$2,000 on the account of engineering and inspection fees and legal expenses.

Section 5. The full and credit of the Township are hereby pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on the said obligations authorized by this ordinance, and the Township shall be obligated to pay the same upon all the taxable property within the Township for the payment of said obligations without limitation of rate or amount.

Section 6. All ordinances of the Township inconsistent herewith or making appropriations or authorizing the issuance of bonds or notes for the several improvements described in Section 3 of this ordinance, including particularly the several ordinances referred to in said Section 3, are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency and are hereby deemed to be null and void insofar as they affect the validity of any current or future bonds or other obligations of the Township heretofore issued or incurred pursuant to any of said ordinances, and no liability or other obligations shall be deemed to have been incurred or incurred by this ordinance pursuant to this ordinance.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after the first publication thereof after final passage as provided by said Local Bond Law.




