## Mayor Presses Hwy Fight; Asks State-Federal Aid

Mayor Vincent J. Bonadies today pressed his fight against the proposed Federal Highway Route 78 through Springfield with a direct request for further assistance from congressional supporters of the township's stand as well as a similar bid to Governor Robert Meyner.

Bonadies called upon Meyner and United States Senators Clifford P. Case and Harrison Williams and Rep. Florence Dwyer to prod the Federal Bureau of Public Roads for an answer to specific information requested by the governing body here two months ago that would enable the Township Committee to properly evaluate the construction of an alternate route.

The mayor cited his request of August 17th to F. C. Turner, Deputy Commissioner and Chief Engineer of the Bureau of Public Roads, that asked for complete construction cost figures of the proposed highway, engineering data, among other pertinent information, as well as a request for an additional direct conference to discuss alternate routes, whose impact would not be as severe to Springfield.

Specifically requested were these points of information:

1. The complete cost breakdown of the State's alignment of EAI 78, Route 24 and the interchange of both roads as they affect only the Township of Springfield.
2. The complete cost breakdown of localizing the interchange of Routes 78 and 24 in the northernmost section of our community, as was proposed in our visit to your office. We also request the cost breakdown of any realigned routes for 78 and 24 relating to moving the interchange, as we seek to accomplish.
3. The engineering data, compiled by both the State Highway Department and the Federal Bureau of Roads, used to arrive at the conclusion that alternate proposals to that of the State's preferred alignment.
4. What are the factors justifying the State's position in voluntarily offering to our neighborhood community three alternate routes through the Township of Union? This was offered at the recent public hearing in Newark. It seems reasonable to assume, even to a layman, the Township of Union could choose the longer and more costlier alternate of the

## Huff's Resignation Received With Much Regret by Township

The Springfield Township Committee received a letter of resignation from Charles Huff, Springfield's tax collector since 1934. Mr. Huff's resignation was received with much regret by the committee members.

Mr. Huff has been on a leave of absence since May. His retirement becomes effective October 15, the day his leave of absence expires. He will receive a \$1200 pension, the maximum amount allowed under the New Jersey statute.

Daniel Lucy echoed the sentiments of many when he said "Charles is retiring after a great many years of service to the community. He has held a number of varied posts and has accumulated much experience. We will miss Charlie. The best of luck to both Mr. and Mrs. Huff. May they have a long pleasant life at their home. Thanks on the behalf of the committee and the people of Springfield for a job well done."

Mayor Vincent Bonadies also expressed his appreciation for the work and time which Mr. Huff spent in the service of Springfield. He stated, "There is no question that Mr. Huff has earned the plaudits of the community for his service. He saw Springfield grow and progress. He knows the history of Springfield in modern times."

Irving Weinberg, Springfield township attorney, was asked to draw up a resolution requesting the Union County Park Commission for permission to install a storm sewer on Green Hill Road on top of the mountain. This property belongs to the Commission. W. Balentine moved that the developer bear the expense of the installation.

The committee previously received a resolution from Plainfield requesting that the juvenile court-age be lowered from 18 to 16 years of age. A communication was received from the New Jersey Youth Study Commission strongly opposing the age-lowering. The committee is referring the matter to Magistrate Henry C. McMullen for a recommendation.

A communication was received from the County Board of Chosen Freeholders telling of a county-wide two-way radio network. This network would be for the use of all communities wishing to participate. It was recommended that the cost of maintenance, \$100 per year, be allocated in the budget for next year.

Enley R. Bennett, traffic consultant from Cranford, will be retained to help the township solve traffic problems. His fee will be \$2,000. The committee has not decided on what basis he will be retained.

## Murphy Slams at "Me-Too" Government; Hwy Problem

Paul T. Murphy, Republican candidate for town committee, continued to hammer away at the "Me-Too" government of the past years and the responsibility of the new Route No. 78 and Mayor Bonadies role in that connection.

Murphy started his statement thusly:

"In the course of numerous meetings throughout Springfield with Democrats, Republicans, and Independents, I have discerned one common sentiment among us, a desire to return to two party government. The 'Me-Too' government of the past year has failed to impress the voters. This attitude has communicated itself to my opponent. He has diligently attempted to tie himself on to the coat-tails of Representative Dwyer and Assemblyman Stanlier in every conceivable fashion.

"He has just as scrupulously avoided any association with his Democratic running mates. While those Democrats who are working for their entire ticket may not object to their local candidate attempting to pose as a Republican, we Republicans would prefer that he joined our party in the usual fashion at the Primary, rather than masquerade as one of us during the campaign.

No Indorsement

"Neither Mrs. Dwyer nor Nelson tamler ever indorsed Mr. Bonadies or the manner in which he has conducted his paper war against proposed Route 78. Both of them are on our side in our fight to move the Highway out of our prime residential areas. Both of them explained, to our Mayor that his remedy lies with his own party. As Mr. Bonadies well knows, Governor Meyner can direct his Highway Commissioner to alleviate our plight. As Mr. Bonadies well knows Governor Meyner, the head of Mayor Bonadies party, has failed to issue that directive.

Troy Village

"Approximately one million dollars of taxpayers money is being spent in the acquisition and demolition of part of Troy Village. The erection of this section was permitted by Mayor Bonadies at a time when he knew the proposed highway would go through it. Last week, at a Highway meeting addressed by Representative Dwyer and myself, Mrs. Dwyer expressed her bewilderment over the per-

The Safeway Market, 746 Morris Avenue and Essex Turnpike, Springfield, damaged by fire on September 2, has been condemned, announced Robert Pelligrino, Springfield Building Inspector.

Mr. Pelligrino inspected the market the night of the fire and witnessed the punishment inflicted on the walls. Because of the heat, stress, and strain placed on the walls, they could not remain upright. They would be able to sustain reactionary loads.

The Haler Testing Laboratory of Plainfield was called in by the management of the Safeway Market to examine the structure. Upon their opinion, Mr. Pelligrino decided that the four walls and slab be demolished and that the building be brought down to grade.

## Change Voting Places In Two Town Districts

If you are a qualified voter in the Township of Springfield and registered from either the first or eleventh districts, Township Clerk Eleanor H. Worthling wants you to know that there has been a change in the polling places for both of these districts.

Voters from the First District will find voting machines for the coming general elections, November 8, at the Parish House of the First Presbyterian Church in Main Street. These voting booths were formerly in the Morris Motors at the corner of Morris and Meisel Avenues.

Since the new proprietors of the Morris Motors asked that the voting booths be moved out of their premises for the coming elections, the only other available space was the Parish House and arrangements to use this have been completed.

There are a total of 580 qualified voters in the First District in Springfield, an increase of 85 over the 475 registered there in the last general election.

The other change for the location of the voting booth will be for the 782 registered voters in the 11th District. They will cast their ballots in the new Sandmeier School in South Springfield Avenue instead of the Walton School, Mountain Avenue.

## \$300,000 Plant Coming To Town

The architect engaged for the one-story structure is Carl Kemm Loven, Glen Rock.

Victory Engineering will close their Union plant and move to Springfield as soon as the building is completed. The plans are now in Robert Pellegrino's hands.

## No Light In Town

All of Springfield was in total darkness last Thursday night by a short circuit in the Waverly Avenue substation of the Jersey Central Power and Light Co.

A wire burned out in the substation at 7:40 o'clock affecting 3,100 customers, according to E. B. Benton, spokesman for the power company.

Some power was restored within 12 minutes by rerouting circuits but other customers were without power until 9:10 p.m., he said.

Not only were house and street lights out, but all electric appliances, such as television sets, oil furnaces and even gasoline station pumps were knocked out for varying periods.

Police said no emergencies developed during the blackout, but headquarters was flooded with calls from residents inquiring as to the cause.

Police and fire headquarters were lighted by emergency generators.

Mr. Benton said the substation will be out of service until the reason for the short circuit is discovered. However, ample power will be supplied to all customers through alternate circuits, he assured.

## Fire Department Plans Exhibit

Springfield's Fire Chief Ormond Mesker has announced that the Fire Department will hold a demonstration today and tomorrow in front of Newberry's in observance of Fire Prevention Week. The program will be from 7 to 8 p.m.

There will be a physical demonstration of the evolution of fire equipment which is used to combat fires. Included in the exhibition will be the use of fire extinguishers; use of self-contained breathing masks; a thermo rescue suit which can withstand 2000 degrees; use of aerial ladders and methods men utilize to let themselves down as an escape method from 75 to 85-foot heights; use of American ladders; the maximum 1000 gallon pumper; and the light rescue unit.

The regular Fire Department volunteers, and the reserve will participate in this demonstration.

## Hawryluk Receives Honors

Raymond Hawryluk of 38 Pitt Rd., Springfield, has received honors at Newark College of Engineering. It was announced today by Sumner J. House, dean of students. He is one of 13 who qualified for special recognition out of 78 students who began their freshman year at the college last February.

The honors, according to House, cover the past spring and summer terms, which the "February Recognition" attended in order to start their second year of studies this fall with other sophomores at NCE. Of the 13 honors men, four are enrolled in the day division, the others in the evening division.

House explained that a student qualifies for honors if he attains a B average with no grade lower than C while taking at least 75 per cent of the credit hours in a regular course of study.

The dean added that a student's record of honors is especially applicable to his class standing and job placement at the time of commencement. During the undergraduate period, it is pertinent to membership in academic and professional societies, and to summer job placement under NCE's Honors Option program.

"We are proud of our safety education program and are pleased that the National Safety Council has again recognized our efforts," Newschwager said. "As long as accidents are the first ranking cause of death among school-age children, all of us on the staff of the Springfield School will continue in an organized safety program to teach the young people of our community to protect themselves and their fellow students. We wish to encourage the parents to continue to supplement our efforts."

The National Safety Council Honor Role was initiated in 1944. To earn a place on it, a school must present a detailed report of its safety program to a committee composed of the school principal, the president of the local parent-teacher association, a student and a local civic leader. If this committee reports favorably, the National Safety Council lists the school on the Honor Role and sends the school a Certificate of Exceptional Merit. All of our schools have recently received such certificates.



called Rose Hall at the Runnels Hospital in Berkeley Heights and then left it mostly vacant?  
"We found that the building with space for 120 beds had been occupied at a peak period by no more than 24 nurses with many vacant rooms completely furnished."

### A Chat With Joe Schaffernoth

With the baseball season racing down the home-stretch, we don't have many more opportunities to talk about the "favorite past time." By the time this column reaches you, the Pirates may have already put an end to another season, but we'll take our chances, and do a little spouting.

The other day we dropped in on Joe Schaffernoth at his parents' home in Springfield. I had no particular questions in mind, except to talk about the big leagues in general. It proved to be very interesting. When you write for a weekly paper, you don't get the chance very often to talk to professional athletes. Just like any little leaguer, I enjoyed talking to someone from the Big Leagues.

Joe was up with the Cubs last year for about 90 days, but was assigned to Houston at the beginning of this year. At Houston he compiled a 8-2 record with his ERA under 2.50.

On June 14, the Cubs wanted to take another look at him. In 30 games this year he had a 2-3 record with an ERA of 2.75. All of his appearances were in relief.

I asked Joe how he felt when they called him into a tight situation, with someone like Hank Aaron waiting to bat. Modestly, Joe said, "I just go in with the attitude that he is another hitter. As a matter of fact I had good luck with Aaron this year. I remember I struck him out on a curve ball that hung one time."

We discussed the question of relieving or starting. Being only 25 years old, Joe would prefer to be a starter. He said it is difficult for him now, since he never knows when he is going to be used. Where as if you are a starter or the ace reliever (a la Roy Face) you can plan your schedule. In his case he gets weaker rather than stronger without work.

We discussed the managerial problems in Chicago and how Joe enjoyed playing under some of the past Cub managers. I asked him if he thought they would trade Ernie Banks. From what Joe said, I think it could come about very easily. A good point is "they haven't won with him, so why not get 3 or 4 front line players for him."

We also got on the subject of the Jim Brewer and Billy Martin incident. Unfortunately, this game provided Joe with his biggest thrill of the past season. After Martin laid-out Brewer, Joe was called from the bullpen to take over. After pitching 5 innings of shutout ball, he was lifted for a pinch hitter. Joe got the win.


I'll bet you could never guess what Joe's favorite sport is. Football. In high school, Joe was a standout griddier, as well as basketball player.






