## Teeners Offer Help In March of Dimes

Determined to Raise \$1000

Results of last year's March of Dimes campaign revealed that Springfield raised a total of \$490. This was one of the lowest contributions according to population by any town in the United States.

The teenage division of the 1961 drive has set a goal of \$1000 for themselves. They are determined to make "JD" mean Juvenile Decency rather than Juvenile Delinquency. When the teeners say "Please say yes to the March of Dimes," do not let the adults become delinquents.

Chairman of the Teenage Division is Mrs. Bea Katz. Any teeners or parents interested in assisting the group should call Mrs. Katz at DR 6-2978.

The enthusiasm of the teen group was sparked by local pride as well as serving the cause itself. The teeners were told that the amount raised in Springfield was less per person than almost any other town in the country. The group is planning to raise at least twice that amount by their own efforts.

The March of Dimes Drive is still one of the nation's most important charitable events. The National Foundation is concerned with the following:

- Birth defects affect one out of every 16 babies born in the United States. Every other minute, a child is born with some type of defect.
- Arthritis and rheumatism affect 11,000,000 Americans of all ages.
- Polio can strike any of 85,000,000 unvaccinated Americans.
- For thousands of victims who were stricken in the years before the Salk vaccine, polio means a future limited by crutches, braces and iron lungs.

### Criticizes Linden Councilman Blewett for Rebellion Talk

Mayor Vincent J. Bonadies, speaking in behalf of Union County Democratic Chairman James J. Kinneally and pledging full support for the re-election of the present leader, "stole the show" at a meeting of the top drawer county Democrats held in Linden last week.

That Mayor Bonadies "stole the show" was one of the many descriptive phrases made by Democratic leaders from all parts of Union County after the meeting and his promise to support Kinneally for re-election as County Democratic chairman brought applause from the large crowd on hand.

The conference of Democratic leaders was called to discuss the results of the last elections and to give the present Democratic Chairman Kinneally a vote of confidence and assurance of his re-election as Union County leader.

Mayor Bonadies criticized Linden City Councilman John F. Blewett for talking rebellion among Union County Democrats and for giving the impression that "the one objective of the party is to split the spoils."

Serve the People

"In Springfield," Mayor Bonadies told the Democratic leaders, "we have created the image that the Democratic party is prepared to serve the people. We haven't created the image that to the victor belongs the spoils."

In praising Democratic Chairman Kinneally, Mayor Bonadies said, "there isn't anyone who will disagree more with Jim Kinneally than Bonadies but Kinneally is the type of man needed to provide the leadership expected."

He told the assembled Democrats that "it is more important to discuss and plan for what will happen next year rather than what happened last November."

Stressing the importance of winning the independent voter and bringing back into the fold some of the disenchanted party members, he asked, "How smart is it to tell them that our one objective is to split the spoils?"

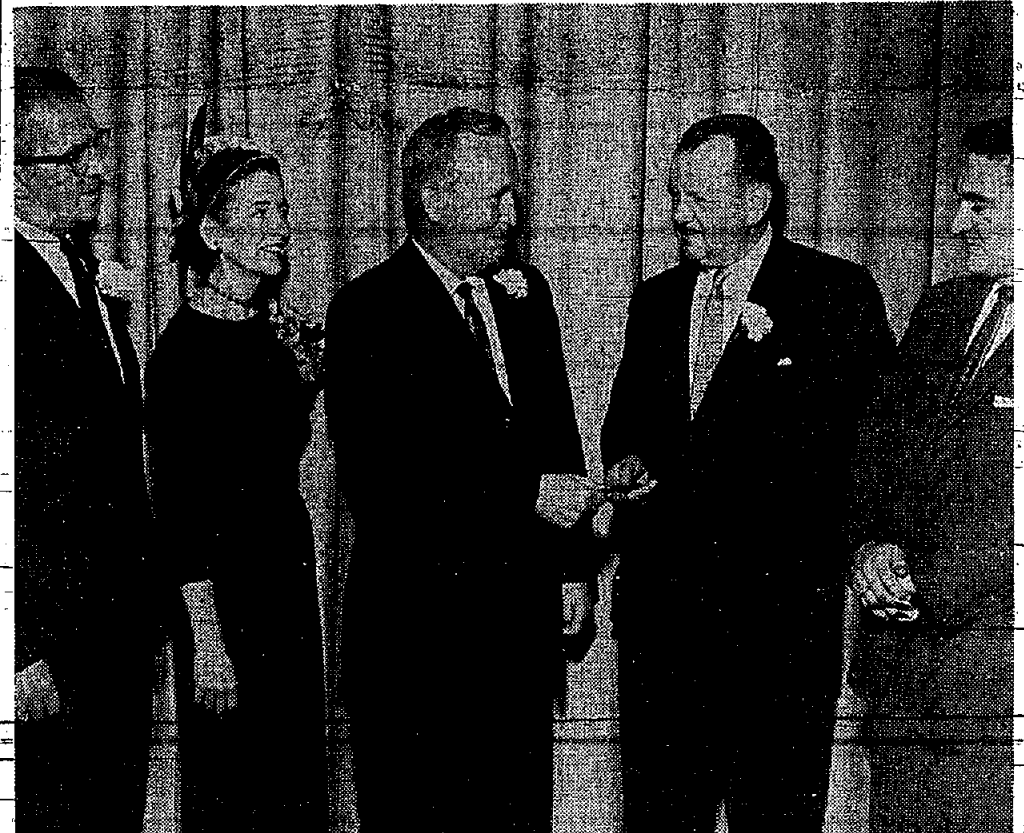

ring to a story printed in the daily newspapers in which Linden Councilman Blewett is quoted as having said there will be "a rebellion in the ranks of Union County Democrats before the April primaries." 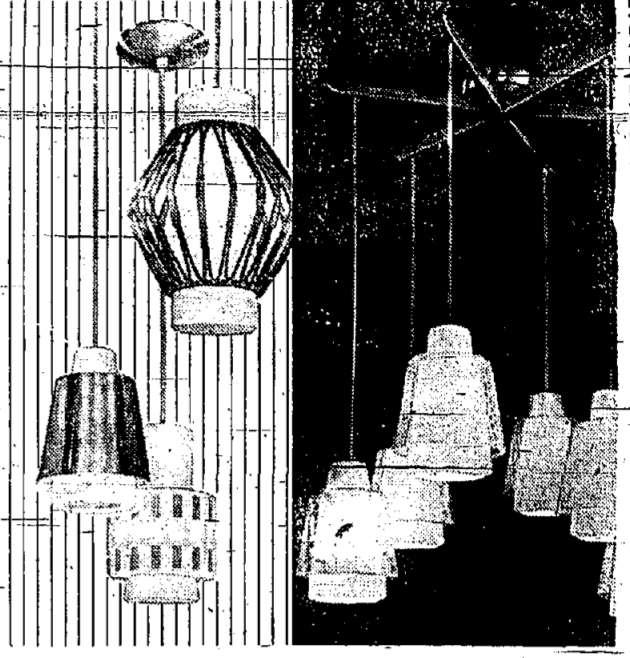
The film will show the natural beauty of the islands and will depict the life which exists in our 50th state.

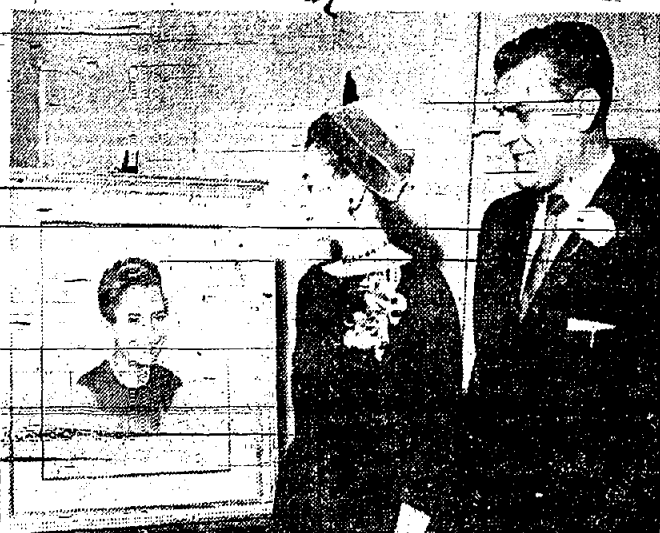

### Montclair State Receives \$72,900 Science Grant For Summer Math Seminar

Montclair State College has received a grant of \$72,900 from the National Science Foundation to conduct a six-week institute for mathematics teachers next summer.

This is the sixth grant the college has been given by the foundation. Others covered two institutes in two previous summers and three in-service institutes.

In addition to tuition costs the grant provides weekly stipends, which vary according to the number of the recipient's dependents, for all who take the course. Twenty-five teachers will be selected to review basic undergraduate mathematics. The remaining 50 will be selected to start a proposed five summer sequence lead-

ing to an M.A. degree at Montclair.

The major objective of the institute are as follows: to provide an opportunity for teachers in the field to keep abreast of new developments and modern concepts in mathematics; to help participants understand the implications and implementation of a modern curriculum in mathematics; to stimulate interest in mathematics and help teachers to motivate their students in this field; and to spread to the mathematics teachers of the country, via the participants, the notions and implications of a modern curriculum in mathematics.

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### Carbon Monoxide Stalks Victims - Jehovah's Witnesses Hold Newark Bible Convention

A killer that can be neither seen nor heard again is stalking his prey, and only by careful safeguarding against the menace can you hope remain that you will not be claimed as a victim.

This killer is odorless and tasteless, and unsuspecting motorists often are his victims. The killer is carbon monoxide (CO), a gas produced by the incomplete burning of a fuel. This enemy works by entering the lungs of its victims and cutting off the supply of oxygen.

In order to accomplish its mission, CO must strike while the victim is confined in a stuffy, unventilated place. A person sitting in a tightly closed automobile, subject to a large dose of CO, can be killed in as little as five minutes, in some instances with no advance warning. Winter drivers particularly are susceptible to this killer.

Even in cases when the poisoning is not fatal, CO can cause

serious illness and even permanent brain damage. Safety officials suspect in many traffic accidents when drivers report they fell asleep, or were extremely drowsy, they actually were suffering from CO poisoning.

"The only way to adequately guard against CO is to insure adequate ventilation," according to Dr. North H. Sloan, medical director of the Allstate Insurance Companies.

Dr. Sloan said that motorists who warm up their cars in closed garages are inviting an attack by CO. "Persons who drive with faulty exhaust systems are following an equally dangerous practice," the Allstate medical director added.

"Danger signals of CO are a tightness across the forehead, throbbing in the temples, headache, tiredness, weakness, dizziness, nausea, loss of muscle control and speeded up pulse and breathing.

To guard against becoming a victim of this killer, Dr. Sloan urges motorists to adhere to the following safety rules:

1. Never allow your automobile exhaust system to become

stagnant. If you notice a smell of gas, or if you feel any of the above symptoms, stop the car at once and get fresh air.

2. Never start your automobile's engine in a closed garage.
3. Never stay in a closed, stationary car with the motor running.
4. Always keep a window open when the engine is running, and

in slow moving, closely spaced traffic, keep air intakes in the front of your car closed to guard against CO from the exhaust fumes of other automobiles.

5. If you or any of your passengers feel drowsy, stop, get out and get fresh air.

### HIGH SCHOOL DRIVER ED. TRAINING PROVES VALUABLE

High school driver training has more than proved its worth as the strictest, most practical way of improving the quality of future drivers, according to Mrs. Agnes D. Beaton, director of the Women's Division of the Allstate Insurance Companies. She told a National Safety Congress youth conference there is growing evidence that high school trained drivers are involved in only half as many accidents and traffic arrests as teenage motorists who lack such training.

Pointing out that motor vehicle accidents account for one-

third of the deaths between ages 15 and 24 annually, she emphasized that driver training can be credited with saving 910 lives and \$122.5 million in economic loss through auto accidents last year.

"The high school driver education program offers the most positive approach to today's young driver problem," she said. "If not dealt with effectively now, this will produce a tragic dilemma," she continued.

"Drivers under the age of 25 make up 18.4 per cent of the total driver population, but ac-

count for 31.5 per cent of all traffic fatalities. Right now the accident involvement rate of the under-25 drivers is nearly double that of any other age group, and this margin will widen tremendously as our population explosion pours thousands more into the young

(Continued from Page 6) driver category," Mrs. Beaton declared. "Because the stakes are so high, youth leaders should stress the importance of high school driver training to their parents, school authorities, classmates, and the people in their communities," she continued. "Current surveys show that less than 35 per cent of the nation's teenagers now receive this lifesaving instruction." High school driver education assumes even greater significance when it related to the social problems of the nation, according to Mrs. Beaton. "What good is it to spend years of effort and thousands of dollars to educate a youngster if his life is snuffed out in a traffic accident before he has a chance to apply the knowledge he has learned?" she asked. "Knowing how to live with the automobile becomes equally as

important as any academic subject in the high school curriculum," Mrs. Beaton said. "In fact, those who couldn't live with the automobile in 1959 caused a six billion dollar loss, which would have been enough to enable 775,000 students to complete their academic training in college," she declared.

"It's up to the parents to see to it that their teenagers receive a thorough course in driver training, then exercise proper authority in the matter of how and when they drive," she concluded.

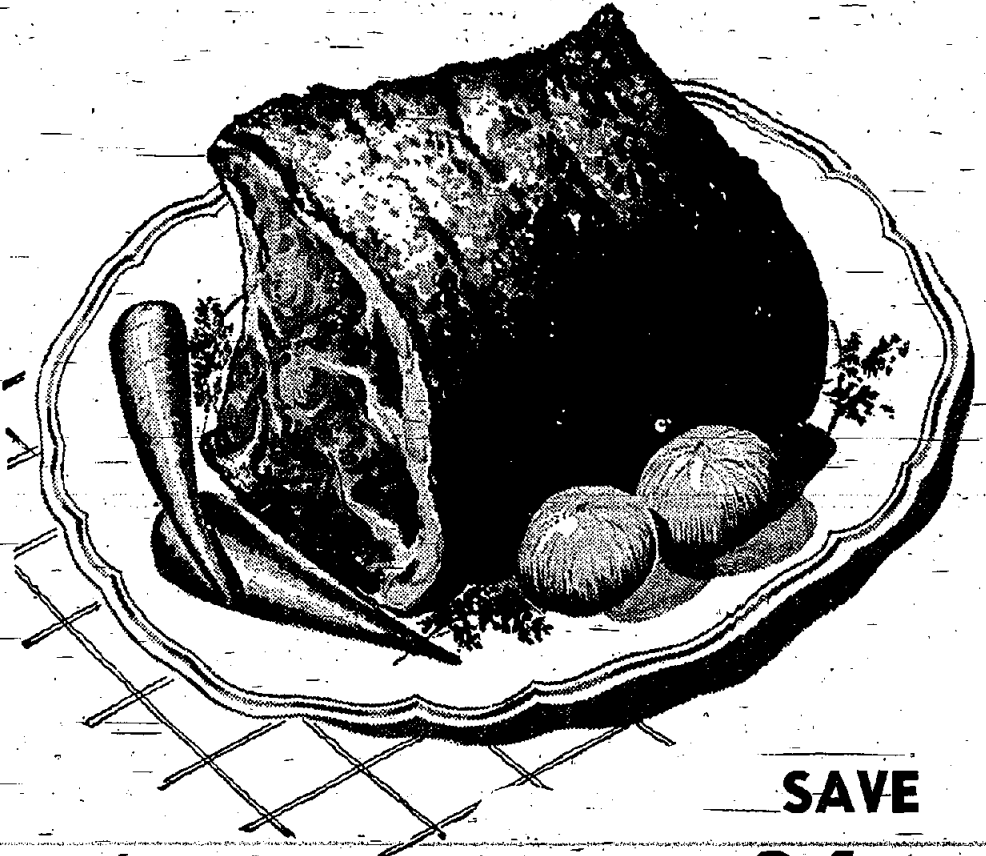

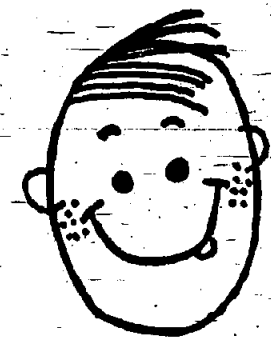

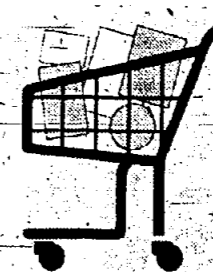

### Saturday Evening Post Lauds New Jersey Jetport Resistance

New Jersey citizens opposing the proposed jetport in the Great Swamp area of Morris County may have rendered an important service to the rest of the country according to the current (December 17) issue of The Saturday Evening Post.

Author Joe Alex Morris says that win, lose or draw the Jersey Jetport Site Association has demonstrated how it is possible for a community to act in many ways to preserve its living space. His article, "Jetport Showdown in Jersey," finds that the battle waged by the JISA has brought into focus the whole problem of keeping pace with our jet age without destroying the remaining "green belts" around our cities.

Morris noted that it can be an alert for other submittes and planners to the necessity for demanding a better answer than today's hard choice between bees buzzing over honeysuckle or jets shrieking over housetops.

It is found that all this could mark a turning point in urban planning, if it forces local authorities to consider that future jetports logically can be located in sparsely inhabited areas 100 miles or more from big cities.

The latter is said to be in line with the thinking that the key to the problem must be found in a speed-up of transportation between airports and metropolitan areas.

In this, it is reported, they are talking in terms of greatly increased helicopter service, super-highways which will permit faster bus travel and monorail trains which could whisk passengers from airport to city at speeds of 100 miles an hour or better.

### Health Dept. Cites TB As Leading Cause In New Jersey Fatalities

Tuberculosis continues as a leading cause of death from disease according to statistics provided this month to the Union County Tuberculosis and Health League by the New Jersey State Department of Health. The report listed the number of deaths, New Jersey from reportable infectious diseases for 1959 and noted that 63.2 percent of these deaths, excluding the pneumonias, were caused by tuberculosis.

Mrs. Edward Sierks of Fanwood, president of the League commented, "Years ago we used to call tuberculosis 'captain of the men of death.' Because of more successful treatment with the new drugs, TB workers no longer use the death rate as the standard of control of the disease. It is interesting to note that tuberculosis still causes more death than all other infectious diseases excepting the pneumonias. But it is even more important to keep in mind the 644 persons recorded in the Union County Tuberculosis Case Register as being under treatment for active disease or under supervision as inactive cases."

The state health department reported on 433 tuberculosis deaths in New Jersey in 1959, showing that 324 of them were men and 109 women. Fourteen persons were under 25 years of age, 72 were 25 to 44 years of age, 183 were 45 to 64 years of age and 164 were 65 or older.

Union County's 42 tuberculosis deaths for 1959 occurred as follows: 34 male and eight female deaths. There were no TB deaths under 25 years of age, six in the age group 25 to 44 years, 14 in the 45 to 64 group, and 22 in the age group 65 and older.

### HOME SOCIETY DECLINES PARTY OFFERS 171 TOTS CELEBRATE HOLIDAY AT HOME

"Let's play Santa to a homeless youngster?"

This generous impulse, prompted by the spirit of the season, brings the Children's Home Society of New Jersey its usual pre-Christmas quota of party-offer letters. They come from warm-hearted couples located throughout the state. They have been sent by couples who ask nothing more than the opportunity to "entertain" one of the Society's little ones "for the holidays."

It all seems so logical. What gesture of goodwill could be finer than to welcome a homeless little one as a guest? To shower a child with gifts? To give a youngster a good time? To do all those things that express the spirit of Christmas?

It would hardly seem possible that the Society, with so many children to care for, could decline an offer of a Christmas good time for one or more of their youngsters. Yet, while expressing sincere appreciation for the spirit in which these offers are made, the Society's answer is always the same. It is — "we are sorry. But, to give you the care of a youngster for the holidays would not be in the best interests of the child."

C. Lester Greer, executive director of the Children's Home Society, is always careful to point out that even though the offer is a tempting one, experiences recorded by the Society's workers over the years have demonstrated that, in most cases, the highly stimulating experience of being showered with concentrated attention and affection by a "stranger" for a few days does one of the Society's charges more harm than good.

In all its work with the children—in its care—the Children's Home Society strives to stress the value of "normal" experiences for its little ones. For this reason, the Society's workers have found it to be a far better practice to help each child enjoy Christmas experiences that are as close as possible to those he or she would normally enjoy with parents, whether they be natural born Moms and Dads or the adoptive parents with whom they will eventually be placed once the preadoption transition

period is over and done with. Accordingly, Greer says, no child in the Society's care is ever forgotten on Christmas Day. He points out that each youngster not only receives gifts, but those old enough to understand are helped to give gifts to poster parents — and also to "friends." In all cases, he notes, each child in the Society's care is surrounded by a warm and happy Christmas atmosphere. In many situations this Christmas atmosphere and spirit is provided by foster parents, to whom Christmas and all it signifies becomes an important part of the temporary period during which they serve as "interim parents" to a youngster being readied for a new life with its adoptive-parents-to-be.

This year, Greer says, there will be 171 "home parties" for youngsters in the care of the Children's Home Society of New Jersey. And, once again, as during years past, a lone wreath on the door of the Society's Trenton headquarters will serve as a symbol of a Christmas, as well as all-year-round child care exceeding well done.

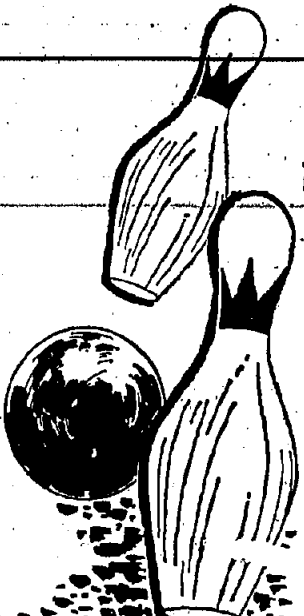

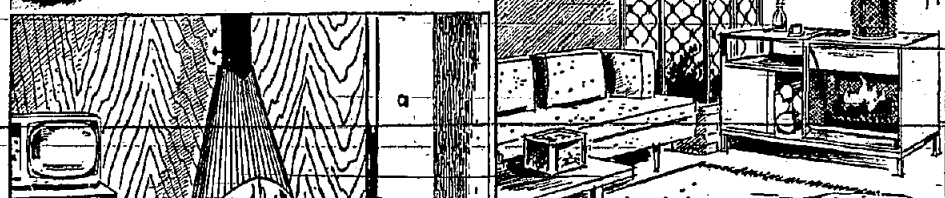
