Building Values For January Hit \$272,500 Mark

Robert Pelligrino, Springfield's building inspector, lists in his January report the total value of new buildings at \$272,500. The total value of alterations is \$17,000 and \$2,210 for burners. He has received \$1,236 in license fees and has given 22 permits plus 5 certificates of occupancy. Henry Grabarz is erecting an office building at 194 Morris Avenue which is valued at \$40,000. The Murray Construction Company is building an office and warehouse valued at \$11,000 at 15 Brown Avenue. Jeffrey Estates is building three one-family homes at 6 Elton Place, 16 Shunpike Road, and 18 Avon Road. The total value of these three homes is \$85,000. Smithfield Park is building six one-family homes, one on Lenape Road and five on Smithfield Drive. The total value of these homes is \$155,000. The combined value of these two developments is \$210,000.

Budget-Passed 1006-638; Fire Detection Wins by Slim Margin

Springfield residents elected John Gacos and re-elected Howard S. Smith and Joseph Bender to three-year terms on the local Board of Education Tuesday. Incumbent Alan Cunningham defeated Mrs. Lawrence Dersky 590 to 532 for the one-year term. The \$1,363,222 budget was passed by a vote of 1006 to 638. The \$38,150 fire detection and automatic sprinkler system also was approved by a slim margin, 458 to 411.

New Ordinance Assures Light On Hillside Ave.

The long-awaited traffic light on the corner of South Springfield Avenue is coming closer to reality with the action of the Township Committee at Tuesday night's meeting. The Committee introduced an ordinance specifying parking limitations for cars and buses in and around the intersection of this major thoroughfare. This action is normal procedure preliminary to the actual installation of the light. The town has received assurances from the State Highway department that the installation of the light would be forthcoming, probably within five weeks.

Named to Board
Donald S. Rotwein of Sycamore Terrace, was named to serve on the Town Planning Board. Rotwein, an architect for a number of years in this area, was named by the Town Committee to fill the vacancy on the Board due to the resignation of Edward Lindauer. Rotwein's term will run through December 1963.

Promoted
Two probationary patrolmen were promoted to third class patrolmen at the township meeting Tuesday. Rees Powell and Donald Schwerdt were promoted to their new ranks effective January 1st.

Sewer Ordinance
An ordinance will be drawn to establish the installation of sanitary sewers for residents of Baltusot top. Town Attorney Irwin Weinberg was directed by the township to draw up an ordinance covering the installation of sanitary sewers on a local assessment on the following streets: Baltusot Road, Sharon Road, Highlands Avenue, High Point Drive and Fernhill Road.

Bender Gets Highest Vote
Mr. Bender, chairman of the fire referendum committee, polled the highest vote 854 Mr. Gacos received 758, Mr. Smith, Board president, 743, and George Janisko, 562.

The cumulative vote for the budget was: Current Expense, 530 yes, 278 no; Capital outlay 512 yes, 351 no. The Board anticipates \$1,118,045 for current expenses and \$38,000 for capital outlay for the 1961-62 school year. The money appropriated for Debt Service is \$211,277.

Salary Increases and New Personnel
The school system intends to increase the teaching staff by eight and to add one maintenance man. The total increase developed by salaries in the amount of \$105,000 and debt service in the amount of \$2,153 is \$107,153 a difference of only \$202 in the entire increase of the total budget. The Board expects \$115,832 in the way of State Aid for Current Expense in 1961-62 from the State Department of Education. The Federal Government under the National Defense Education Act will contribute \$1,000 toward science and mathematics programs. Gaudineer School Announces Winners in Science Fair

Entries submitted by sixth, seventh, and eighth grade students were displayed at the science fair held at the Florence M. Gaudineer School last week.

Exhibits included models, charts, specimens and a collection of live matter consisting of hamsters, white mice, chickens, fish, and a variety of plants.

Criteria for the judging involved six categories and a designated number of points were allocated to each. Creative ability emphasizing problem and method merited twenty-five points; scientific thought and reasoning, thirty-five points; thoroughness in problem exploration, fifteen points; skill in putting project together, ten points; clarity of interpretation, ten points; and dramatic value, five points.

Judges of the contest were Steven Kowalski, assistant professor of science at Montclair State College, Stanley Soule, a

chemical engineer, and Alan Chafet, a former national science fair contestant, who is a senior at the Jonathan Dayton Regional High School.

The first prize winners included: Neil Weinberg, sixth grade, The Effect of Chemicals on Growing Bacteria Cultures; David Yuckman, seventh grade, A Study of the Water Supply of Union County; Allan Katz, eighth grade, Construction of a Ripple Tank to Study Crests and Troughs of Waves. Winners who placed second were: Michèle LaMorgese, sixth grade, The Developmental Stages of a Chick;

grade, Osmotic Activities of Liquids with a Carrot; Gail Wilson, eighth grade, The Hereditary Transmission of Color, Blindness. Third prize recipients comprised the following: Ruth Meier, sixth grade, Grafting Two Varieties of Cacti; Gail Post, seventh grade, A Study of Low Protein; Low Mineral Diets on Mice, and Jeffrey Katz, eighth grade, A Study of Reflex Action in Various Age Groups. Honorable mention awards were pinned to projects considered exceptional by the judges.
