## Sullivan and Finnerty Dem Choices For Township Committee Positions

### Another Dem Files For Tax Collector Job

Moore Opposes Mrs.  
Jones In April Primary

The office of tax collector for the Township of Springfield has another candidate in Richard H. Moore, who filed last Thursday for the Democratic Primary elections to be held April 18.

Mr. Moore is 32 years old and has been an Insurance Broker for the past 10 years. He attended South Side High School in Newark, and is a graduate of Riverside Military Academy in Gainesville, Ga. After discharge from the U.S. Army he attended Rutgers University, majoring in Business Administration and the Valt School of Business for Real Estate and Insurance.

Mr. Moore has been active in civic affairs since moving to Springfield 8 years ago. He was one of the original members of the reactivated Civil Defense Police Reserve under the direction of the late Chief Albert Sorce. He served as Captain of the aforementioned organization from 1955 to 1958 and has remained active in several capacities since that time.

He was appointed to the 5-member Springfield Insurance Advisory Committee in 1959 and reappointed in 1960 and 1961. This committee was organized by the Township Committee to check into the adequacy and accuracy of the Township's insurance protection. He served on the Board of the Walton School PTA as Safety Chairman from 1958-59 and performs the same function for the Temple Shalom.

"Dick" resides at 89 Remer Avenue with his wife, Ethel and their 3 children, Sherry, 9, Robert, 6, and Debbie, 10 months.

### Tessie Jones Bids for Tax Collector Job

The names of Richard M. Sullivan, Peter Finnerty and Mrs. Tessie Jones will appear on the April 18 Primary ballot as the Springfield Democratic Party's choices for Township posts.

Mr. Sullivan and Mr. Finnerty will seek Township Committee positions and Mrs. Jones will seek the tax collector's job. Mrs. Jones has held the office by appointment since January 1. Wilbert Layton was named temporary tax collector when Charles Huff formally retired in October.

Active in Little League Groups  
A resident of Springfield since 1946, Peter Finnerty has been active in local Little League teams and organized the GYO League for St. James Church in Springfield.

He was born in Hoboken, but lived most of his life in Union City where he received his early education. He is a graduate of Seton Hall University and attended Princeton University while serving in the U.S. Navy.

Mr. Finnerty has taught in numerous schools and colleges including Columbia University, St. James School in Newark, and St. Peter's College in Jersey City. He is currently a guest lecturer at Katherine Gibbs School in Monclair. In addition to his teaching duties, he was director of athletics at St. James of Newark, N.J. He was also affiliated with the Elgin Watch Company as a consultant.

He is currently teaching business management at Pace College and acting as a management consultant with the Green Watch Company during sales promotion work.

He is also president of the Seton Hall University alumni association and is a member of the National Collegiate Coaches Association and vice president of the Jockeyblocker Collegiate Baseball Conference.

Mr. Finnerty resides at 217 Short Hills Avenue with his wife and four children.

Richard M. Sullivan is no stranger to politics. He served North Reading, Massachusetts, as Town Council for six years and was a National Statesman columnist for Maine for three years.

He received his elementary education in Massachusetts schools where he was born and graduated from Villanova University and Northeastern University Law School. He is a member of the Massachusetts and Maine Bar Association, the

## Public Hearing on \$1,169,318 Budget Planned for March 28

### Tax Rate Estimated At \$5.95

The 1961 Springfield Municipal Budget of \$1,169,318 will be aired at a public hearing in Township Hall March 28. The budget was first introduced by the Township Committee and approved by all Committee members February 28.

Showing an increase of \$16,261 over last year's budget of \$1,123,057, the tax rate is also up 42 points. This year's estimated tax rate is 5.95 as opposed to 5.55 in 1960.

**General Tax Rate Up**  
Though the overall tax rate is up, the local purpose tax rate is down 13 points. This year it is estimated at 1.11, in 1960 it was 1.24. The breakdown for the other tax rates as contrasted to 1960 figures for local school, 2.33; 2.31; regional school, 1.44; 1.20; county, 87.85.

Under local purpose tax, salary and wages appropriations show increases of approximately \$39,000 with most appropriations showing modest increases with the exception of the Fire and Police Departments. Those departments show an increase of \$30,000. This increase is due to an enlargement and the creation of new officer ranks in both departments plus salary and wage boosts.

Most other expenses which include such items as materials, supplies, and nonbondable equipment; repairs and maintenance of buildings, equipment, printing, contractual services, road, advertising, utility services, insurance, etc. approximate the 1960 amounts with certain exceptions.

Increases shown in insurance, \$6,100; garbage, \$2,000; and parks, \$8,375. The total increase in other expenses is \$17,112.

Debt service increased \$9,480; deferred charges increased \$3,315; and the reserve for uncollected taxes (based upon 94 percent of tax collection) decreased \$29,222. The amount will reduce the local purpose tax rate by 13 points and in turn reduce the school county fund regional increase of 65 points down to a net overall increase of 42 points.

**School Taxes Up 41 Points**  
The local school tax, including the special fire alarm retirement fund, will be 2.53, an increase of 19 points over 1960. Although the County Board of Taxation has not yet approved the regional school tax, Springfield's share is estimated at 1.44, or 21 points over 1960 making a total increase in school taxes of 43 points.

The Township estimates the County tax rate at 87. This rate is an increase of 42 points over 1960.

**Improvements Planned**  
The 1961 budget includes a \$5,000 Capital Improvement Fund.

### Canvassers, Solicitors To Register

The Springfield Township Committee introduced two ordinances at its Tuesday meeting, one for the licensing and regulation of canvassing and soliciting in town and one for the purchase of an emergency snow truck with an 11-foot snow plow attachment.

Before a person may solicit, canvass or act as a solicitor in Springfield he must first register with the chief of police. He must present proper identification plus two photographs of himself to the police chief plus stating the purpose of his canvassing or solicitation, the route, date and approximate hours. Those hours must be between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. If the person seeking the permission has had any conviction of crime, he must also report this fact to the police chief.

After meeting all qualifications, the chief will issue a registration certificate which will include the person's photograph and the chief's signature. This certificate must be carried by the person during the time he is soliciting and is not transferable. The certificate can be voided for such reasons as giving false information or not complying with the ordinance.

The certificate will cost \$2 and expires on December 31 of the year issued. The solicitor may not canvass or solicit on Sundays, before 9 a.m. or after 5 p.m. on Saturdays or weekdays.

This ordinance does not affect persons delivering goods, wares or merchandise. Any one found violating the ordinance is subject to a fine of \$50.

## S. Springfield, Hillside Traffic Light Ordinance Introduced by Committee

### Police Patrolmen Promoted To Sergeants

Traffic signals will soon be installed at the intersection of South Springfield and Hillside Avenues in Springfield. The Township Committee introduced an ordinance providing for this installation at its Tuesday meeting. The final hearing on the \$10,000 traffic signals is planned for March 28.

The Township had the plans and specifications approved by the State Highway Department before introducing the ordinance. The sum of \$9,500 will be raised by bonds or bond anticipation notes. The remaining \$500 will be appropriated from the budget capital improvement fund.

The acquisition of traffic signals and equipment will cost Springfield \$9,500; the rest includes legal expenses and interest which have or will arise from the installation.

The Township Committee postponed the final hearing on the \$80,000 sewer installation until March 28. Only three members of the Committee were present at the meeting and four are needed for a final hearing.

The sewers are to be installed in the Baltusrol Top area including such streets as Dundar Road, Fernhill Road, Baltusrol Road, Fernhill Road, Baltusrol Road, Highlands Avenue, South Springfield Avenue and Mountain Avenue.

Desch-King Company of Whippany and Hoadley Construction Company of Morristown were awarded contracts for road maintenance contracts. Desch-King bid \$2,384 and the Morristown Company, \$2,075.

## Red Cross Links Home, Servicemen

The American National Red Cross is the connecting link providing contact between the home folks and their loved ones in the service. The Red Cross is the only agency qualified and able to provide this valuable type of assistance. In the Springfield Chapter this work is carried out by the Home Service Committee in cooperation with the national Field Director, York Springfield, chapter under the leadership of Home Service director Mrs. Harry T. Quinzel, 13 South Trivett, has handled many interesting cases in this area. Mrs. Henry C. McMullen, Social Service Aide, assists in this work.

All emergency leaves and extensions must be verified by this Red Cross committee through contact with the family, physician, and hospital. The responsibility for granting the leave, however, rests with the armed services and the Red Cross can not guarantee approval. Every effort is made by the Red Cross, nonetheless, to see that the needs of service personnel and families are met, and in all of the years the Springfield Chapter has never had a leave or extension denied.

Emergency financial grants and loans to either servicemen, veterans or their families are made by this committee. Home Service also aids veterans in their contacts with various government agencies to gain and verify benefits due them and their families.

During the past year fifteen Home Service cases have been completed. Two financial loans were made; one has been repaid and the other is being repaid. One financial grant was made. Two cases involved counseling veterans and aiding them in filing for disability benefits. Several personal home visits, in counseling and investigation were made. Emergency leaves were verified for the military. One leave was granted for death in the family, and another for morale purposes when the appearance of a serviceman at his father's bedside gave a morale boost contributing to his recovery. Extension of leave because of illness was also granted. Two health and welfare reports for family or servicemen were made. One resulted from a delay in mails when a serviceman was transferred. Red Cross investigated and reported on the serviceman's safety bringing relief to his parents and fiancée. Further relief arrived when fifteen letters, delayed during the transfer, arrived in one day.

A new trend in Red Cross service is for new inductees or enlistees to file a card which the local chapter takes to make a personal visit to his family informing them of the services available to them through Red Cross while their loved one is in the service.

Another important link between your local Red Cross and those who serve or served in the Armed Forces is our work with the veterans administration hospitals at East Orange and Lyons. The Springfield Chapter is a member of the East Orange V.A. Hospital Council where Mrs. Oliver O. Deane, Jr., 252 Short Hills Avenue, serves as council representative. Our Junior Red Cross supplies favors and decorations for all special occasions and holidays. Canteen workers provide home baked cakes and a gift at birthday celebrations for the patients and are responsible for two or three teas and ward parties during the year. Motor-Gorp volunteers supply escort service and Gray Ladies and Junior Gray Ladies serve the patients.

The Springfield Chapter also seeks to supply Red Cross trained volunteers for other needs at the V.A. hospital. Volunteers are needed to serve as: Feeders; Nurses Aides; Ward Assistants; in occupational therapy and recreation on the T.B. floors; and men are wanted for corrective therapy. Special needs include a stamp collector, chess players, and an art instructor. Anyone interested in being of service is asked to call Chapter Headquarters DR. 6-1676.

 is \$896,641; in 1960 it totaled \$840,167. Salaries and wages reach \$538,312; in 1960 it totaled \$499,019; other expenses, \$358,299 contrasted to \$341,157 in 1960. Total municipal debt service is \$52,040; in 1960 it was \$42,560. Total general appropriations for municipal purposes is \$1,002,646 as opposed to \$933,257 in 1960. Adding this to figure the amount of reserve for uncollected taxes (\$168,672) brings the total for general appropriations to \$1,169,318 — the Springfield Municipal Budget for 1961.

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



### Temple Beth Ahm to Hear Group Chairman Cantor David Patterman Holds Luncheon

Sunday, March 19th, marks the third in a series of lectures sponsored by Temple Beth Ahm. David J. Patterman's topic for the evening will be "People Which Lives... Sing". The voice of Cantor Patterman, permitting Cantor of the Park Avenue Synagogue in New

York City is known to millions of listeners through his participation as featured soloist on the "Eternal Light" radio program. While schooled under traditional cantorial-greats such as Roseblatt, Rovner, and Stron, he has been in the forefront of those setting progressive musical standards to meet the needs of the contemporary American synagogue. He was former director of the Department of Music of the United Synagogue, and founded the Cantor's Institute of the Jewish Theological Seminary.

This is the large platform that locomotives and railroad cars are driven onto so that they can be transferred from one set of tracks to another. To climax an exciting day, the boys were given the opportunity to run through a diesel locomotive while its big engines were running. 


