The Director of Welfare received \$100 more bringing salary to \$1,750; janitor service for administrative and executive functions will receive \$160 more, getting \$5,000. The director of the recreation commission received a pay boost of \$200. His salary is now \$6,700. The supervisor of the road department gets \$7,000, a \$250 raise; truck driver will get \$2.30 an hour instead of \$2.20 and laborer will get \$2.15 an hour, a 10-cent increase.

Playground leaders will receive the following salaries: five at \$15 a week; five at \$20 per week; one at \$25 per week; two at \$30 per week; an arts and crafts leader will receive \$500; special instructors for basketball season, men will get \$60; girls will get \$250. Maintenance men for recreation will receive \$2,770, a pay boost of \$1,620.
 For the board of health the salaries are as follows: secretary and registrar of vital statistics, \$825 per year; plumbing inspector, \$3100; health officer and sanitarian, \$3100; members attending meetings, \$2.00.

The budget also appropriates money for the traffic light installation at South Springfield and Hillside Avenues.
 Additional sanitary sewers are to be installed wherever needed. Some sites mentioned by Mayor Bonadire include Dundar Road, Mountain Avenue, South Springfield Avenue, and Baltusor Top. Improvements of curbs and streets in the Ruby and Diven areas are to be provided.
 The Township plans to continue its sidewalk program where there are school needs; it also plans to replace a fire engine with a new "pumper."
 All municipal employees will receive hospitalization. This new innovation is only for the employee and not his family.

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JDRHS Evaluated by Middle States Association

Easter Then and now

by The Rev. Lester P. Messerschmidt... Thirty-six hours after Christ died on the cross on Good Friday, His grave was empty. This took place almost two thousand years ago. Then there were some who believed this news. Then there were some who said, "It is not true!"... The Bible triumphantly declares: "Very early in the morning, on the first day of the week—the stone was rolled away from the door of the sepulchre—an angel said unto the women: 'He is not here! He is risen! Go—tell His disciples!'"... The truth of the matter is that his disciples did not believe at first that Jesus had actually arisen from the grave. But in less than six weeks after Easter Sunday they had seen him repeatedly. They were confessing to one another that Christ was indeed alive. Alive in a wonderful way—space and walls did not tie Him down or enclose Him. They saw Him and He came to them—alive and glorious, anywhere He chose to show Himself. Within a year of Easter they were preaching the Gospel of the Crucified and Risen Christ all over Palestine. then... That's how it was then. So it is today. There are those, and their number is great, who confessed belief, "The third day He rose again from the dead," and mean it with all their heart and mind. They know in whom they believe, today, just as the disciples knew then that they believed in a living Jesus who would never die again. Disciples then—disciples today. Are you one? You need not go to Jerusalem so that you can believe in the Resurrection. In fact, many people go there unbelieving. They come away the same way—they are unconvinced. Most of the people who live in Jerusalem today are not Christians at all. The place itself does not automatically produce faith in the Resurrection—in Easter, in the Risen One. The Word of the Resurrection, the profound yet simple story in our Bibles tells us the words of Jesus, the living Jesus: "Behold Me. Touch Me. I am not a spirit. I am with you always, till the end of the world." not for JESUS only... Easter is not for Jesus only. Jesus has conquered death by rising again. He has promised again, and again in the Bible that all men with risen resurrection to eternal life is for all who believe as the words and promises of God declare. Easter therefore becomes the celebration of that event which gives our lives an identity. The enlightened apostle found meaning in the truth of Easter. St. Paul puts it like this: "Now is Christ risen from the dead, and become the first fruits of them that slept... for as in Adam all die, even so in Christ shall all be made alive... and as we have borne the image of the earthy we shall also bear the image of the heavenly." (1 Corinthians 15:20, 22, 49) This is the meaning of Christian— the meaning which each generation has confessed for two thousand years. "Christ came that we might have life and that we might have it more abundantly." (John 10:10)
