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New Tax Form Must Be Filed By Businesses

Under the provisions of Chapter 51, Laws of 1960, a new local personal property tax return form must be filed by all owners of tangible personal property used in business. Used in business means, "used in any activity, transaction or privilege engaged in, conducted or exercised for gain or profit, or held for such use." The return form, designated PPT-1, "Return of Tangible Personal Property Used in Business," is to be used by corporations, partnerships, individuals, fiduciaries, and other entities to report all such property used in business during any part of the 12 month period which ended on January 31, 1961. The return must also be filed by all professional persons such as lawyers, physicians, dentists, accountants, etc.

The law requires the return to be filed in duplicate with the local assessor on or before May 1, 1961. The law also specifies a penalty of \$2 per day for late filing plus additional penalties for returns filed more than 3 months after the due date or for filing willfully false or fraudulent returns. However, no penalties or interest charges for late filing will be imposed with respect to any return filed in the assessor's office on or before June 15, 1961.

Returns must be filed with the assessor of each municipality in which taxable personal property used in business is located even though the owner may reside or have headquarters elsewhere. Local assessors are in the process of mailing the return forms and instructions to all known businesses in their municipalities. Failure to receive these forms, however, does not relieve a taxpayer from the responsibility of filing. The return forms and instructions are available at the office of all local assessors.

Committee Approves 4 Ordinances

The Springfield Township Committee approved four ordinances at their final hearing Tuesday night. The ordinances pertain to sewer lines, canvassing, truck equipment, and traffic light installation. Traffic signals will be installed at the intersection of South Springfield and Hillside Avenues at a cost of \$10,000. A sign stating "Signals Ahead" will be placed near the signal. A snow truck plus snow plow attachments, at a cost of \$10,000 will be purchased by the Township.

The canvassing and soliciting ordinance requires all persons who wish to canvass or solicit to register at the Police Department. He must present proper identification plus two photographs of himself to the police chief and must state the purpose of his business. The hours a person may canvass or solicit are between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. The person will be issued a registration certificate which must be in his possession while canvassing. He may not canvass or solicit on Sundays, before 9 a.m. or after 5 p.m.

Local organizations will be required to have their captain present a list of workers to the police chief. This ordinance is not aimed at local residents, but at those people who do not reside in town. Canvassers are one of the most troublesome problems to the police; it leaves the town susceptible to crime, a committee member stated. One case mentioned at the meeting was that a group of minors with no known homes were recently brought into police headquarters. This situation is what the township committee through the ordinance hopes to alleviate.

Sanitary sewers will be installed at the Baltusrol Top area at a cost of \$80,000. The streets involved in the installation are Dunder Road, Fernhill Road, Baltusrol Road, Sharon Road, High Point Road, Hilllands Avenue, South Springfield Avenue, and Mountain Avenue. They will be hooked up with the new South Side trunk. The cost will be borne by bonds and residents of the streets involved will be assessed.

Mayor Raps County Budget; Calls It Double-Taxation

Fire, Police Departments Pay Hikes Average \$300

The Springfield Township Committee introduced the 1961 salary ordinance at its Tuesday meeting. The police and fire departments received the largest increase in salaries; they average approximately \$300. Additional ranks have been created in both departments plus additional men which also accounts for more money being appropriated in this division.

Under the police department the chief receives \$500 more bringing him to \$8700; the captain, with an increase of \$380 is up to \$7,640; the lieutenant, \$340 more which brings him to \$7,290. The sergeant is up to \$6,760 with an increase of \$390; first class patrolman, \$300 more to \$6,300; second class patrolman, \$240 more to \$6000; third class patrolman, \$300 more to \$5,650; probationary officer, \$250 more to \$5,250.

Other status quo salaries are recreation house leader nights, \$2,080; clerk for board, \$750; legal for Board of Assessors, \$8,950; secretary, board of adjustment, \$800; stenographer in the engineer's office, \$3,850; secretary, civil defense, \$100; secretary, shade tree commission, \$400.

More increases are shown in the following departments and positions: building inspector, \$300 more to \$6,790; typist clerk in the Board of Tax Assessors, \$150 more to \$3,900; engineer, \$300 more to \$10,300; deputy tax collector, \$3,500; finance administrator, a new post, will receive \$500; assistant to engineer will receive \$300 more, bringing his salary to \$6,700; and the engineering assistant received a \$100 pay boost bringing the salary to \$4,700.

County Tax Rise Accounts For 1/3 Total Increase

Springfield's mayor rapped the County Board of Freeholders and their 1961-62 budget at the municipal budget hearing at the Township meeting Tuesday night. Mayor Vincent J. Bonadies, in discussing the 31 point rise in the county taxes for Springfield, stated that the Freeholders budget "contains the greatest breach of good faith ever."

He said the rise from 73 points in 1959-60 to 87 in 1961-62 is one-third of the total increase in the tax rate of Springfield. "This is quite unusual, a one-third increase, especially when one takes into consideration that this year the county rates have reached an all-time high. The present county budget shows a \$300,000 decrease in anticipated revenues which means five points to you, the residents of Springfield. You should be cognizant of this fact. Remembering this fact, I call the Freeholders' budget double taxation," emphatically stated Bonadies.

The Mayor went on to say that "it is a matter of political expediency. The County Freeholders want to build up a large reserve and then give the county a tax cut when the members are up for reelection."

Under local purpose tax, salary and wages appropriations show increases of approximately \$38,000 with most appropriations showing modest increases with the exception of the fire and police departments. These departments show an increase of \$90,000. This increase is due to an enlargement and the creation of new officer ranks in both departments, plus salary and wage boosts.

The appropriations for recreation show an increase of \$8,375; in 1960 \$7,460 was appropriated; in 1961, \$16,835. The increase will be used for the development of play areas; especially the installation of the new sanitary sewer, stated Daniel Lucy, committee member. Approximately \$200 will be used for the playground development. Mr. Lucy stressed the playgrounds have never really been developed to their fullest capacity; so the Township Committee decided to undertake a program of really developing them. Professional help will be sought to facilitate the program.

A resident in to audience asked where has \$11,000 gone which had been given to the Township by the Girl Scout. It was stated that the money, given 6 or 7 years ago, was chopped to pieces since the win Street playground which has years ago, is being used for the maintenance of the Recreation House on Mountain Avenue. Supplies are also bought with the money and the Girl Scouts meet in the House about \$2000 is left out of the \$11,000.

Increases are shown in insurance, \$8,100; garbage, \$2,000; and parks, \$8,375.

The Director of Welfare received \$100 more bringing salary to \$1,750; janitor service for administrative and executive functions will receive \$160 more, getting \$5,000. The director of the recreation commissioner received a pay boost of \$200. His salary is now \$6,700. The supervisor of the road department gets \$7,000, a \$250 raise; truck driver will get \$2.30 an hour instead of \$2.20 and laborer will get \$2.15 an hour, a 10-cent increase.

Playground leaders will receive the following salaries: five at \$15 a week; five at \$20 per week; one at \$25 per week; two at \$30 per week; an arts and crafts leader will receive \$500; special instructors for basketball season, men will get \$60; girls will get \$250. Maintenance men for recreation will receive \$2,770, a pay boost of \$1,620.
 For the board of health the salaries are as follows: secretary and registrar of vital statistics, \$825 per year; plumbing inspector, \$3100; health officer and sanitarian, \$3100; members attending meetings, \$2.00.

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
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JDRHS Evaluated by Middle States Association



Did the Council, prior to making its decision, consult with such respected and qualified people as the Board of Education of the Regional High School?



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
