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NJ Tax Law Effects Personal Property Used in Business

Secretary of the Board of Tax Assessors Wilbert Layng, Springfield, has announced that under the new state law, Chapter 51, Laws of 1960, all owners of personal property used in business within Springfield during any part of the twelve month period ending on January 1, 1961, must file a business personal property tax return.

The law also specifies a penalty of \$2 per day for late filing plus additional penalties for returns filed more than 9 months after the due date or for filing willfully false or fraudulent returns. However, no penalties or interest charges for late filing will be imposed with respect to any return filed in the assessor's office on or before June 15, 1961.

Compromise Reached on Happy Days

The Springfield Board of Health reached a compromise between the owners and operators of Happy Days Nursery School, 102 Salter Street, and the Salter Street residents.

The board extended the license of the school, granting its continued operation with the stipulations that it operate from September until June, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. and enroll only 24 children.

The previous license had stated the school could operate year-round from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. The school had been previously issued a 3-month conditional license January 1; the board wished to further study the situation taking in the wishes of the owners, Mr. and Mrs. Bert Bruder, and the Salter Street residents. The consensus of the board was that the license should be continued at the present level of 24 children in the school with the changed hours and months of operation.

A delegation from Salter Street contended they had kept a surveillance of the nursery school and found that more than 24 children were attending. They complained the school disrupted their home schedules and infringed on property rights. The board stated it had had the nursery school studied by sanitarians, the building inspector, and the fire department. They stated they had found no such situation as cited by the street residents.

Daniel Lucey, board member, stated that "it was a well-run school and that while under constant supervision by the board it never found more children than should have been in attendance."

State, Local Candidates Give Views at GOP Meeting

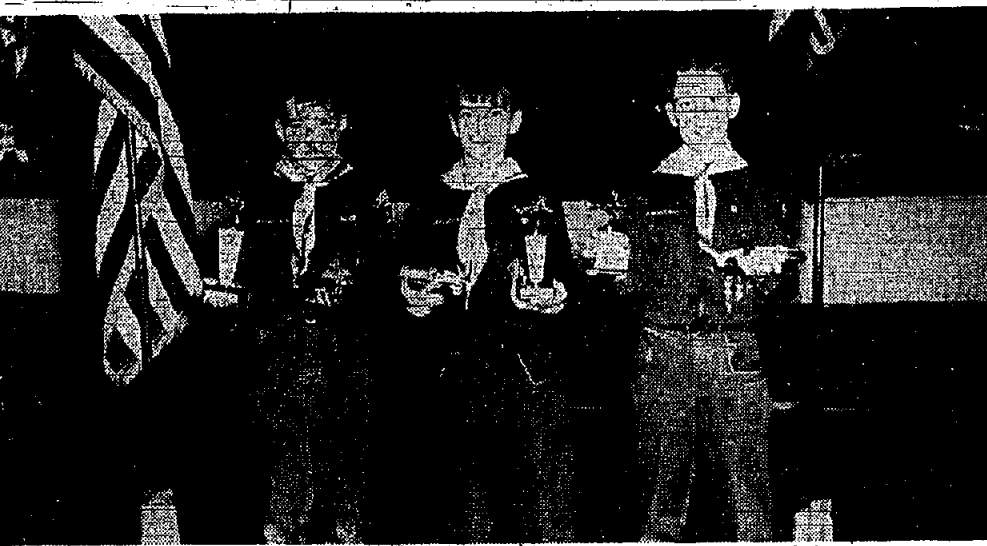

A total of twelve pints of blood were needed by Mr. and Mrs. Bouvois. Because members of the family lived in Essex County the blood was made available through the Essex County Blood Bank. All but the five remaining pints have been replaced by relatives, but Springfield's help is needed now.

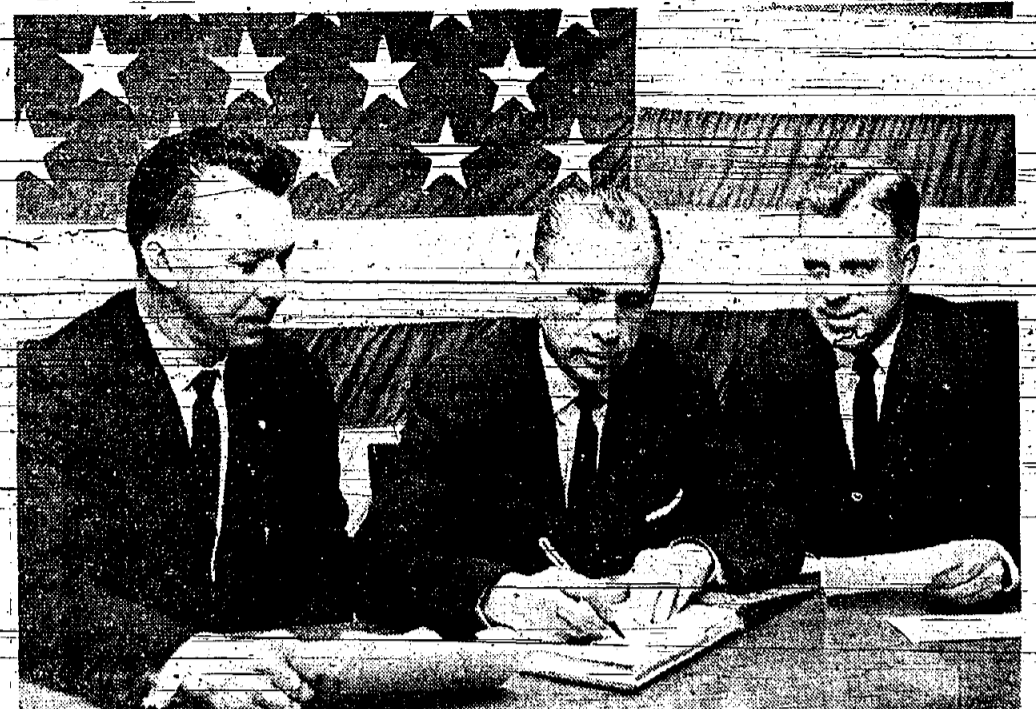

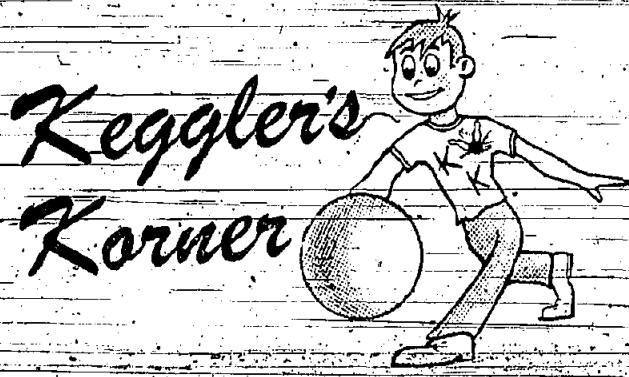

Dr. Christian Will Speak At Boro Church



The eggs may not be "for real," but the book tips are accurate and fascinating. In "How to Read a Rabbit," by Jean Fritz, Stephen thought an Animal Lending Library would be nice - a place where animals could take out books. But somehow the plot changed, as plots have a way of doing in children's books, and it turned out that this library loan animals to children instead of books. Camp Kilmer Site For Peace Corps Training School

James P. Mitchell, candidate for Republican nomination for governor, has announced the use of Camp Kilmer as the site of a training school for the Federal government's new Peace Corps.

"The camp is located on railroad lines, highways and bus routes leading to principal cities and points of embarkation for foreign duty. It should be considered and I am confident that the suggestion is adopted, the state will gain much in additional employment and economic activity and the whole middle Atlantic area will be the gainer for the presence of these public-spirited young men and women."

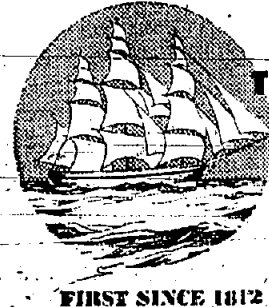

TAKING CARE OF YOUR GARDEN

By Edward A. Cardinal

Q: Can I apply crabgrass control to the same area as I apply fertilizer?

A: Pre-emergence chemicals should be the final application. Fertilize first and crabgrass control second. Remember, they form a barrier that prevents the crabgrass from growing beyond the germination period. If this barrier is broken by digging or raking, you will not get the full benefit.

Q: There are so many new pre-emergence crabgrass chemicals on the market that I am totally confused as to the proper one. What should I use?

A: All of these products have merit. However, some can cause serious injury to the fence grasses, others can not be applied at the same time you seed the lawn without danger of killing the newly sown seed. So be careful which one you choose. Ask your supplier to recommend the proper one for your particular condition. Our garden center carries ten different brands, but only three have been on the market long enough to deem safe to use. I would hesitate to name them in this column as I might appear prejudiced. Select one that carries a reliable warranty.

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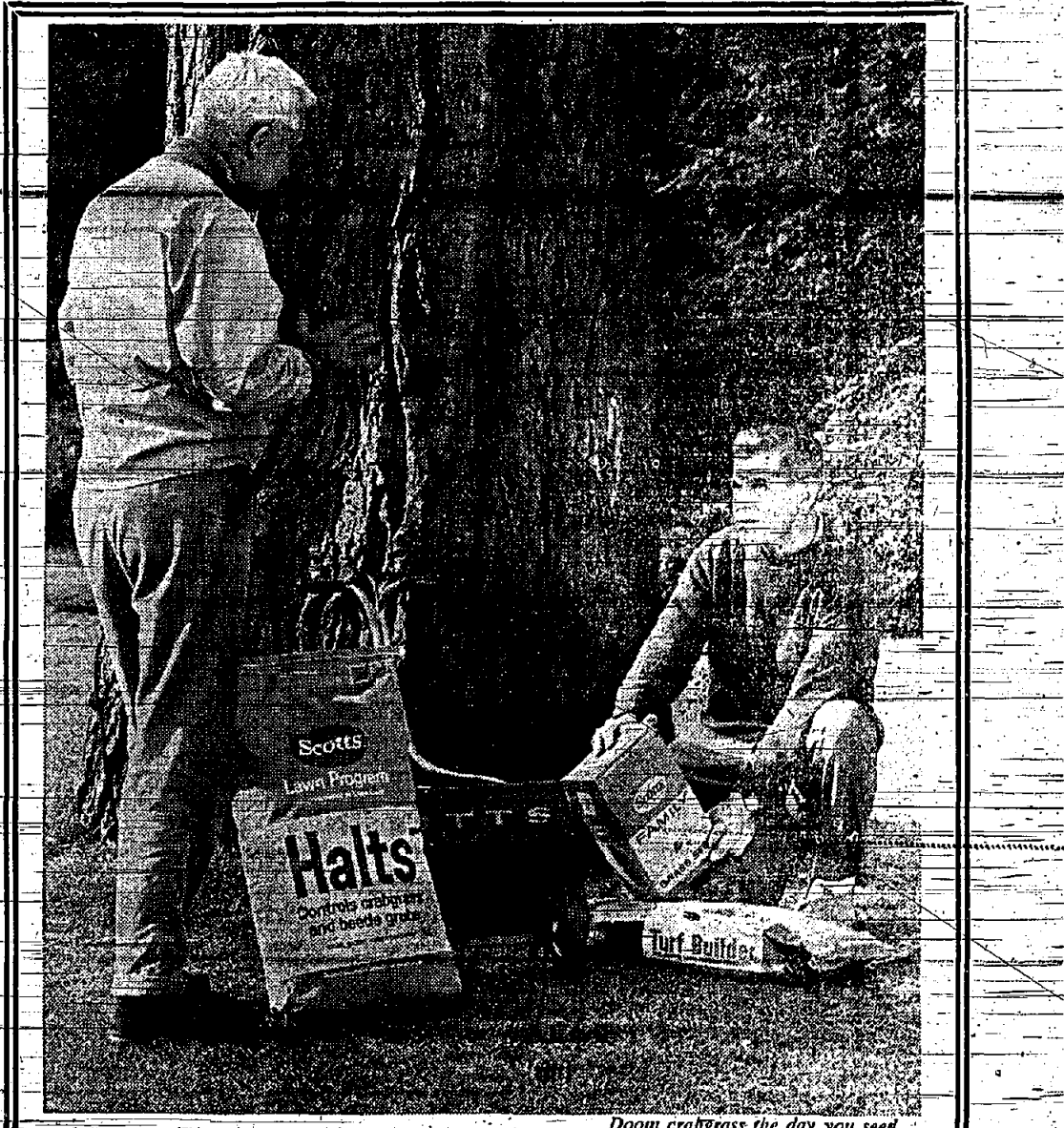
