## Cardinal Application Rejected

### Hardgrove, Falkin, Braun Pledge Community Service

### Bid for Baltusrol Sewers Union Firm Submits Low

The Regular Republican candidates for Township Committee and tax collector posts, promise a vigorous campaign "based solely on the issues at hand and the many improvements that can be made in Springfield." Arthur M. Falkin and Robert D. Hardgrove are running for Township committee and Fred Braun is seeking the tax collector post. The candidates today, issued statements prior to the Primary elections on Tuesday, April 18.

"As the endorsed candidate of the Republican Party Policy Committee I gladly accept the opportunity to run for a seat on the Township Committee in the April 18th primary. It is my intention to pursue a vigorous campaign based solely on the issues at hand and the many improvements that can be made in our community."

"I qualify your vote would be much appreciated on April 18th. All three candidates urged all the entitled voters to express their choices on primary day, April 18. Not only is the local campaign of particular interest but a hotly contested battle for the gubernatorial nomination as well as contests of the County and State level is adding a great deal of excitement to this year's primary."

Township Committee Tuesday unanimously rejected a recommendation of the Board of Adjustment to grant a variance for the construction of a retail store on the nursery property of Edward A. Cardinal at 280 Milltown Road. The application had been made by Joseph Wilf, builder for the proposed store. Township Committeeman William Balentine did not attend the meeting.

Committeeman Daniel M. Lucy said that the application had been carefully reviewed by the board. The board was advised, he said, by Mr. Michael Pissero, an attorney serving Tuesday in the absence of Township Attorney Irwin Weinberg, who is hospitalized, that the variance was for a "new use and not the continuance of a non-conforming operation." The question was whether or not to grant a variance for a new use, he said. Committee Chairman Vincent J. Bonadies pointed out that there has been "argumentation on both sides." He said that the record was complete and added that last night's meeting was not a public hearing on the subject.

Speaking briefly on his own behalf, Mr. Cardinal said that the business had been in operation a number of years. Another resident living in the proposed area claimed that the property was formerly a chicken farm and shrubbery had not been grown there prior to 1948. Citing the volume of business conducted on the site, another questioned whether the business was retail or wholesale.

The Board of Adjustment had granted the variance with a nine-point provision requiring the following: only one driveway, 25 feet in width; installation of sign according to the zoning ordinance; proper drainage with elimination of mosquito hazard, to be used solely as a garden center, plants suited for residential purposes, fencing as designated by board, non-blasting lights, hours from 7 A.M. to 9 P.M., and no incoming deliveries on Sunday. The Board of Adjustment's hearing on the application was held Feb. 23.

J. and C. ## Collection of Delinquent Taxes Surpass '61 Total

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## Primary Here Is Best Kept Secret Of '61

Springfield's participation in next Tuesday's primary election is one of the best kept secrets of the year. Especially since there are contests on the local level for both the Republicans and Democrats.

The regular GOP organization has endorsed Arthur M. Falkin and Robert Hardgrove to run for the two places on the Township governing body against Democratic nominees in November. Mr. Howard S. Smith, president of the Springfield Board of Education, also wants to be one of the candidates.

"On the Democratic side, the two endorsed candidates for the two Township Committee spots will have no opposition in Tuesday's primary. They are Richard M. Sullivan and Peter Finerney who are saving all their political fire for the general election.

Mrs. Tessie Jones, present Collector of Taxes, has been endorsed by the Springfield Democrats for election to that office in November. "My many years of experience in both the banking and real estate fields will qualify me for this important post."

"Having lived in Springfield for 24 years I feel that I can give the kind of service that the taxpayers of our community deserve and I intend to devote my full time to the position."

"A question that has been directed to me in recent weeks is 'Why are you running for the Township Committee?' Perhaps by answering this query every one will understand why I am in this primary race as a Republican."

"First and foremost is a desire to be of service to the community which has been my home for the past ten years. My wife, Hazel, and myself have a very deep feeling for Springfield which is expressed in our desire to see our community be referred to as 'Our Town' by every one of its residents."

"Of course, the desire to serve does not guarantee the opportunity. The opportunity did present itself when the Republican Party inquired as to my interest in a candidacy. A thorough investigation of the conditions under which an elected Republican functions proved to be sufficiently broad so that I may fully utilize my knowledge and talent for the betterment of Springfield. This was a most important assurance before consent could be given to undertake the responsibility the voter would place in me by his vote. Also as part of my responsibility to the voter, I bring experience from actively in many organizations and civic groups plus the experience gained as a graduate engineer."

## Township To Learn Exact Rt. 78 Alignment Next Week

Springfield officials are expected within the next few days from the State Highway Department indicating approval on the final alignment of Interstate Route 78 as it goes through the Township.

The Highway Department, this week, released news that the Federal Bureau of Public Roads has approved the 7.6 mile section of the new highway as it runs through Essex and Union Counties up to the Springfield line.

In a telephone conversation with the State Highway Department in Trenton, the Sun was informed that definite information would be sent to Springfield on the exact alignment of the new Route 78 in time for next week's issue.

The Highway Department officials also stated there would probably be some work on the widening of Morris Avenue which carries with it the covering up of the exposed trolley tracks.

Municipal officers in Hillside and Union are angered by the announcement that the Highway Department has adopted the most southerly route of three alternate plans for the Route 78 freeway.

Since Springfield has never been able to officially submit an alternate route it is assumed that the first alignment as shown at the public hearing by the Highway Department will be the only one to be considered by the Federal Bureau of Public Roads.

Complete information is expected from Trenton in time for next week's issue. The 7.6 mile section runs through portions of Newark in Essex County and Hillside and Union in Union County, generally serving the same traffic pattern as existing Route 22.

At the western end of the section, the Federal Bureau of Public Roads approved the southernmost of three alternate alignments discussed at a public hearing last summer. Going east the approved alignment runs south of and roughly parallel to the Essex-Union county line until curving north.

## Red-Cross Canteen, Motor Corps, Another Local Chapter Service

The Springfield Chapter of the American Red Cross has an active Canteen Committee which serves the community in many ways. Under the leadership of Mrs. George Walton, Canteen Chairman, these ladies aid in boosting the morale of the patients at the East Orange Veterans Hospital.

They annually give two large teas for the patients where their smiles and interest in the men are as important as the homemade refreshments they provide. Throughout the year, they bake birthday cakes which they deliver to make these special days memorable party occasions to the individuals, and at other times they give ward parties for patients. The Canteen serves refreshments at the annual meeting of the local Chapter, and will be on hand to give coffee and refreshments to the donors at the Blood Mobile.

The Red Cross Canteen Committee participates in the Springfield Civil Defense exercises. The Canteen is responsible for organizing and carrying out the Mass Feeding phase of the Civil Defense program. Each of the Canteen Committees has been trained and certified in mass feeding and one of the members, Mrs. Evelyn Couch, is an authorized Red Cross instructor for the course.

Active in helping to set up the mobile kitchens are members of the Springfield Red Cross Motor Corp. Mrs. Carl Ledig heads this active group which in nine months has made 111 trips, traveled 1,823 miles, and accumulated three hundred hours of volunteer service.

Motor Corp. drivers have all taken a Red Cross orientation course and six of the drivers last week completed their required Standard First Aid Course. Springfield citizens will find these experienced drivers behind the wheel of the Chapter's station wagon almost every day of the week on errands to the veterans' hospital and transporting patients to various appointments for outpatient treatment. In the past nine months five trips have been taken to Lyons and 29 to East Orange-V.A. hospitals to take party favors and refreshments and to transport patients and Gray Lady volunteers. Trips have been taken to Jersey City, Newark and Summit for patient treatment. To children, cerebral palsy victims, fare transported weekly to Orthopedic Hospital for treatment, and one patient has been taken to the Plastic Eye Clinic in New York for several treatments. Numerous trips have been made to Orange Memorial and Overlook hospitals. These volunteers also deliver on loan the Red Cross freetier equipment to residents in need. A multi-height hospital bed, a wheel chair, the walker, and assorted smaller items such as bed pans are included in these deliveries.

## Moore Urges Citizens Cast Primary Vote

Richard "Dick" Moore, the Regular Democrat candidate for the office of Tax Collector, urged the citizens of Springfield to cast their vote in next Tuesday's Primary Election.

Based on past Primary Elections, it would seem that too many people leave the choice of candidates to a small minority of the registered voters. Since this is a gubernatorial year and there are 7 candidates seeking nomination from the two major parties, careful selection and a stronger show at the polls would have its effect even in Trenton.

"An Independent voter may cast his ballot for candidates of his choice from either of the two parties by signing a declaration at the Polls, designating the political party in whose Primary he desires to vote. Once he has established himself as a member of a given party by voting in its primary, he may not vote in the Primary of any other party until he has refrained from voting in two primaries. Nothing in the foregoing affects the secrecy of the ballot in the Primary nor his choice of any candidate at the General Election."

"I, therefore, urge all voters to exercise the privilege afforded by the Election Laws and vote for the candidates that they would like to see on November's ballot," ended Mr. Moore.

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

 Interstate Route 78, part of the 41,000 mile national defense highway system, eventually will extend from the Highland Tunnel across the State to Philadelphia

on the Delaware River opposite Easton, Penn.  
 The Highway Department's plans show the freeway's total length will be 45.2 miles and its total cost is estimated at more than \$306 million. The Federal Government will pay ninety per cent of the freeway's cost and the State ten per cent.  
 Three New Jersey sections of Route 78 are now open to traffic. Two built by the State Highway Department consist of a 2.7 mile, \$4.5 million section from Bloomsbury to Still Valley, in Hunterdon and Warren Counties, completed in October, 1958; another 2.8 mile, \$3.5 million section near Clinton, Hunterdon County, was completed in September, 1958.  
 The construction projects in the Bloomsbury area, and a demolition project in Springfield Township, Union County are now \$2.7 million.

JFK's Peace Corps Idea Not New to Wooster Collegian

Ghana - Country of Contrasts

A college student already one jump ahead of President John F. Kennedy's Peace Corps is Miss Donna Sweeney of 182 Meisel Avenue, Springfield. Home on vacation from College of Wooster, O., the 21-year old senior on April 5 told of her recent experiences in Africa at the Ladies Benevolent Society meeting in the parish house of First Presbyterian Church. Went Native - As one of 183 college "work-campers" under the auspices of the "Operation Crossroads" program, Miss Sweeney described her stay in Ghana, where she participated in the building of a three-room schoolhouse and a town hall. The project required her to carry cement on her head, a pick and shovel on her shoulder and water from a stream one quarter mile away. She also slept on mango boards and ate native food.

Giving the Ghanans the highest praise, Miss Sweeney emphasized their "complete racial equality" and commented on their warmth and hospitality. "They told us that we were free to go into any house without knocking and that is a real sign of friendship," she said. She also told of a native buying them oranges and peanuts and giving them coconuts to show his good-will and gratitude.

This experience has increased her interest in history, her college major, and she is planning on returning to Ghana this September to study "history of West Africa" at the University College there, where she has been accepted. On completion of this one-year course, she said that she will either return to this country to study for an M. A. degree or else teach in Ghana at the university.

The Operation Crossroads program was begun by Rev. James H. Robinson, D. D., a Presbyterian, so that Africans and Americans might understand one another better. It was thought

the best way to do this would be by living together in work and play. From some 800 applications, 183 Americans and Canadians of different faiths, from all sections of the country and from many colleges, were selected. Twenty-four negroes were included in the group.

Miss Sweeney explained that they received a one-week orientation course at Union Theological Seminary, New York, learning about both Africa and the United States. They were instructed on answering questions on American education and American churches and segregation and American labor problems. They took plane trips to London and Paris, where they talked to government officials responsible to colonial powers in Africa countries. The trip, costing each student \$875, was financed by her school, church and her personal savings. Transportation was furnished through a grant from Operation Crossroads.

Ghana, a country of contrasts, contains some of the most modern and most primitive conditions, Miss Sweeney said. Their first stop, Accra, the capital with some 300,000 people, has department stores with escalators and air conditioning. The group lived the first two weeks at the University College there, which has good accommodations with mahogany furniture, private patios and fluorescent lighting.

The first work camp was at a seacoast village where they worked with 25 Ghananian students in the erection of a schoolhouse. The day began at 6 A. M. and included a morning work program, an afternoon discussion period when they shared ideas about religion, politics and social customs and a social period in the early evening. This was followed by a 70-

day trip through Ghana, viewing the poorer areas. Final work project was the building of a town hall in a mountain village. The village people were expected to finish the building. The group had a brief tour of Europe before returning to New York for final interviews and sessions.

Each worker was commissioned to give a speech a week about his experiences in Africa for a one-year period and Miss Sweeney to date has addressed about 35 groups including schools and schuren and service organizations. She said that another work project is planned by Operations: Crossroads this summer with several additional African countries to be visited. Miss Sweeney, herself, has received a summer fellowship to the "Jane Addams Peace Association," a peace organization in New York. Her duties there during the summer months will be a study program consisting of research, clerical work and work at the U. N. building nearby.

Miss Sweeney, who is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William C. Sweeney and a 1957 Regional High School graduate, was introduced at the meeting by Mrs. Howard Heerwagen, program chairman. Mrs. Emil Meyer, antique show chairman, reported 3,000 persons attended the show on the first day. Announcement was made of the society's luncheon to be held May 3 at 1 p. m. at the King George Inn, Mt. Bethel. Mrs. Warren Halsey, president, said a church fellowship meeting will be held April 27 at 8 p. m. in the parish house and that the Pireside Group will present a play "That's Entertainment" April 15 and 16 in the

parish house. An executive board meeting is scheduled for April 19. A social with refreshments followed in the downstairs dining room.

Survival For 60's Library Exhibit Theme

"SURVIVAL FOR THE SIXTIES" is the theme of an exhibit of books and pamphlets sponsored by the Union County Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy. Now in the Springfield Public Library, the exhibit stresses the advantages of a nuclear test ban, problems of inspection, disarmament and the economic problems arising therefrom. The Geneva conference is considering these issues at present.

"The future of our children in a nuclear age is being spelled out by the decisions at Geneva," says Kenneth Stewart, Chairman of Union County Sane. "It is imperative that we understand the issues now."

SANE is offering three primers of basic information on the nuclear problem: "A Nuclear Test Ban Treaty Now," "Disarmament - What Kind - How Much," and "Economics of Disarmament."






