

Poppy Day Date Told

The American Legion Auxiliary announced today that 1961 Poppy Day will be observed in Springfield on Friday, May 26 and Saturday, May 27. Auxiliary Poppy Chairman Mrs. Alice Minlon said the annual observance is held to honor the more than 500,000 Americans who died, and the nearly 1,000,000 Americans who were wounded in both World Wars and the Korean conflict.

"Memorial puppets, made by disabled veterans of this country's past three wars, will be worn both as a memorial to our war dead, and as a tribute to the disabled," Mrs. Minlon said.

The American Legion Auxiliary said Poppy Day has one basic purpose - to provide a personal means of honoring the Nation's war dead. Volunteer workers from the Auxiliary and other groups have donated their time to hold this annual program.

Auxiliary officials said that although all funds received from Poppy Day go either to disabled veterans or their families, the main purpose of the observance is to honor America's war dead.

NJ State Highway Department Plans To Ease Rt. 22 Delays

The New Jersey State Highway Department today announced plans to ease traffic delays at the intersection of Springfield Road and the westbound roadway of Route U. S. 22 in Union County.

The Department advertised for bids May 11 on safety construction along Route U. S. 22 from the intersection of Springfield Road to the Garden State Parkway, about a mile to the east.

The Highway Department intends to replace the outer shoulder of westbound Route U. S. 22 with a concrete acceleration lane 13 feet wide, extending westerly from Springfield Road for 1,675 feet to a point opposite the existing opening in the center island which permits "U" turns to the highway's eastbound roadway.

The traffic light at Springfield Road will be shut off, so that southbound Springfield Road traffic can turn west on the new acceleration lane and gradually merge with traffic on the main highway without delays or interruption.

Southbound Springfield Road traffic wanting to travel east on U. S. 22 will have more than a quarter of a mile in which to open the main traffic lanes and use the "U" turn opening a similar "U" turn opening for eastbound traffic to cross the main traffic lanes to safety and will be eliminated.

The curve of the curbs will be eased and the adjacent shoulders widened in the areas of the intersection of Michigan and Jefferson Avenues with eastbound Route U. S. 22.

Another improvement will see the "U" turn from westbound to eastbound, located west of Hillside Avenue, reconstructed to include a long acceleration lane so that traffic can merge safely.

Concrete curbs will flank all widened sections.

This project is the latest in a continuing series aimed at increasing the safety of the highway.

Police Chief Recommends 35-mph Zone for Mountain, So. Springfield, Meisel Avenues

Springfield Township Committee Tuesday night recommended that Candeb, Fleissing and Associates of Newark, planning specialists, make a study as to the establishment of a municipal swimming pool within the near future.

Mayor Vincent J. Bonadies pointed out preliminary plans would reveal if the community want a pool plus indicating the needs and methods of financing and locations.

Sites Available

Mayor Bonadies explained Livingston has such a pool-financed by membership fees from \$35 to \$50 per family and is self-sustaining. Springfield in conjunction with the Recreation Commission and the Red Cross is currently spending \$1,200 yearly to transport local children to Rahway Pool, he said. The main objective of the survey would be to take advantage of the suitable sites for the pool, if the pool was found desirable, while the sites are still available.

As part of the Mayor's State of the Union message January 1, he outlined the enlargement and improvement of recreational facilities in town, particularly the construction of a municipal pool. The wheels are now being turned for these improvements.

\$22,000 Contract for Candeb

This contract Tuesday night was referred to Assistant Township Attorney Irving B. Johnson Jr. for further study. It was understood that the pool survey would be a part of the plan.

Mrs. Worthington, township clerk, was instructed to place this on the agenda for the next meeting. Application of Garden Inc., recommended by the Planning Board, for a subdivision of property in Sarrey Lane off Evergreen Avenue was granted.

Announcement was made that the state has presented an additional obstacle to the installation of a traffic light at the Hillside Avenue and South Springfield Avenue intersection and a conference on the subject would follow the committee meeting.

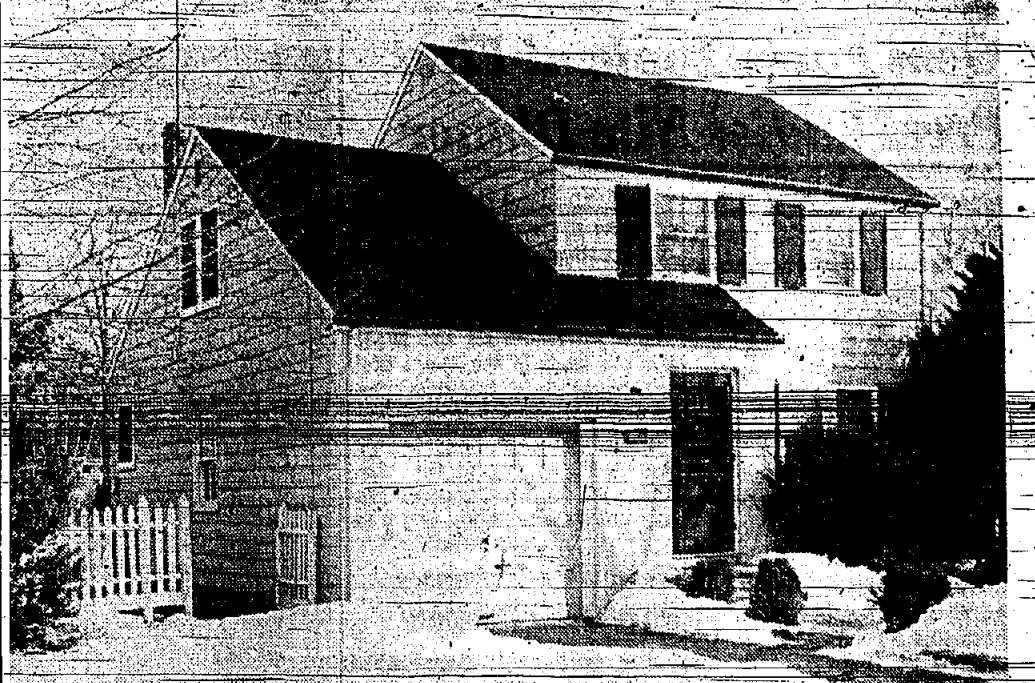

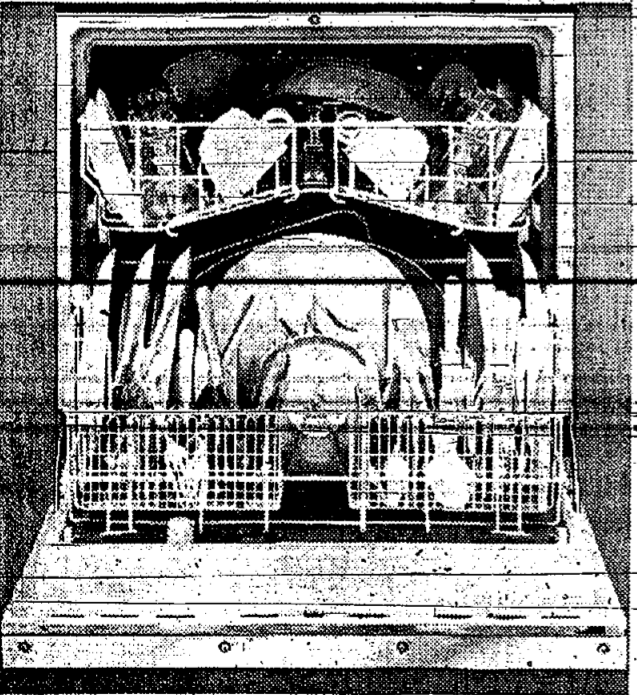
Miss Marion Olson has been appointed to be our new speech therapist, replacing Mrs. Rochelle Zimoff, who has resigned effective at the end of this school year.

We are participating in a group to further strengthen our mathematics program in our schools. The plan would call for incorporation of ideas coming out of a study made through the University of Maryland.

The structure of the various number systems is emphasized, and understanding of the basic properties of numbers takes a central place. In this way it is possible to find several unifying concepts which make for simplification of ideas and, it is hoped, a better understanding of mathematical processes. In addition, a foundation for more advanced work in mathematics is being laid. Applications and practice in computation are regarded as very important, but are brought into the course as practice material and do illustrate the basic ideas rather than as primary ends in themselves.

Scheff Talks On Stony Hill Play

The gray house at 22 Fern Way stood on the woods and framed a lovely blooming magnolia tree in the back yard. The roads of Free Acres wind around many small cottages set in their own portion of woods, one of which is the gray house belonging to Fred Scheff, longtime director of the Stony Hill Players and now directing their spring production, "Born Yesterday."

One enters a pine paneled room with a large drawing table underneath a big window on the right and faces a fireplace over which hangs a picture of Fred's wife. Bookcases and a record player are in evidence. One is surrounded by the paintings of this commercial and non-commercial illustrator; landscapes, portraits, and others. We walked through this comfortable six-room house, fitted out with dark room for developing photography; and then settled down on the couch for the interview.

"Today there is not a great deal of difference between an amateur and professional show, with certain reservations," Fred began, "there are certainly many people who see more amateur shows than professional ones. The public is looking for amusement, and the amateur performers are well able to provide this to them. The amateur theater is nation-wide, almost world-wide. In New Jersey alone there are over 100 amateur groups, over 90 of which belong to the N. J. Theater League. Most states have theater leagues which occasionally meet at conventions. Today amateur theater has advanced to the point where it is not ashamed to perform before an intelligent audience. I feel that the public we (the Stony Hill Players) have had during all these years has a judgement, culturally and intellectually, of a high standing; and I appreciate their reactions."

Fred went on to say that an amateur group has many handicaps which a professional group does not have and so should not be judged in comparison with the professional theater. An amateur group does not have the financial means for scenery and lighting which is often instrumental in establishing the mood of a play. The group must select a cast from their own members. They do not have the whole nation from which to choose the person who looks and can act the part as does the professional theater. Fred felt that often critics of the amateur theater do not consider the conditions from which the play was brought forth. "A review in the press of an amateur show must be based upon an acquaintance with the development of the show in rehearsal in order to appreciate what has been done by the players and directors. Furthermore, a review of such a show is the opinion of the reviewer only and by no means in accordance with the general reception of the public." He felt, however, that a reviewer should criticize; that criticism is helpful to an amateur group.

Fred spoke of the leads in "Born Yesterday," the production to be held on May 29th and 30th at the Governor Livingston Auditorium. "Brook," he said, "is one hundred percent man, unscrupulous and money mad; Billie is absolutely unsophisticated, natural with a background of no education. Paul is the intellectual egghead and at the same time considerate with a passion for social understanding, and Devry is a Harvard lawyer, degraded by liquor."

As for future productions Fred Scheff had this to say: "It is my conviction that the Berkeley Heights public would appreciate the presentation of good drama as a means of appreciating comedy, and since an amateur group does not exist to make profit, but is active in the field of the theater entirely for the love of it; it does not need to consider the commercial angle." He mentioned that the Stony Hill Players' production of Ibsen's "The Doll's House" drew a larger crowd than any other. Serious dramas which Fred would like to produce are "The Crucible," "Death of a Salesman," "Picnic," "Streetcar Named Desire," "Hedda Gabler" or "The Wild Duck," or "The Shrike."

Industry Needs Trained Manpower

This is the first in a series of three articles on the need for a vocational-technical school system in Union County. The articles are based on information supplied to the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders by the Board of Education of the Union County Vocational and Technical Schools.

A vocational-technical educational program will benefit all residents of Union County... Mr. Baxel, director of the Union County Vocational and Technical Schools, said in a report submitted to the Union County Board of Freeholders.

An important fact to remember is that trained manpower holds industry and helps it to prosper. Trained manpower also attracts new industry. Certainly Union County knows that prosperous industry creates a prosperous community in terms of taxables, services and salaries.

The director said it is recognized that not all districts in the county would directly participate equally in a vocational-technical educational program.

Mr. Baxel said: "There are values to be considered, however, other than the formal education."

Some young people regardless of their residence are not interested in the general high school and may become low wage earners, delinquents or even charges on the county. Everyone pays for this.

All education is vital to the welfare and strength of our economy, but vocational-technical education represents a direct investment. Anything which increases the earning power of the individual ultimately helps the entire community.
