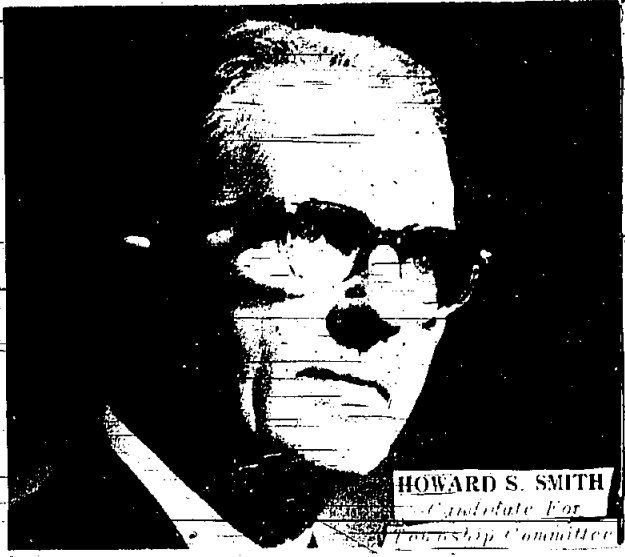

Smith-Ceithaml Say

Challenge For Debate Is "Phony"

In urging voter support for the election to the Township Committee on November 6th of Howard Smith and Louis Ceithaml, Howard S. Smith today issued the following statement:

"I think it is necessary for me at this time to answer a baseless charge made by my opponents in the current campaign. They have stated that I am boss controlled. This comment is typical of the political nonsense, smear and mud slinging the voters of Springfield have been subjected to by my opponents since the campaign started.

"During my 48 years of residence in Springfield and 17 years of public service on the Board of Education I have had differences with many people and have been subject to my share of criticism. But never has anyone dared to accuse me of being bossed or controlled, and my opponents and those who tell them what to do, above all others, know this is true.

WHY NOT BE BOSSSED? IN FACT, BECAUSE I will not be bossed is the reason I am a Democratic candidate for the Township Committee.

"In the Spring of 1961 I was approached by the real bosses of the Republican party. Among them was Max Sherman and Philip Del Vecchio. Mr. Sherman was former Township Attorney and now one of the brother owners of Springmount Developers.

"They assured me with my background of public service to Springfield as a member of the Board of Education and as its president, I would be a qualified and good candidate for the Township Committee.

"They stated, however that there were conditions to my being named a Republican candidate. THE CONDITIONS were that they would run my campaign, issue statements in my name without seeking my approval, and, when elected, I was to do as I was told.

"I, absolutely, refused them, as I will always refuse a deal of that kind. I was so angry at a proposition of that kind that I challenged the bosses to a fair and open primary. It wasn't fair and it wasn't open, but that's water over the dam.

With the Same Strings "To those who would say sour grapes, I was again approached by the Republican party prior to the primary in 1962, to be one of their candidates as Del Vecchio's running mate.

"The strings and conditions were still part of the offer so I again refused. The local Democratic party also asked me to be a candidate for the Township Committee. They discussed with me their aims and objectives for the Township of Springfield. They asked of me, one thing, which I did not promise to give, dedication of service to the people of Springfield. Nothing else was asked and I, of course, accepted.

"I think I have something to offer the people of Springfield; I think the only way open to those who care about Springfield, the only way to restore faith and trust in the government in Springfield is to elect Louis Ceithaml and myself to the Township Committee. Together we can bring back good government to Springfield, that is our mission and our hope.

"I urge my Republican, Democratic and Independent supporters and friends to work for and vote for the cause of good government by electing on November 6th both Howard S. Smith and Louis F. Ceithaml," the statement ended.

Administration "Disgraced Township," Smith, Ceithaml

Howard Smith and Louis Ceithaml, Democratic candidates for the Township Committee, stated today that "the Township of Springfield has been disgraced and disgraced by the recent scandalous actions of the opposing candidate, Philip Del Vecchio.

"On Tuesday, November 6th, judgment will be rendered by the people of Springfield and we are certain that the residents of the Township will not accept or approve the breach of trust by Del Vecchio's administration in deliberately altering the official minutes of the Township of Springfield," the statement continued.

"The facts disclose that the altering of minutes was for the purpose of attempting a conspiracy of the Springmount Sewer District and the voters of Springfield are entitled to know what took place.

"On September 25, 1962 at a public meeting, Del Vecchio guaranteed and promised the people of Springfield that the Sherman brothers, the developers of Springmount, would be responsible for the maintenance, insurance, and dangerous conditions brought about by the open sewer ditch.

Howard Smith and Louis Ceithaml, Democratic candidates for Township Committee stated their opponents demand for public debate was as phony as the political promises made by their opponents in 1961.

Smith and Ceithaml stated, "We will gladly enter into a debate with our opponents when they publicly admit that not one single solitary promise made in 1961 to the people of Springfield has been kept.

"When our opponents admit that the tax rise of 1962, despite lower school costs, has been brought about by inefficiency and ineptness.

"When our opponents admit that promises of action for people in the path of Route 78 was used for exploitation of those people and not one solitary thing was done.

"When our opponents admit that the official minutes of the Township of Springfield were altered to cover up the Springmount mess.

"When our opponents admit that the Township of Springfield has missed out on Green Acre Funds because of ineptness.

"When our opponents admit that our Recreation department budget was cut despite the need for additional programs and facilities.

"When our opponents admit that approval of open sewer ditches is a political pay-off to private developers.

"When our opponents admit that the Springmount open sewer ditch will cost the taxpayers \$125,000.

"When our opponents admit and reveal who is pulling the strings in the Town Hall," the statement continued.

Howard Smith and Louis Ceithaml further stated, "these are the issues before the voters of Springfield," and our opponents have had ample opportunity to answer and explain, and their

people of Springfield have been subjected to and exposed to the rawest abuse of power ever exhibited in Springfield's history.

The choice of words in a newspaper headline is always subject to mechanical measurements and count of type characters. There is also a matter of semantics and, given enough time, some other and less harsh words might have been selected. However, there was no accusation against any specific member of the Township Committee. We did not intend to "impugn the integrity of any municipal official."

Mayor Demands Retraction On 'Minutes' Head

Editor, Sun: Your headline in the issue of Oct. 11, 1962 of the Springfield Sun, "Admit Altering Minutes," referring to alleged changes to the minutes of the Township Committee meeting of Sept. 24, 1962, is libelous and impugns the integrity of many dedicated Municipal officials.

I demand, in their behalf and mine, that a retraction of this headline and all its implications be made with equal prominence in the next issue of the Sun.

A chronological and factual review of the libelous statements of Mr. Bonadies, will prove their falsity. At the Township Committee meeting of Sept. 24, 1962 Mr. Arthur Falkin, originally moved for approval of the Springmount Development, with the stipulation that the developer bear at his own cost, the construction of a retention basin to contain the storm water flow from the mountain-top.

Since Mr. Bonadies objected to the inclusion of this provision, without first studying the contents of the agreement between the Township and Springmount Golf Club, for an easement on which to locate the retention basin, Mr. Falkin amended his motion to include only the construction of the basin by the developer.

At the next executive-session of Oct. 8, 1962, Mr. Bonadies, after examining the draft of these minutes, objected to a reference to the developer bearing the cost of the building of the retention basin at no cost to the town, which he said was not included in the amended motion of Mr. Falkin on Sept. 24th. Mr. Bonadies requested that the Clerk contact Mr. Falkin and rewrite this paragraph of the next morning, and present the corrected draft to the Committee, on Oct. 9th, next regular Tuesday night meeting to Mr. Bonadies, at 8:00 P.M.

The motion was then presented to Mr. Bonadies, at 8:00 P.M. before this meeting and he said they were okay. Yet Mr. Bonadies, who agreed to the changes, refused to sign the minutes on their formal acceptance and cried "Alteration" although the minutes were not then approved.

Prior to the approval of the Township Committee, the minutes of a prior meeting may be corrected and revised in order that the minutes may properly reflect what the action or motion of this Township Committee actually intended. Legally, minutes cannot be altered until they are approved and signed by the Township Committee.

Under these circumstances, I feel you owe it to the public, as the official newspaper of the Township, to present the facts squarely, and explain to the public that there was, in fact, no alteration or tampering of any official minutes, as your unfortunate headline implies.

Blames Tax Rise On Democrats

At a meeting of the Women's Committee for the election of Del Vecchio and Catapano, Mayor Philip Del Vecchio placed the responsibility for the 1962 tax increase squarely on the shoulders of the previous Democratic administration. "The failure of the Bonadies administration, to adopt sound fiscal policies, is the true cause of the tax increase which was saddled upon the 1962 Township Committee," said Del Vecchio.

"THE DEPLETION of the Township surplus fund, and the over-spending of the 1961 budget, were directly responsible for the increase in the Local Purpose Tax, Three factors, coupled with increases in Regional High School and County budgets, over which local government has no control, dictated the present tax rate," continued Del Vecchio.

"The half-truths of the Democratic candidates are intended to conceal from the voter the fact that from 1957-1961, under Democratic rule, the tax rate went up every year from \$5.35 to \$5.94 - an increase of 59 points. The taxes in 1959 were \$5.35. The taxes in 1960 were \$5.53. The taxes in 1961 were \$5.94. Even with this increase, the previous Democratic administration bequeathed to up their

unpaid bills and a depleted bank balance," Del Vecchio continued. "BECAUSE OF THE depletion of the surplus by the Democratic administration, there was available to us for budgetary purposes, \$77,000 less that could be utilized. This differential alone accounts for over 15 points in the tax rate, since approximately \$5,000.00 represents 1 point in the tax rate. The over-expenditures of the 1961 administration, which had to be provided for in our 1962 budget, cost the taxpayer three points, since the deficit amounted to \$14,689.27. The Democrats failure to grant senior Citizens over 65 years of age, their lawful exemption in real estate taxes in 1961, also burdened this years budget with an additional tax point of \$5,476.68."

"The total impact of these failures accounted entirely for the local purpose increase of 19 points. The 1961 Democratic Committee is solely responsible for the increase in the 1962 Municipal Purpose Tax rate.

"The election of Mike Catapano, a Certified Public Accountant, and myself, to the Township committee, will insure Springfield sound financial planning," concluded Mayor Del Vecchio.

Catapano Decries "Gutter" Politics

"Mike" Catapano, Candidate for Township Committee, today decried "the campaign of personal vilification, half-truths, and innuendoes being waged by Ceithaml and Smith, Democratic Candidates for Township Committee" Bonadies and his political enemies.

"Their all-out unrestrained efforts to restore a political dynasty which was rejected by the people last year, is a shocking disgrace to the moral fiber of Springfieldites.

"Many of our townspeople he continued have confided in me a sickening feeling and dismay at the campaign being conducted by the Democratic candidates. They have told me that they resent the character assassination tactics of my political opponents which they feel hardly qualifies them as candidates for public office.

"This mud-slinging is the reason many qualified and sincere men who would welcome the opportunity to serve their community shy from the political arena. A man hesitates to sacrifice the honor and reputation he has built over many years when he sees the manner in which a political battle, such as this, is

Mayor Philip Del Vecchio repeated his challenge to debate to his opponents who have remained silent on the topic of debate.

Mayor Del Vecchio cited the record of accomplishments of the 1962 administration with pride and asked the public to decide which candidates are most qualified to serve Springfield.

"This year is a year of accomplishment," Del Vecchio continued. "We had the following major accomplishments to date:

Encouragement of industry's industrial tract location in Springfield; 6. Approval of drive-in bank; 7. Collection of back taxes increased; 8. Increased police and fire protection; 9. Recreational survey of Springfield; 10. Separate attorneys for court and boards in order to avoid conflicts-of-interest with a saving to the taxpayers; 11. Activation of Industrial-Committee with direction and budget to show accomplishment; 12. Biggest industrial boom; 13. Procurement of land from Baltusrol Golf Club for Township use. Makes possible the development of the entire side of the mountain; 14. Started Urban Development Program; 15. Recommended fluoridation of water to other users of Commonweath Water Company water; 16. Changed Town Hall hours from 9:00 a.m. starting time to 8:30 a.m.; 17. Upgraded land areas by use of Township property; 18. Additional Blue Cross benefits for Township employees, effective October 1, 1962; 19. Obtain needed land for Municipal uses; 20. New fee schedules; and 21. Bring up-to-date the Zoning and Planning Ordinances."

## 153 Donors Respond For Blood Bank

The Springfield Chapter of the American Red Cross held its second successful bloodmobile visit on Monday, October 15 at the Presbyterian Parish House and 128 productive pints were collected from the 153 donors reporting to the bloodmobile.

Over 200 persons had registered to give blood at this visit, but because of colds or business reasons 50 of these potential donors were unable to keep their appointments.

Those who could not show on Monday promised to donate blood in the Spring during the March bloodmobile visit, announced Henry S. Wright, Blood Bank chairman.

A complete list of donors will appear in an early issue of the SUN.

Mrs. Harry Quinzel, 13 South Trivet, Captain of the volunteer workers lauded the efforts of the 68 volunteers who gave a total of 235 hours of service during the day.

Assisting Mrs. Quinzel in organizing the work committees were Jeannette Lizerman who supervised the volunteer Registered Nurses; Mrs. William F. Valois, Motor Corp Chairman; Mrs. Roland Nye, head of the Canteen and Canteen-aides; and Otto Furst, Captain of the Springfield First Aid Squad crews who were on hand throughout the day.

Mr. Wright expressed appreciation to the Presbyterian Church for extending the use of its excellent facilities to the Bloodmobile headquarters, the spacious room—well equipped kitchen, and nicely appointed nursery facilities for small children of donors, and the cooperation of the church staff and members contributed greatly to the smoothly running procedure of the day.

Of special interest were the designated donations of 10 blood credits by donors who came from Plainfield to take advantage of the availability of the bloodmobile serving the area. As the Springfield Blood Bank is part of the N.Y.—Regional Red Cross Program, any donor in the area may contribute blood at any bloodmobile visit and designate the credits to a special account.

The national exchange of credits throughout the 54 regions of the American Red Cross Blood Bank operates on both a pre-arrangement and replacement basis to either build up reserves to prepare for emergencies or to replace specific quantities used.

## GOP Chairman Baldwin Replies To Bonadies

Walter W. Baldwin, Chairman of the Springfield County Republican Committee has issued a statement regarding the charges of "bossism" in the present political campaign which follows:

"On Sunday October 14, 1962, at a regular constituted meeting of the Springfield Republican County Committee, I have been authorized by unanimous vote of the Committee to take exception to an obvious untruth contained in an article under the headline 'BONADIES RIPS MAYOR: CHARGES MANY BIG LIES,' printed in the Springfield Sun on Thursday, October 11, 1962.

The specific paragraph we take issue with is paragraph number 5 on page 2, to wit: Mr. Del Vecchio, not I, stands accused of Bossism. It was he who hand-picked his running mate single-handed over the protests of all members of the Republican County Committee without a primary vote.

"NOTHING COULD BE FURTHER FROM THE TRUTH! Mr. Bonadies SHOULD KNOW that Dean Widmer was the duly elected running mate of Mr. Del Vecchio, both having been elected in the primary election.

2. Mr. Widmer had to withdraw his candidacy due to ill health.

3. That the Republican County Committee of Springfield has the duty as outlined and stated in Title 19 of the State Statute on Election Laws, to certify a replacement candidate in the event a vacancy occurs after the primary election has been held.

4. We are at a loss to know what possible angle Mr. Bonadies could have in charging that Mr. Mike Catapano was chosen over the protest of myself and the County Committee where, in fact, Mike Catapano was the unanimous choice of the full committee as can be attested to by the minutes of the June 15, 1962 meeting.

5. The Springfield County Committee again voiced their complete and unqualified endorsement of both Mayor Del Vecchio

and Mike Catapano and urged all voters to study and compare the qualifications of these men, believing we have honestly presented to the voters the two finest candidates for their support and consideration.

6. It is with no small measure of pride that I take this opportunity to point out to Mr. Bonadies that it is a matter of official record that I am still the Municipal Chairman of the Springfield Republican Committee—and that we, of the Republican County Committee, pride ourselves in rejecting any and all types of Bossism. To paraphrase Mr. Shakespeare, Mr. Bonadies, we think thou doth protest too much."

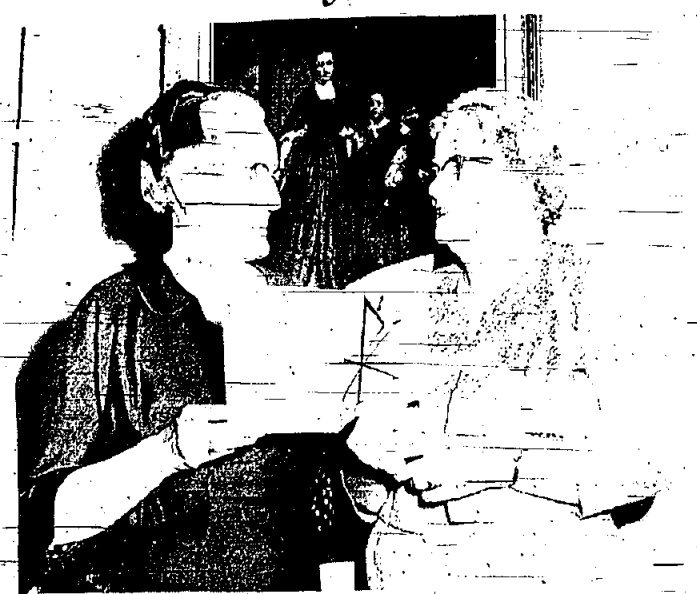
mination for public office is the qualification of the man and his character. We have nothing to hide and our qualifications speak for themselves.

### SCIENCE NOTEBOOK

BY HANS KLEIN  
UNION COUNTY REGIONAL HIGH SCHOOLS

In an age of scientific materialism psychology as a science hovers ambiguously on the fringes of the spot light. Walls of demarcation that in the recent past sharply differentiated the sciences have crumbled like European boundaries. The foundations of chemistry are reduced to physics, and biology has been overwhelmed by chemistry. As far back as Aristotle, psychology was associated with biology. The dualism of Rene Descartes (1596-1650) twenty centuries later drew a sharp distinction between mind and matter after which psychology receded into the depths of philosophy and away from biology.

The overpowering success of the physical sciences in the twentieth century swept over the biological sciences and in turn impressed objectivity into the subjective approach of the old psychology.

Although psychology as the science of the mind is influenced by physico-chemical interpretations, the complexity of mental behavior eludes many of the precise methods of modern science.

In spite of discoveries indicating the chemical basis of mental processes and the electrical nature of nerve impulses, we are a long way from understanding mind and thought.

3. Mind, being intangible, allows for various interpretations of its basic nature.

5. Quite impossible. Nerves from the brain extend to all parts of the body.

### Everyone's For Sheriff Oriscello

Sheriff Oriscello's candidacy for re-election and his outstanding record in office have inspired such a picture of confidence throughout Union County that his name, instead of his opponent's, appeared in the sheriff's slot on campaign signs hung by the Republican party on the marquee of the Elizabeth hotel where the B.O.P. has headquarters.

The banners with Sheriff Oriscello's name remained on the marquee for some time. A spokesman for the sign painting firm said the company had been so busy in the past few weeks that Oriscello's name inadvertently was listed on the Republican ticket.

Sheriff Oriscello's name, inadvertently and otherwise, appears to be on top with most of Union County's voters and he should be re-elected to another term in the coming general elections.

Political analysts — if there are any such experts on a local or county level — are confronted with a lot of "cliff hangers" in the current campaign.

However, with only a few weeks to go, several certain winners are emerging out of the smoke of campaign firing with the present Union County Sheriff — Ralph Oriscello receiving overwhelming support from all sections of the county, and from both sides of the political aisles.

Sheriff Oriscello, seeking re-election, is attracting votes because of his background, citations, awards and accomplishments during his first term which, everyone is willing to admit, has restored honor and dignity to the Sheriff's office.

His first term of office has inspired the campaign slogan, "Deeds, Not Words," and a look into the records and accomplishments has earned him the respect and county wide support for re-election.

The county-wide supporters of Sheriff Oriscello cite his police experience and record in office as the basis of his campaign for re-election to a three-year term.

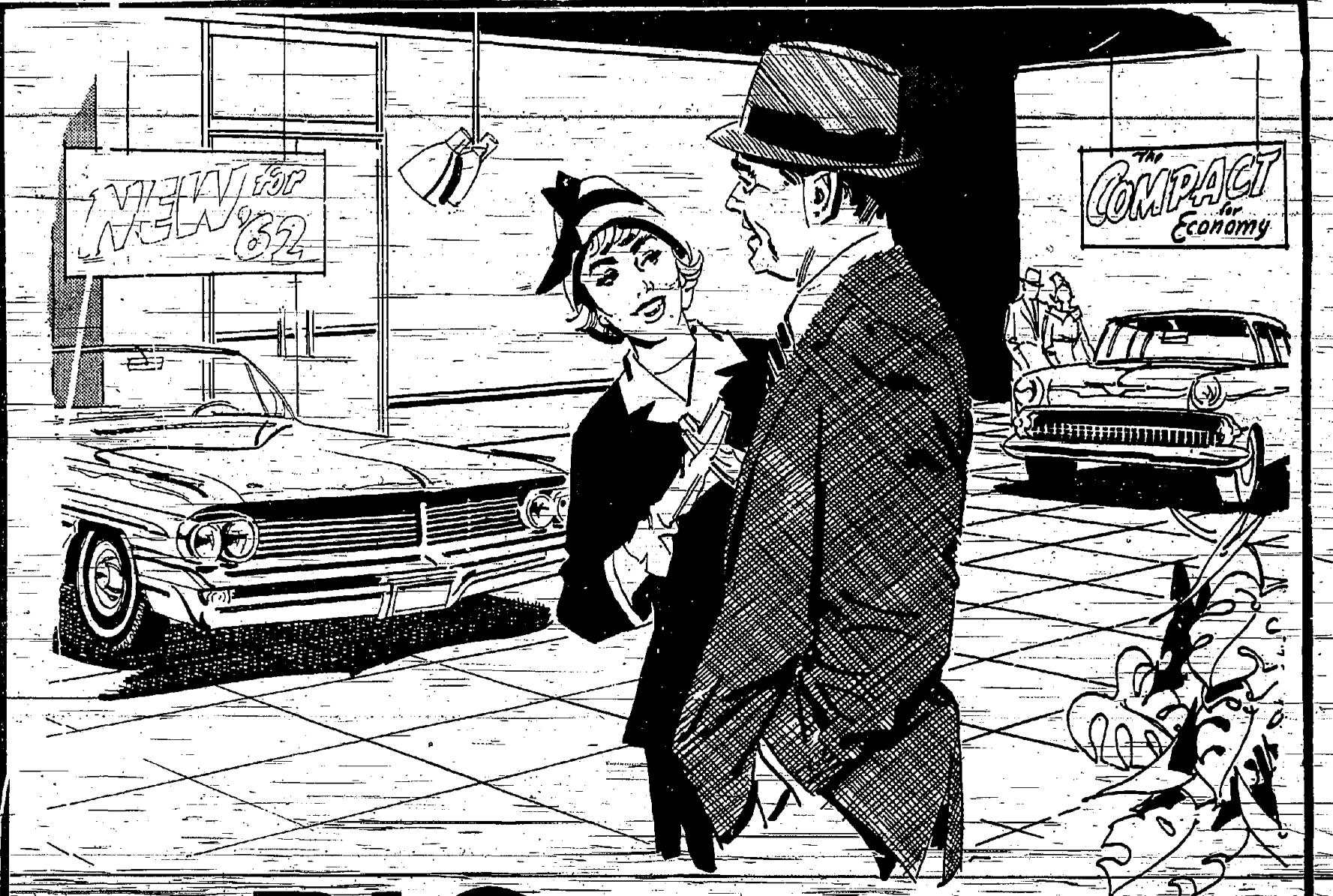

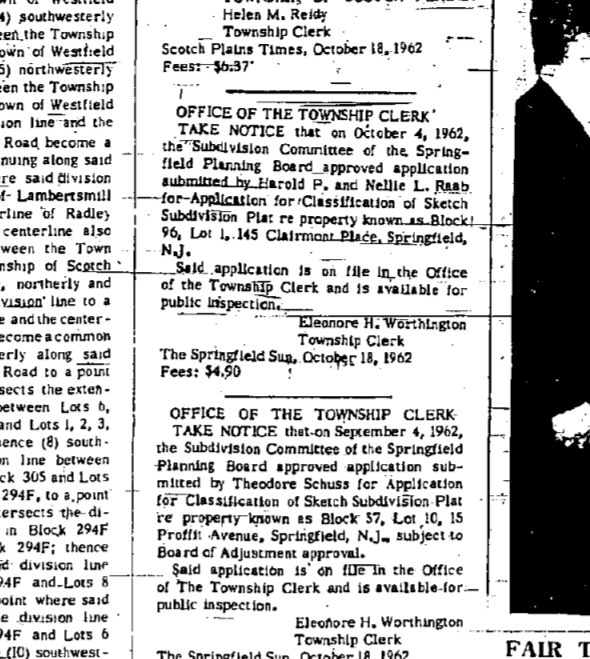

September 1st, the first day of school is something to celebrate and the children do this by bringing flowers and gifts to their teachers. Their school week is six days. They start first grade at the age of seven. From this low grade up, they are taught to enjoy work and contrary to propaganda reports, the Russian children are not severely disciplined and they do not have any fear of school. The "Play Motive" is used a great deal in teaching the children of Russia as this is a more enjoyable way of learning and a faster way. Field trips are used much more frequently than we do, many trips lasting for a month or more. Films and records are used very

often. There are special classes for children who are handicapped in any way and you will find at least one doctor in every school. Women have as much opportunity to learn as have the men and you will find seventy five percent women in the field of Education.

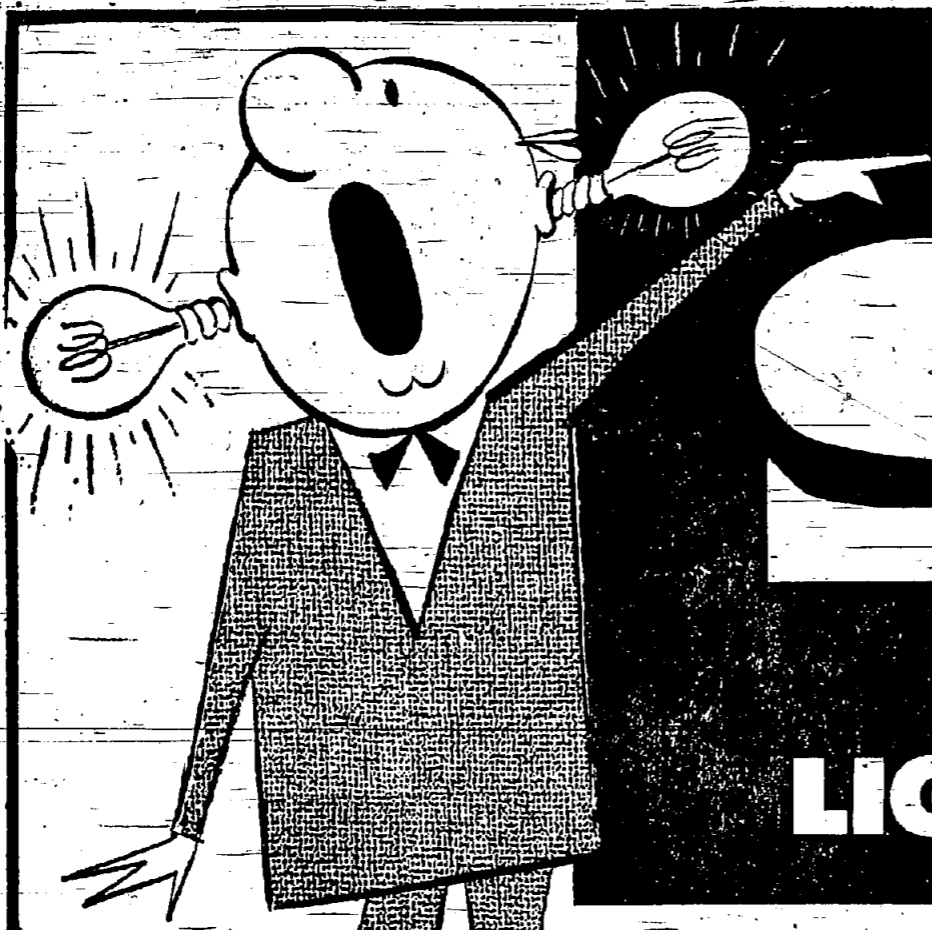

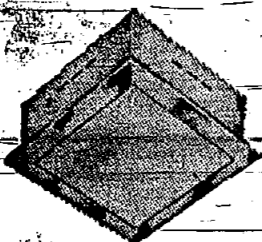

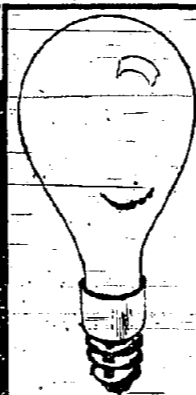
