### Revised Ordinance To Be Presented On December 21st

### Mr. Goodman, Thank!

Tuesday night Leon Goodman of 16 Surrey Lane, Springfield, gave Springfield Township Committee a verbal "pat-on-the-back" and Township Committee invited him to return again with more of the same.

The exchange of pleasantries went something like this:

At the conclusion of the pool discussion, Mr. Goodman informed Township Committee he was a newcomer to town, not in the habit of attending municipal meetings, but wanted to "congratulate members of council for their part in seeing we get this facility (the pool)."

Revealing an expression of gratitude upon this unsolicited compliment, Mayor Philip Del Vecchio replied:

"Mr. Goodman, your remarks make all our late hours worthwhile and compensate for the two cents we get for this job."

Committeeman Arthur Falkin quickly added:

"Mr. Goodman, we regret you haven't attended our meetings before and hope you come in the future."

Despite the freezing outdoor temperature Tuesday night, some 150 citizens crammed into the chambers of Springfield Township Committee in Municipal Building had only one interest in mind: a municipal swimming pool.

The group attended the meeting in anticipation of a public hearing scheduled on an ordinance calling for the appropriation of \$568,000 for the purchase of property and the construction of the pool.

Under consideration is the purchase of the Jenco tract north of Morrison Road consisting of slightly more than 14 acres for a pool and recreation purposes.

It is owned by Robbins Construction Corp. of Union. Selling price of the land is \$280,000. Pool construction involves the pool itself with equipment and associated facilities including bath-house and parking lot.

Tuesday night when the pool question came before Township Committee, Mayor Philip Del Vecchio informed the audience what had transpired since the introduction of the ordinance two weeks ago. He reported Town-

ship Committee met with the Citizens Swimming Pool Committee and also noted that the ordinance as introduced would allow a maximum pool life of 15 years for bonding purposes.

He explained that at 15-year life and with \$60 family membership fee, the proposal would indicate an operation "in the black," but it was felt there should be a minimum of risk to the taxpayers.

The bonding attorney has since come up with a new composite life of 27 years, he said. This would give a much more comfortable margin, the

mayor pointed out.

The ordinance was re-introduced in its revised form Tuesday designating 27 years for bonding purposes. It also stipulates the aggregate sum of \$28,000 as downpayments with bonds and notes to be issued in the amount of \$540,000. In the ordinance \$289,000 is earmarked for the purchase of land and \$29,000 for the construction of the facility, included in these last two figures are interest, legal, engineering, architecture, and other associated costs.

Public hearing on the revised ordinance will be December 21 at 9 P.M. meeting time.

It was announced that an ordinance on the operation of the pool will come later with this ordinance only the "instrumentation for borrowing money."

Many members of the audience discussed the proposal. The only one who said he was against the pool was Erwin Rall Jr. of 68 Denham Road. Mr. Rall was concerned about the financing and payments and also felt the pool wouldn't be ready for the 1963 season.

Mayor Del Vecchio assured him that if the work got underway fast enough with immediate engagement of an architect, the pool could be ready for the coming year. The mayor PLEASE TURN TO PAGE 16

### Springfield Resident Liss, Union Head, Tops Winning Slate

Milton J. Liss, of 42 Mohawk Drive, Springfield, incumbent president of Teamsters Local 478 AFL-CIO and long-time opponent of Teamster President James Hoffa, led his ticket to a sweeping victory last Saturday in annual elections for local officials.

Liss polled 1,745 votes for president over Larry Gately who received 863, according to results tallied by the Honest Ballot Association.

The election was held yesterday at the union headquarters, 1133 Broad St. after a spirited campaign which saw both factions make every effort to turn out a heavy vote.

Charles O'Mara, who has been serving as vice president since the resignation of Joseph Uzzolino last year, was elected to that position over John Czarnik, 1,617 to 927. Uzzolino earlier this year resigned to take over the business agent's post after a special election in which he defeated Ted Natkowski, a pro-Hoffa man who had held that post several years.

In the fight for business agent yesterday, Uzzolino defeated Natkowski by a vote of 1,544 to 1,065. Two other Liss candidates for the three business agent posts, Harry Serio and Al Kasatis, defeated Frank Dellisanti and Thomas Reilly, 1,673 to 921, and 1,543 to 1,025, respectively.

Other Liss candidates who posted victories were: Recording secretary, Harry Young, 1,652, over Leo Szczecinski, 904; secretary-treasurer, Joseph McConnon, 1,647, Clifford Lombis, 901; trustees, James Verona, 1,610, over Daniel McGlynn, 915, and Joseph McKenna, 1,592, over Louis Cicalese, 977.

The Liss victory also was a setback for Anthony (Tony Pro) Provenzano, New Jersey Teamsters Council President and an ardent campaigner for Natkowski.

The session will be opened with a short business meeting, followed by a luncheon. A highlight of the afternoon will be the appearance of Santa Claus. Gifts will be exchanged with the women bringing a gift for a woman and the men, a gift for a man. Any new participants attending the meeting for the first time is

asked to bring a present in the amount of 50 cents if he cares to take part in the gift exchange. The program will also include games and singing.

Edward Ruby, Springfield director of recreation, who coordinates the group, enthusiastically reports that there are now more than 40 Springfield residents who are active in Senior Citizens. The organization, established almost a year ago, meets two times a month. Programs are flexible and sometime include guest speakers. Bingo has also been played. It is expected Plans will soon be formulated for several bus trips in the spring to various places in the area.

Springfield Township Committee at its regular meeting Tuesday night accepted the recommendation of Board of Adjustment for the approval of a sign variance for Federated Purchaser, Route 22.

The recommendation for approval included various stipulations for the erection of the sign.

Authorization was given for the purchase of four new police cars from Morris Avenue Motor Car Co., Springfield, Plymouth dealer, for \$6,258. The concern was reported the lowest of five organizations. Committeeman Russel Sibole explained that in connection with the purchase, three police cars will be traded in as well as a 1954 auto in the Engineering Department, which will now receive the fourth police car for its use.

On the recommendation of Township Engineer Walter Kozub, permission was also given for the purchase of a truck for the road department from Bill's Auto Service, Summit, lowest bidder, at \$4,652.45.

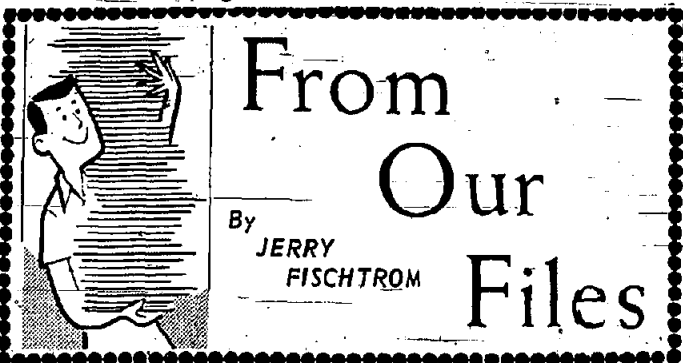

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## Bloodmobile Will Visit Springfield

In anticipation of the next Bloodmobile visit to Springfield on March 18, 1963 at the Presbyterian Parish House, Blood Program Chairman, Henry S. Wright, Director of the local American Red Cross Chapter attended a conference last week in the New York City Headquarters. About sixty others from surrounding areas comprised the group assimilating information from the Administrative Staff of the Blood Program, Eastern Area U.S.A. Because of the uniqueness of this facet of Red Cross activity, Blood Programs could not be covered adequately in the general workshop sessions at the recent Atlantic City Convention. Each Town has individual set ups and a specific approach to finding donors and utilizing credits. Therefore, this meeting is the beginning of a district meeting following up to start Jan. '63. Mr. Wright with knowledge of the program and recent developments will be responsible to communicate with members of the community and local Blood Group Leaders (Council of PTA, Volunteer Firemen, Temples Beth Ahm & Shary Scholem and Saks Fifth Ave.) on the subjects covered as follows: Research & Development, New Field Service Personnel, Blood Derivative Availability, Collections, Future Goals and New Chapters Considered for Expansion in the NY-New Jersey Area. Locations of Red Cross Blood Deposits were given in map form and the new twin spin-bag for sterilized separation of plasma for freezing and packed red cells (which can only be frozen by a very expensive Union Carbide, Glycerol additive process) was demonstrated.

Among items of interest with regard to future goals and expected technological advances were the following. It is expected the new headquarters building at 66th St. and Amsterdam Ave. NYC will be ready for occupancy in January 1963. This is not only an office building but also the ultimate in facilities for processing and storage of blood and derivatives. By having this expanded facility, the American Red Cross Blood Program can maintain the frugality only possible in the regional concept of blood replacement. (In the small individual hospital plan, if two-for-one donated blood is not used within 21 days, it must be thrown out. It cannot be sold, bought, or exchanged.) With the "Mother Bank" plan, unused whole blood can be fractionated, frozen for storage and then reconstituted after five years, if necessary. There is virtually no loss. When the deep freeze process is perfected,

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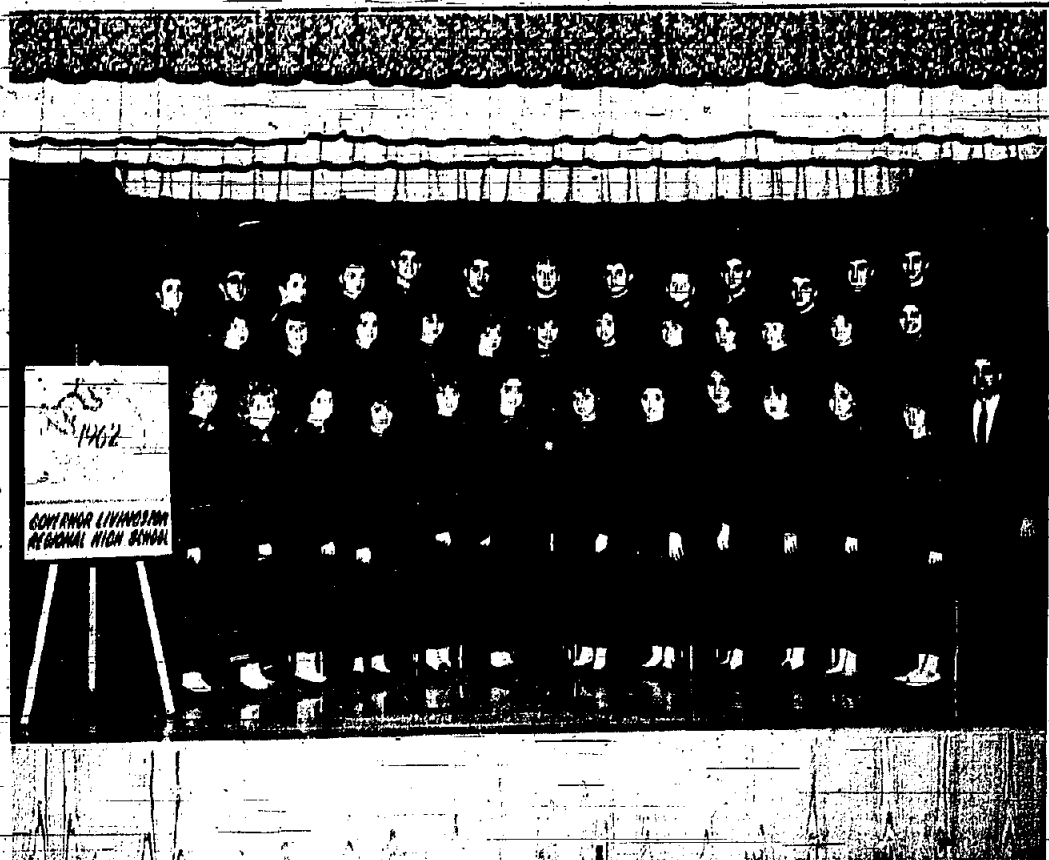

# Four Years Ago

In response to many requests received by the Springfield League of Women Voters in regard to this organization's stand on the possibility of a change of government in the Township of Springfield, as reflected in petitions currently being circulated, the League has prepared a statement detailing the stand it took in Springfield's last attempt at a change in 1958. The statement follows:

In 1958, the League of Women Voters of Springfield made an extensive study of our present form of local government as well as those forms described in the Faulkner Act of 1950. The Act provides the means for citizens to study, through an elected charter commission, their existing municipal government and the forms available to them under the law. At that time, the League initiated the idea of a Charter Study for Springfield and encouraged local organizations to participate in the Citizens Committee for Charter Study. The work of this Committee resulted in a referendum by petition which was placed on the ballot in November, 1957. When a Charter Commission consisting of 5 residents of Springfield was elected to make the study and funds provided by the Township.

Dr. William Miller, a Princeton governmental consultant, aided the Commission. He outlined the duties and procedures of such a study to the Commission and was present at all interviews they conducted subsequently. Dr. Miller is a lawyer and a law professor and has served many state governments in studies of administrative organization, taxation, and finance. He is considered an expert in the field.

In July, 1958, the results of the study were published by the Commission in the book, "A CHANGE OF GOVERNMENT FOR CHANGING TIMES." The book described the weaknesses of the Township committee form of government (Springfield's present system). It went on to explain the advantages of Council-Manager Plan E. The Commission was unanimous in recommending this form of government for Springfield. Their recommendation was then placed on the ballot November 4, 1958 as follows:

"Shall Council-Manager Plan E of the

Optional Municipal Charter Law providing for a council of five councilmen to be elected at large be adopted by Springfield Township?"

"A vote of YES will give Springfield a modern form of government, with a council of five members elected by the people and a full-time, qualified township manager appointed by the council and accountable to it, and subject to removal by the council. A vote of NO will keep the present township committee form of government."

The League of Women Voters of Springfield fully supported this form of government as stated in this referendum.

Only 400 votes defeated this referendum. Of over 5,800 voters, 1,000 did not even vote on the referendum.

According to the Faulkner Act, a four-year period must elapse before a proposed change of government can again be placed before the voters.

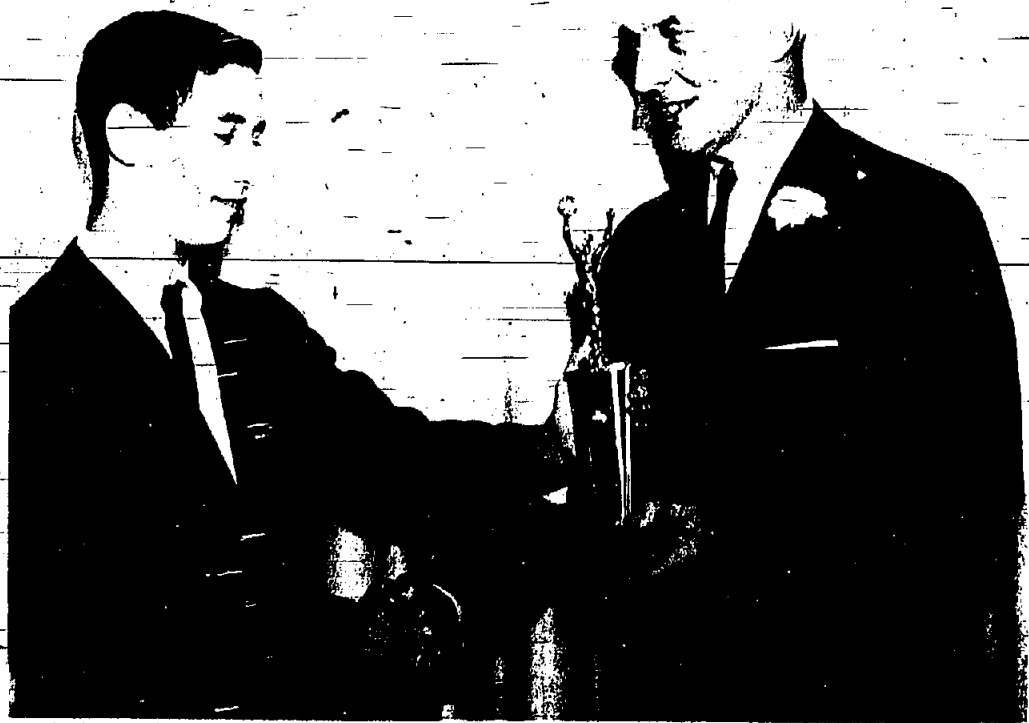

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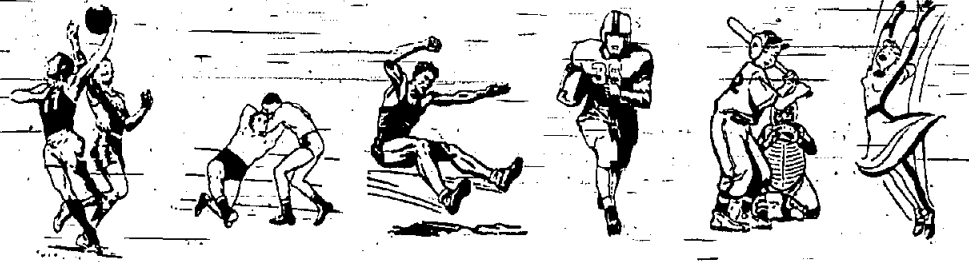
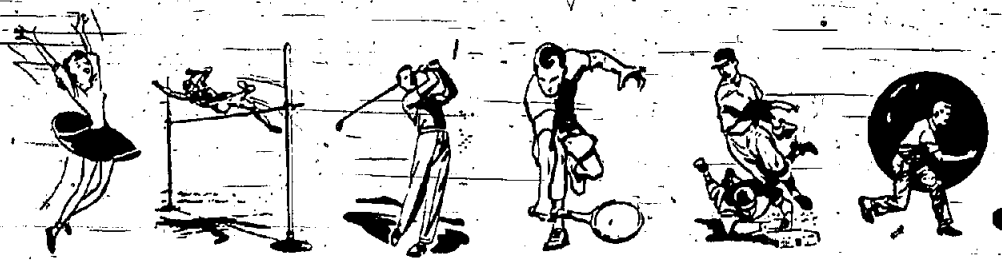
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# Opener Against Summit Has Wodock Worried

When a coach is so confident of his team's ability on the basketball court that he is genuinely disappointed that a coach as talented as Al Lo-Balbo is no longer at St. Mary's High in Elizabeth so that he can whip his squad, it's hard to imagine the same coach being genuinely concerned about losing his opening game of the season.

Yet that is the unique situation facing Coach Don Wodock of Governor Livingston Regional High School in Berkeley Heights. Wodock has a veteran team, and a good one, and the Highlander coach is certain his boys are going to have a highly successful season.

But the Highlanders' opening-night opponent tomorrow evening in Berkeley Heights just happens to be arch-rival Summit High School. The Highlanders haven't beaten Summit in four tries during the past two seasons and it wouldn't exactly qualify as an upset if the Hilltoppers won again tomorrow night.

Like Governor Livingston, Summit has four starters back from last season's squad that whipped the Highlanders twice. Summit already has been tabbed by the Suburban Conference coaches as the team to beat for the conference title and is expected to be a leading contender for the State Group 3 championship next March.

The Highlanders, however, must be accorded an excellent chance of whipping Summit for the first time. Governor Livingston will have a distinct height advantage with 6-5 Bob Heuer—the tallest man on the floor.

Wodock's starters will include three other six-footers in Lynn Nesbitt, the best rebounder on the team the past two seasons; John Adamiak, the crackerjack football quarterback who came into his own as a basketball player late last season, and Dave Jubanowsky, the only newcomer on the starting five. The other regular will be Bobby Clarkson, the hero of the football victory over Ridge, who could hold the key to the Highlanders' success on the basketball court this season.

Clarkson is the team's playmaker and "take-charge" guy. He is the boy that Wodock is counting on to put the "go" in what should be a high-powered Governor Livingston attack.

Nesbitt already holds season and career scoring marks at Governor Livingston. He is tremendous rebounder and shooter and if the Highlanders have a good season Lynn should make a strong bid

to become an all-state athlete in two sports. The six-foot, 200-pounder was the top third baseman in New Jersey last spring.

Heuer and Adamiak, both big and strong, figure to give Nesbitt plenty of support in the rebounding department this season. Heuer scored in double figures last season, while Adamiak scored well in several games late last year.

Despite two straight losing seasons, Wodock apparently feels that the Highlanders came of age last February when they upset top-seeded Westfield High in the Union County Conference tournament. Don was hopeful of getting a crack at St. Mary's then, but the Governor Livingston lost a squeaker to Scotch Plains in the quarter-final round and was eliminated.

Wodock succeeded in getting St. Mary's on the Highlander schedule this season for the first time, but during the summer LoBalbo, the most successful coach in Union County schoolboy basketball annals, departed for Belleville High School in Essex County where he hopes to rebuild the Bellboys' sagging fortunes.

In posting an 8-11 record last season, Governor Livingston lost nine games by a total of 50 points. Wodock expects to win those nine games this year and figures his team should win 14 or 15 of its 18 regularly scheduled games. That would be quite a feat!

The Highlanders are playing a beefed-up schedule this season that will include six games against teams considered preseason threats for State championships as well as contests with Springfield Regional and Clark Regional for the first time.

The power teams on the slate include Summit (twice), a Group 3 title threat; New Providence (twice) and South Plainfield, Group 2 championship hopefuls, and St. Mary's the defending county champion and a perennial Catholic "B" contender.

In the Highlanders' favor in undertaking such an ambitious schedule is that 11 of the 18 games will be played at home. Another factor making Wodock optimistic is that he now has two assistant coaches, with Bob Martin handling the Highlander jayvees, and Howard Tozier serving as mentor of the freshmen quintet.

The jayvees will play a full 18-game schedule like the varsity, while the freshmen currently are slated for 11 games, with the opener at home against Scotch Plains on December 18 at 3:45 p.m.

## Full House Anticipated Tomorrow

Governor Livingston Regional High School will send the strongest basketball team in its three-year history on to the court tomorrow night at the Governor Livingston gymnasium when it opens an ambitious 18-game schedule against a veteran Summit High School squad, that is rated among the best in Group 3 circles in the State.

The meeting of two highly regarded quintets is expected to draw a capacity crowd to the Highlanders' gymnasium. Governor Livingston will be looking for its first basketball victory over Summit in five tries.

Although both teams have four starters back from last season, the game will offer a contrast in offensive styles. The Highlanders are tall and talented, with a powerful rebounding and scoring trio in Lynn Nesbitt, John Adamiak and Bob Heuer. Wodock expects his boys to play ball control, a game they executed with great success last spring in the upset of Westfield and its 6-10 ace Bob King. The Highlanders have the height to control the rebounds and the shooting to match or surpass the Hilltoppers. If they resist the temptation to outrun the Summit swiftness, they should win.

In addition to five strong starters, Wodock has a wealth of reserve strength. The top substitutes are 5-9 Randy Hill and 5-8 Tommy Armstrong, a senior who moved to town last spring. Hill and Armstrong will spell Clarkson and Jubanowsky.

The big reserves are 6-3 Meredith Rice, who has looked sharp in pre-season drills; 6-3 Mark Lee, up from the jayvees, and Bob Lynch, 6-1, who missed most of last season due to illness. Also available are 6-0 Glen Blitwise, who has missed considerable practice due to illness, and Paul Denman, a transfer student from Essex Catholic High.

The Highlanders will play again next Tuesday afternoon when they visit Piscataway High School. They will close out the pre-Christmas phase of their season on December 21, playing host to Watchung Hills Regional High.

# JUDO

INTERNATIONAL SCHOOL OF JUDO - SUMMIT

Ever since there was life, there has been fighting; and ever since there was intelligence, it has been used to improve fighting capacity.

When the first cave man realized that by appearing to give way he could trick his enemy into a weak position, the development of Jiu-jitsu began; and when subtle and civilized minds realized that the same principles that govern all conduct are also applicable in physical combat - and, in reverse, that the lessons learned on the Judo mat, if they were learned well, were learned for all of life - then Jiu-jitsu became JUDO, the "Way-of-peace."

Today, many hundreds of years later, the study of Judo attracts more than 75,000 new participants yearly in the United States. In 1964 an American Judo team will compete in the Olympic games in Tokyo, Japan.

Why has this formerly secretive, oriental sport spiraled to such popularity in the Western world during the past decade?

The answer is simple. Judo is probably the most universal sport known to man - it can be practiced by men, women and children without regard to strength, size, or athletic capabilities. All that is required is a certain amount of basic intelligence and the will to learn.

Judo is also universal in its appeal. Men learn for reasons of controlled exercise, body "tone-up", sport, and, if ever needed, self-defense.

Women praise the "weight-reducing" aspects of judo training and also enjoy the security of being somewhat less than "defenseless."

### Picture Display At Library

Included in the current exhibits at the Springfield Public Library is a colorful set of four large pictures from two of Charles Dickens' novels: "Pickwick Papers" and "David Copperfield." The theme of each picture is a stagecoach with a full complement of luggage, people, and horses drawn up at an English inn. Below the pictures in the first floor hall is the collection of holiday and Christmas books. These books include many of the types popular for Christmas ranging from decoration, games for children and grown-ups, drama and music, to literature.

On the landing on the way downstairs is a science exhibit for young people. A large chart outlines the history of chemistry from its origin (about 2200B.C.) in China, Egypt, and India to 1960. The outline was prepared by Dr. Herbert S. Klickestein, an internationally recognized authority on the history of chemistry.

Supplementing the chart is a study in photography, "The Camera in Science," edited by Franklin M. Branley of the Hayden Planetarium. Twelve photographs in black and white show a spectacular record of phenomena—made possible by the use of fast lenses and fast emulsions. "Chromosomes of Drosophila," by Barwind F. Kallmann is described as a one-in-a-million photograph. Others are: TS Bacteriophages, Gas Flame, Magnetic Domains, Subsonic Flow of Delta Wing, Electron Diffraction of Zinc Oxide, Ice Crystal under X-Ray, Bohr's Radium Atom, Living Cell, Horsehead Nebula, Explosion of Pentolite, and Crab Nebula.

Books covering the field of pure science for both adults and young people are to be found in the 500's on the main floor of the Springfield Public Library.

told Mr. Rall that a pool in the next town was finished complete with cabanas in a period of 10 weeks. At any rate, Mayor Del Vecchio said, when membership fees were taken, the residents would be given to understand that payment was for the first year membership.

The mayor also reminded Mr. Rall that contracts can contain "completion penalty clauses" to protect the township in case of delay.

Harold Engelman suggested that Township Committee refrain from purchase until it has the required number of families committed to the pool. Committee member Vincent J. Bonadies added that he made it quite clear at the previous Township Committee meeting that all receipts are to first pay off the amortization on bonds on the entire 14 acres.

It was reported that pool operation costs have been estimated by Robert Sisco of Livingston, pool consultant, at \$20,000 yearly. This was leaving a leeway of some \$3,000, Mr. Sisco, who attended the meeting, said, with current wages in the area well below the figures projected in the estimated figures. The first few years the cost is greatest, Mr. Sisco explained.

It was noted that for the first two years interest on bond anticipation notes at the rate of 2 1/2 per cent interest would amount to \$10,000 the first year and

\$13,490 the second year, making a total cost of \$30,000 for the first year and \$43,490 for the second year.

Mayor Del Vecchio announced that only six of the 14 acres are planned for pool use. At some future date, it is hoped that the other remaining eight acres will be improved as a park site, he said.

When asked from the audience why the pool members should be required to assume the cost of paying for the additional eight acres, Mayor Del Vecchio pointed out that it was felt the pool members should assume this responsibility as a gesture of appreciation to the township for pledging and lending its credit in the venture.

Another citizen asked whether the possibility of receiving state funds under the Green Acres program for the project was investigated. The mayor replied that the facility must then be made available to any citizen of New Jersey and the desire was to maintain the pool as a township operation.
