Springfield, FMBA finally come to terms

SPRINGFIELD — After four years of working without a contract, last week the township and Springfield Firefighters came to a meeting of the minds on a four-year deal.

Mayor Ziad Shehady was more than pleased with the terms of the

four-year contract that he and township committeeman Jerry Fernandez were able to negotiate with the firefighter union. The agreement not only settles past years when the Firemen's Benevolent Association, or FMBA, worked without a contract, but also forges a collective bargaining contract that binds the union through 2014. Annual salary

increases in the agreement, the mayor said, are "well below the 2 percent cap" set by Gov. Chris Christie for 2010. In fact, he added, the firemen agreed to a wage freeze for 2011 and a 1.75 percent increase for each of following three years.

"This agreement is long overdue, for four years our firefighters

have been working without a contract leaving the township and FMBA in a cloud of uncertainty," Shehady said, pointing out that the township "secured a fiscally responsible agreement for the next four years that is mindful of the unstable economic climate and hardships taxpayers are facing."

Historic mosaic saved

County helps to keep historic tiles

CRANFORD — Art enthusiasts and history buffs are joined in celebration after a successful operation to save a piece of historic artwork from Solomon Schechter Day School, which is presently being demolished.

The object of all the attention is a roughly five-foot by seven-foot hand-painted mosaic around a fireplace in the school's kindergarten room.

Maureen Strazdon, chair of the Historic Preservation Advisory Board, said the board initially hoped the whole school be preserved, but plans to clear the land could not be altered. Instead they set about making a photographic record of the building's interior and soon noticed the artistry present in the kindergarten room. The hand-painted mosaic depicts a barnyard scene with animals and fields.

"We all immediately thought it was beautiful and that it might be historically significant," Strazdon said.

After circulating photographs of the fireplace on the internet, the

Tile Foundation of America responded with the information that it was created in Flint, Mich. in 1927 by the Flint Faience Company and is, in fact, historically significant.

The town had no money to lend to a preservation undertaking, but the board had better luck with Barbara Fuller of the Union County Office of Cultural and Heritage Affairs. The county freeholders quickly approved \$10,000

from monies sent aside specifically for the preservation of cultural artifacts. The money paid for the services of Larry Mobley, a Michigan-based tile restoration specialist.

The tiles surrounding the fireplace have been removed and numbered.

They will be cleaned and reassembled for display and preservation. "We're very, very pleased because since the infor-

mation started appearing around Cranford, several people started bringing us photographs of themselves or their parents in the Roosevelt School in the Kindergarten School," Strazdon said.

Solomon Schechter School is not involved in the preservation efforts.

The building, built in 1927, originally served as a public school known as Roosevelt. See COUNTY, Page 4

Union superintendent organizes multiplication bee

UNION — Some parents may have thought the new superintendent of schools would multiply the district's problems, but students at Connecticut Farms school proved them wrong this week.

On Monday, about 100 fourth-graders lined up in the auditorium of Connecticut School to participate in one of the school's first "multiplication bee's," an event that Superintendent Patrick Martin advocated.

Last month, he defended these new adventures, explaining that learning as a mechanism for ensuring all students are prepared for the next grade.

Martin's theory is that by getting back to the basics of reading, writing and arithmetic, the Union School district can climb back to the top of the educational ladder. A place the district has not been for a long time in his opinion. He was prepared, though, for grow-

ing pains along the way.

Initially, before things got off the ground, there were parents who objected to this old-fashioned approach to education. But Martin stayed his ground. He strongly felt students should not be promoted if they did not read the six books required by the end of the year and pass several test milestones required of their grade level. But, make no mistakes, Martin is by no means a stern taskmaster. Far from it. He wants students under his charge to be excited about learning. From what he saw Monday morning, its working already.

In fact, Martin was encouraged by the effort students made in preparation for the multiplication bee.

"The kids were excited, the teachers were excited and I was excited," Martin explained shortly after the bee, adding that it was evident that these students had studied hard both in school and at home.

Slightly more than two weeks

ago, Martin went to all the district schools to visit fourth-grade classes and inform them about the multiplication bee. Knowing kids like he does, the superintendent threw in the element of surprise, by mentioning there would be prizes for students who managed to "stay standing."

"Boy, those kids really knew their multiplication tables," Martin said proudly, pointing out that he was even prepared for those few students who might get nervous or tongue tied. "We made sure that even if they missed an answer and had to sit down, they got another chance when one of their classmates missed an answer," Martin said, adding that this gave these students another opportunity to "get back in the game."

Martin does not doubt that students were challenged by the competitive nature of the multiplication bee and, of course, the lure of a prize in the end.

"After all, they are kids, and we

can't forget that, Martin said with a chuckle.

The prizes for students standing in the end really were a hit, the superintendent said. But, while the key chain flashlight and stuffed animal bookmark were popular, the Rubik's Cube proved to be the prize requested most.

Martin was not surprised there were only four students who failed to make the grade in the end, but that also presented another challenge for the superintendent.

"It can be traumatizing to a child to see most of their peers win a prize when they did not," Martin explained, but he admits that caving to pressure and handing out prizes to every student, fail or win, would defeat the purpose of what he is trying to accomplish.

"What does that say to all the students who studied hard? That next time they don't have to study hard because they will get a prize anyway," he asked. "That doesn't encourage students to learn, it puts

us back to square one and we don't want to be there. We are trying to encourage these kids to study hard so they can learn."


So, although the four students were upset over the loss, Martin decided, with the help of teachers, that these students would receive a sticker, not a prize.

"This way they were not humiliated and they received something for the effort," he said.

Overall, Martin thought the multiplication bee was a "win-win situation for everyone. "Some people think students can make it out there with a calculator, but they need to be more prepared."

In the coming weeks, Martin has scheduled every school for the infamous multiplication bee and he is looking forward to each one. Not to mention some future contests that are just as exciting. "We are going to challenge our students and I have every confidence they will rise to that challenge," the superintendent said.

Hillside liquor stores get license suspended

Two stores get busted by Alcoholic Beverage Control Board, Hillside Police

HILLSIDE — Two local businesses have had their liquor license suspended following a Sept. 27 meeting of the local Alcoholic Beverage Control Board where officials heard charges that the establishments sold alcoholic beverages to patrons who were under 21 years of age.

Carli's Lounge, located at 1555 Summit Ave., received a 7-day suspension of their license as a result of the charge, which was their first offense.

Mayfair Liquors, at 1444 North Broad Street, received a 15-day license suspension as they were being charged with their second offense.

In 2008, their license was suspended for seven days for the same offense.

The Hillside Police Department filed administrative charges against both establishments for selling alcoholic beverages to a 20-year-old undercover police officer on Aug. 19.

Neither establishment could be reached for comment.

Councilman John Kulish described the hearing as fairly straightforward.

"It was by the book," Kulish said. "The state gives you a range of penalties as far as suspension."

Officials reported the owners will not appeal the sentence and would be sending its employees to get a "refresher course" on the proper legal procedures.

"It's an agreeable type suspension and a warning that if they come back they'll face more penalties," Kulish said.

The local police conduct periodic undercover investigations and inspections of licensed establishments in the township to ensure compliance with the state's liquor laws.

Police Chief Robert Quinlan said many other local businesses that sell alcohol were also investigated, but complied with the law when approached by underage customers. "I'm pleased that the majority of establishments didn't sell to them," Quinlan said, noting that in the past, upwards of half the establishments investigated failed to adhere to the law. "The situation is improving," Quinlan added. "But we're going to keep on doing these periodic inspections as long as necessary."

According to New Jersey law, persons under 21 years of age are prohibited from purchasing alcoholic beverages. Bars and liquor stores are required to ask for proof of age when they serve or sell alcoholic beverages to youthful patrons.

Township and firefighters agree to terms of a new FMBA contract

The mayor also said the FMBA agreed with the township's decision to switch to the New Jersey State Health Benefits plan, which reduces benefit expenses for taxpayers by nearly \$1 million.

Interestingly, the contract was signed prior to Assembly Majority Leader Joseph Cryan, D-Union, introducing legislation that proposes towns be allowed to temporarily exclude the cost of public safety personnel under the new law capping property tax collection increases at 2 percent.

Cryan's proposed legislation would allow towns and counties to raise property taxes outside the 2 percent cap to pay police officers, firemen and emergency workers.

The Firemen's Benevolent Association and township previously were unable to come to terms with their differences, so the FMBA was bound under the terms of their previous contract which ended in 2007. Springfield's Union President and firefighter Joseph Popolo felt the new contract was fair.

"After four years, I am pleased that the FMBA and

the township were able to agree to terms that are both fair and equitable for everyone involved, especially the residents. This agreement provides significant savings and help to the township as they prepare budgets for the coming years with minimal impact to the taxpayers, which has always been one of our main priorities," he said. In the past, the relationship between the township and FMBA has been strained, in part due to understaffing. Popolo tried to address this issue in a Oct. 12, 2009 letter to then mayor Bart Fraenkel.

"Clearing this department falls critically short in complying with the standards when forced to operate with only three personnel on duty," the local 57 union president said.

But, while this issue, and others, festered well into the early summer, Shehady felt the hiring of Public Safety Director Richard Rosell would help bring structure not only to the fire department but also the police department.

So far, the mayor said, Rosell has exceeded his expectations and both fire and police personnel have responded favorably to the change.

School. In 1979, the building was purchased by Solomon Schechter Day School of Essex and Union counties and renamed.

Declining enrollment led to its closure in 2008. The school's West Orange branch is still operating.

The township bought the 3.7-acre site in June for \$1.9 million. Local officials said they seized the opportunity to buy the land for purposes of open space and associated benefits, including the potential to help alleviate the town's chronic flooding issues.

Cranford's public school officials indicated that although the building has not been part of their district in many years, the public school community is still sad to see the building destroyed and glad the tiles were preserved.

"Just as a citizen, never mind as a board member,

I'm very pleased to see them preserve that and hopefully put them somewhere safe," Cranford Board of Education member Camille Widdows said.

Board member Mary Venditti said the district briefly considered reclaiming the building before concluding it was impractical.

"I don't think it was in good enough shape for us to even try to fix," Venditti said. "It wasn't up to any of the codes we have to meet and it was too much of an expense to get involved in."

The Board of Education is presently involved in its own historic preservation efforts involving four decorative panels found in the high school during the last year. The panels feature depictions of the four seasons, painted by a Cranford artist during the Great Depression. Officials plan to put these panels on display in the municipal building.



Former Roselle employee sues Dept. of Public Works

ROSELLE — A former public works employee is suing the borough and mayor for sexual harassment, sex discrimination and libel as well as unlawful termination.

Kheshea Jones, 44, of Roselle filed the lawsuit last week claiming that after being hired in 2007 as a Public Works seasonal employee, she was asked to perform jobs that none of her male co-workers were doing.

Jones maintains that when hired by Public Works Department Supervisor Louis Williams, she was told she would be "making history" as the first female truck driver. However, Williams said she would need a commercial truck driver's license, even though the position of laborer only required a regular driver's license.

Jones said she was told by Williams that without the commercial driver's license she would not be hired as a laborer.

Jones also alleges she was told by Williams that she would be on probation for

90-days even though none of the male workers hired at or around that time were advised that they also were on probation.

Although told at the time of hiring that she would be trained on the garbage truck, street sweeper, sewer truck, loader and lift, Jones claims she never was trained on any of these vehicles.

Jones claims that instead she was called in from the road to go to the supermarket "to buy lunch for Williams and his secretaries," and perform other office duties such as cleaning the bathrooms and filling in for administrative personnel. None of which, the lawsuit said, were part of her job description.

Among the places Jones had to clean included the men's and women's bathrooms, as well as mopping the floors.

The male laborers, she said, were not required to get Williams' lunch, purchase items for office parties, perform secretarial duties, give out leaf bags to residents or clean the men's and women's bathrooms.

On one occasion, Jones said, she was

mopping the floor in the men's bathroom when another employee came in and used the facility right in front of her. Although she protested, the male employee proceeded to unzip his pants, exposed himself and said, "I'm, going to show you what I'm working with."

Although Jones said she immediately told her supervisor what took place in the men's bathroom, she claims he refused to believe her.

According to the lawsuit, the former employee maintains that after the first incident, two employees continued to make unwanted sexual advances towards her, but nothing was done by her supervisor to stop the harassment.

In September 2009, shortly before Jones was terminated, the lawsuit maintains her supervisor engaged in discriminatory conduct, including using insulting language and "coercive tactics to intimidate her." Jones alleges her supervisor did this to prevent her from exposing Williams' "illegal business

and employment practices."

In the lawsuit, Jones' attorney Randy P. Davenport said Williams' conduct while terminating Jones was "especially egregious, outrageous, malicious, willful and wanton."

The lawsuit also alleges that Jones was fired in retaliation because she filed a Notice of Tort Claim based on the hostile and discriminatory work environment.

Davenport said in the lawsuit that the borough violated its own policies regarding suspensions and procedures for termination of employees, as well as those established by the United States and New Jersey constitutions.

Davenport is asking for a jury trial and award of back and front pay, actual and general damages and attorney fees.

Williams did not return repeated calls by press time, Tuesday.

The sound of life

Fire Prevention Week, the annual, nationwide observance, began on Oct. 3 and runs through Saturday. This will be the 99th year the observance has been on the calendar, and its importance has not diminished in the slightest. The theme this year is "Smoke Alarms: a sound you can live with." Nearly two-thirds of fire fatalities occur in buildings without smoke alarms.

Each year, Fire Prevention Week is held during the week which contains Oct. 9, the day in 1871 the Great Chicago Fire burned most fiercely. During that two-day conflagration, more than 250 people were killed, 100,000 were left homeless, an estimated 17,400 structures were reduced to ashes and more than 2,000 acres were left scorched.

Oddly enough, the Chicago fire was not the most destructive fire to occur in the United States on that date. While the Windy City burned, another fire, the Peshtigo Fire, broke out in Wisconsin. It claimed between 1,200 and 2,500 lives and destroyed 16 towns in northeast Wisconsin.

The anecdotal cause of the Chicago fire was a lantern kicked over by a cow in the barn of Mrs. O'Leary; the Peshtigo Fire was blamed on railroad workers starting a brush fire that was fanned by strong winds. The proximity of the two fires has led others to suggest that fragments from Comet Biela, then in our solar system, fell to Earth and ignited both blazes, plus several other large fires recorded that day in the same part of North America.

In 1911 an annual observance was begun for the Chicago fire. In 1920, President Woodrow Wilson issued the first fire-safety proclamation, and in 1922 the week as we now know it began as a time to raise awareness of fire safety.

In our communities, Fire Prevention Week has become a time when the local fire department drives a fire truck to elementary schools. The kids are treated to a tour of the vehicle, told what to do in the event of a house fire, and are given the opportunity to see a firefighter in his full gear — mask, breathing apparatus, fire suit, helmet and ax. Since this figure resembles a movie monster to little children, the goal is to make them familiar with the sight and tell them to go toward this rescuer in the event of a house fire. Sadly, frightened children have a tendency to hide when they suddenly awake in a house fire. Parents should be aware of this week if only to ask their children what they learned during the visit of the firefighters to their school.

Figuring out the mass transit benefit

Michael Venables of Summit knows the benefit of making the local 7:15 a.m. direct train to Penn Station. In less than 30 minutes he will be riding a subway in New York to reach his job at 46th and 11th Avenue. He usually commutes with his wife Laura on the way to her job at 46th and 7th Avenue.

When they married, Michael then living in New York and Laura in Cranford purchased a condo in walking distance of Summit Station. Their joint commuting bill is \$560 a month plus \$90 or so more for the subway. Traveling together is a plus for the attractive young couple. They meet the definition of "dinks" which translate double income no kids. They are the types communities love — they pay high taxes and demand little in service.

The Midtown direct means Michael usually has a faster commute than co-workers coming from southern Manhattan. The impact on Summit property values has been a very big plus.

The optimism has dropped for a whole lot of other communities from Union to the west also expecting better rail. While Gov. Chris Christie's deadline runs out tomorrow, he has stopped construction to review the viability of the massive \$8.7 billion mass transit project which would construct a new tunnel doubling train capacity into Manhattan. Been on a NJ Transit train lately? Most riders are happy just to get a standing room spot.

The project known as "Access to the Regions Core" would double seat capacity and add 6,000 immediate construction jobs. A federal audit claims a better plan for "Combating fraud, waste was needed." This should not be a vehicle to

stall the project.

The delay brought forth an angry response from county transit types. Freeholder Chairman Dan Sullivan has been in the transit battles for 20 years. A long time ago he rallied transit troops to oppose a PATH fair rise. It included meeting with commuters in out of the way places like the North Elizabeth train station.

Speaking on Sunday, Sullivan rattled off the project benefits from jobs to convenience. He focused on the amazing property increases that result when mass transit projects are completed. He sees the same benefits in towns as diverse as Linden and Westfield when the project is completed.

Sullivan knows what he speaks about on the topic. For years he has served as a county representative to the North Jersey Transportation Planning Authority. It means attending monthly meetings on the technical aspects of transit projects from the drawing board to actual construction. He was actually Chairman when the ARC project was approved by the Authority.

Sullivan supported a county freeholder resolution which stated the project would "remove 22,000 cars from our roadways and eliminate 70,000 tons of greenhouse emissions annually."

U.S. Sen. Frank Lautenberg pounded the delay saying "killing this project would cost our state thousands of good paying jobs and

send billions of dollars slated for New Jersey off to other projects around the country. "The governor must work to advance the ARC tunnel so that we can boost New Jersey's economic recovery and avoid a future of busier highways, longer commutes and more pollution."

The insiders speculate that Governor may be looking to use the State's small portions of the ARC funds to plug holes in other transportation projects. The State Regional Plan Association said, "There is not a more clear-cut instance of a project with tremendous public benefits that will improve the region for decades to come."

Christie has found support from the Millburn-based Lackawanna Coalition. At a fair last Sunday around the corner from Springday, a flier from the group's chairman, David Peter Alan included "it is critical that New Jersey Transit change direction and work with New York's Metropolitan Transportation Authority and Amtrack to build an enhanced Penn Station."

An editorial from the New York Times criticized the delay by Christie pointing out that "planners predict that over the next 20 years, ridership on New Jersey Transit would double if there is a way for the trains to move. The current plan for the tunnel would move more than double the rail capacity."

The mass transit accessibility is a key to the County's development. Ask the people who make their living accommodations based on access. Dan Sullivan figured this all out 20 years ago at the North Elizabeth Train Station.

'Coaches,' get in the RVSA 'game'

For months I have been writing about how Rahway Valley Sewerage Authority has been hemorrhaging taxpayer dollars for years. If this was a football game, fans would be outraged, coaches would be fired and there would be hell to pay. Fans might even start supporting the "winning team." I think some already are.

From Cipola & Co.'s confidential report that very clearly revealed the \$30 million cogeneration plant was only worth salvage, legal bills mounting every month because of cogen related lawsuits, to the purchase of new office furniture and home desk computers and dinners for board members, the tab continues to run at taxpayer expense. But absolutely no one, especially the RVSA board of commissioners, or the majority of mayors in the 11 member towns, seem to be able to do anything about it. Or they won't.

Frankly, it's like being in a locker room at halftime after the quarterback has been sacked nine times and the team is losing big time. The coach can rant, rave, even beg his team to get back in there and fight, if they are listening. But if the team isn't listening, the opposing team will continue to win.

Taxpayers are listening and they are upset, even angry, but their hands are tied because the truth is, they are like spectators in a football stadium. They are hoping their team — the 11 member towns that pay assessments in the millions — will rally and win the "game." Let's hope they are not holding their breaths.

Imagine now, if you will, that RVSA is one football team and the 11 member towns served by RVSA are the other team. In any good football game, each player has a job to do and that is to ensure their team gets the ball down the field for a touchdown. Unfortunately, team RVSA's offense and defense are so good, the 11-town team can't make any yardage, let alone score a touchdown. They lose every "game" and the fans have just about given up trying to figure out why their team is losing. So have some mayors.

When reviewing the game films, it is easy to see that when the RVSA quarterback throws the ball, there is someone — the receiver — there to

catch it every single time. How do they do that? Great coaching and a team that not only wants to win, but has to win to stay in the "game."

Every single time RVSA gets called on a penalty by the official, or member towns, they manage to get away with it. Bottom line? They not only have a better playbook, but coaches that can bob and weave with the best of them. A good example is the \$30 million cogen plant that will never operate at a profit and actually will rack up millions in legal bills.

A few weeks ago, I wrote that RVSA had 35 supervisors overseeing 21 employees. You would think that information would have riled up mayors in each of the 11 member towns and got them motivated to do something, anything. But they never did.

To Cranford's credit, when they heard that their member assessment was going up 25 percent in 2011, not the 17 percent they expected, they requested RVSA's acting co-directors attend a workshop meeting to explain what was going on. Unfortunately, although Cranford's quarterback threw the ball, it was intercepted by RVSA's quarterback, who ran for a touchdown.

Amiable and forthcoming, the RVSA coaches, otherwise known as co-directors, had answers for everything. In fact, the old football saying of "the only good defense is a great offense" was clearly evident from the start at that meeting.

Despite this, it became crystal clear to me early on why the 11 member towns never seem to get a break. And it wasn't anything the co-acting directors had to say. Quite the contrary.

The enlightening moment came when James Murphy, who has been Cranford's representative on the RVSA board for 10 years, spoke. It was then that I knew why the RVSA board had never been and will never be financial gatekeepers for the 11

member towns that appointed them to the board.

It was a just a simple answer to a question asked by Cranford Mayor Mark Smith regarding the reasoning behind supplying desk computers and free internet service to every board member, including Murphy.

Murphy responded, of course, but there was nervousness in his voice. And that was my clue, my "aha" moment. Why would he be nervous or keep glancing at the RVSA co-directors for reassurance? The only way that could or would possibly happen was if Murphy and his "teammates" were no longer playing on the team they started out on.

I have little doubt that each of the representatives appointed by the 11 member towns set out to do right by their respective municipalities. But they fell prey to basic human nature: the desire to be part of a group. It's evident that these representatives wanted to be part of the RVSA team, because the board's decisions over the years have not been in the interest of the towns they represent. This is a fact backed up by the \$30 million cogen plant that is only worth salvage, among other things.

So what is the solution? I say it's time for every mayor in every member town to realize that RVSA is going to continue to spend taxpayer dollars until they are stopped. That means putting an entirely new team together.

Let's face it, it would not do any good at all for each town to appoint a new representative to the RVSA board because the same exact thing could occur again. Only an elected official, a mayor to be exact, would have a vested interest in doing right by his team. Because, behind every great team is a great coach who knows he could lose his job if his team loses too many games.

So, if you want things to change mayors, put yourselves on the RVSA board and do the job that needs to be done. Without a desk computer, internet service or catered Italian food paid for by taxpayers. As another great athlete once said: just do it.

A utility is still an expense

To the Editor:

Springfield Mayor Ziad Shehady's thoughts on the town's newly enacted sewer tax received significant front page coverage in last week's *Union County LocalSource*.

Essentially, he defended it by making two arguments: 1) that now that there is a separate entity labeled sewer utility, the \$2 million fees it levies should be called "utility" instead of taxes, and 2) if they were still called taxes, the pressure on the state imposed spending cap would have required a reduc-

tion of other municipal expenses.

He seems to miss the point that the whole idea of the cap is to force just what he is so proud of avoiding: forcing some difficult decisions to reduce the burden on the property owner. As far as the property owner is concerned, tax or utility, it still comes out of his pocket. To the homeowner, it is a distinction without a difference.

Shehady states that leaving the RVSA tab in the taxes would have resulted in a 10 percent increase in property tax. Instead, property taxes "only" went up 7

percent. Yes, but the minimum \$250 sewer expense comes to another 3 percent out of the average homeowner's pocket and if you take a shower or flush a toilet or heaven help us, try to keep your property attractive by watering you lawn it is considerably more.

Then there is the matter of the fee not being deductible from income tax because it is no longer labeled "tax." Our deputy mayor — also a candidate — once pointed out that the collective \$2 million dollars lost to taxpayers as deductible expenses "only" amounts to \$90 per household. That translates into another 1 percent on the average tax bill. So, it would appear that rather than the 7 percent tax rise we hear about from the mayor, we have a minimum increase of 11 percent out of pocket for the average Springfield homeowner.

Mayor Shehady's final comment in the article is really funny. He states past Democratic-controlled township committees "did not want to make the tough, but necessary financial decisions and instead chose to pass the buck to future generations." Doesn't he realize that by avoiding the pressures of the state-mandated cap through his sewer gimmick he is avoiding these very tough, but necessary decisions?

Rich Huber and Dave Amlen should stand by their 10-point critique of Springfield's new sewer tax.





UC to rent out space in Juvenile Detention Center

Union County is moving forward with an agreement with Bergen County to lease space at its Juvenile Detention Center in Linden, a deal county officials hope will generate about \$800,000 in revenue annual to help offset the state mandated costs of operating the juvenile detention center.

The county of Bergen will operate up to 20 secure detention beds for its juvenile detention population.

"This agreement with Bergen County allows us to reduce the annual detention budget which costs approximately \$6 million a year," said Union County Freeholder Chairman Daniel Sullivan.

The contract will run from Nov. 1 through Oct. 31, 2011. The agreement is pending for-

mal approval by the Bergen County Board of Chosen Freeholders and the New Jersey Juvenile Justice Commission.

No new costs will be incurred by the county and no additional staffing will be needed as a result of the additional juveniles. All transportation including court appearances to and from Bergen County will be provided by the Bergen County Sheriff's Department.

Director of Union County Human Services Frank Guzzo said he has pursued these types of programs with the encouragement of the freeholder board to help offset the budget, particularly state-mandated costs.

"I'm happy we're able to provide these services," Guzzo said. "Our preference would be to never fill it with kids that need to be in that secure setting, but the

reality is that this happens."

The county already maintains a similar contract with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, which rents 15 beds at the same facility for undocumented juveniles in need of secure placement pending the disposition of their resident status in Newark federal court.

This ongoing partnership, put in place in June 2009, has generated more than \$1.2 million to date. Guzzo noted that the new program is different than the arrangement with the federal government in that Bergen County will pay for the beds as they use them, on a "pay as you go" basis, while the federal government pays for a set number of beds whether they are all being used or not.

Guzzo said no space problems at the facility are anticipated and noted the number of

juveniles being incarcerated in the state as a whole has dropped due to alternate programs being offered. If a space problem does occur, the contracts will be altered to meet local needs, he said.

According to Union County, while the 76-bed facility is first and foremost a secure detention center, it's overarching theme is to promote the concept of normative justice where secure detention is viewed as an opportunity to change behavior in a way that will benefit the offender, family and the community at-large.

Officials will continue to be alert for other potential agreements with outside entities.

"We will always keep our options open for new revenue streams to offset the state mandated costs of operating a juvenile detention program," Guzzo said.

Union County benefits from federal stimulus funds

Thanks to a federal stimulus program, \$23 million has been pumped into Union County creating jobs and improving road surfaces.

The new funds come from the federal government's American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, which was enacted to provide jobs for those throughout the country who are out of work and at the same time upgrade and repair aging infrastructure.

"Union County's transportation infrastructure supports a global hub

that provides a vital economic pathway for New Jersey and the nation," said Union County Freeholder Daniel P. Sullivan, who strongly supports programs that put tax dollars to work that serve the public.

Once the county received the approval for the \$23 million in funding they began planning for infrastructure and energy efficiency improvements. However, also targeted was public safety programs and human services that included meals for seniors, job training, foreclosure guidance and housing assistance.

Of the \$23 million, \$11.3 million

had to be used for road resurfacing and improvements at key intersections. The county, according to Sullivan, just completed road resurfacing projects funded by ARRA, which add up to 12 miles of new surface that include sections of East Hazelwood Avenue, West Inman Avenue and Woodbridge Road in Rahway, Constantine Avenue in Summit, Kenilworth Boulevard in Kenilworth, Stiles Street in Linden, Salem Road in Union, Galloping Hill Road in Elizabeth, Plainfield Avenue in Berkeley Heights and Springfield and Mountainside

avenues in Springfield.

The ARRA funding will also be used to upgrade intersections and install new signals, road markings and signage for improved traffic flow and pedestrian safety. The new signals use high efficiency LED technology that reduces energy costs and saves taxpayer dollars.

Sullivan said much of the unfinished work involves upgrading curb cuts and other features required to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act. Many of these projects, he said, are located in Elizabeth. "If you look at a map of Union

County, you will see that many county roads converge on Elizabeth, along with major bus routes and rail lines," Sullivan explained. "By upgrading key intersections there, we make life easier and safer for everyone, whether you drive a passenger or commercial vehicle, use mass transit, walk or ride a bike."

"Everytime we put a shovel in the ground means more people are going to work in Union County," the freeholder chairman added.

Woman charged for 2 Springfield deaths

A Martinsville woman was arrested last week in connection with the deaths of a Springfield resident and her boyfriend, who were found dead of drug overdoses in November of last year.

Megan Plank, 20, was arrested on Sept. 29 and charged with two counts of first degree drug induced death and one count of third degree distribution of heroin.

According to authorities, Sara Malaker, 18, of Springfield and Christopher Coppola, 20, of Bridgewater, purchased heroin from Plank on Nov. 12, 2009 and returned to Malaker's home, where they were found by Malaker's mother the following day.

Union County Prosecutor Theodore Romankow said the medical examiner found both died from acute heroin intoxication.

The Springfield police first responded to the report of two unresponsive persons, but turned the investigation over to the Homicide Task force within the month. "We had looked into it initially because it was an unattended death with narcotics paraphernalia," said Springfield Detective Judd Levenson. He explained that overdoses from legal and illegal drugs are relatively common. This instance required a more in-depth investigation.

"What is a little unusual here is you will very rarely find two people together who died of narcotics intoxication," Levenson said.

"It was pretty labor intensive," Romankow said of the almost year-long investigation. "The detectives put a lot of work into tracking this down."

The charge of drug induced death is associated with the act of knowingly selling an illegal substance that can cause harm and in this case death. Judge Robert J. Mega set bail at \$200,000.

The investigation is ongoing. Anyone with information is asked to call Sgt. Dean Marcantonio at 908-527-4699.

UC's newest crime: property deed fraud

The Union County Clerk's office warns home owners in the county of Union, and owners of commercial property in the county, to beware of people who offer to sell them a certified copy of the deed to their property. Some of these companies are targeting non-English-speaking homeowners.

"Various municipalities in Union County have alerted me that their residents have been contacted by a company that offers to sell the property owner a copy of their deed," said County Clerk Joanne Rajoppi.

"These offers are not necessary. Don't be fooled. Normally, you or your attorney already have a copy of your deed."

"It is advisable to have a copy of your deed stored safely with your other important documents," added Rajoppi.

"But if you misplace or lose your deed, you can readily obtain a certified copy from my office usually for less than \$20. Scam artists are charging \$79.50 or more for the same deed. The price for a certified deed is mandated by the state and is a per-page charge."

In 2007, Rajoppi filed a formal complaint with the Office of the New Jersey Attorney General, citing the solicitation of homeowners to purchase a deed at an exorbitant, excessive cost.

Consumers who receive solicitations to buy a deed are invited to contact the New Jersey Division of Consumer Affairs at 973-504-6200 or 800-242-5846 to file a complaint.

If you can't find your deed, go directly to the County Clerk's Office where you can easily obtain a certified copy of your deed for the nominal, state-mandated fee: \$8 for the first page and \$2 for subsequent pages. There is no need to go through a middle-man who charges an exorbitant fee for this service.

Property owners are advised to be wary of people purporting to sell "actual" deeds. Only the County Clerk's Office has the real deed to your property.

Make your own conviction after reading 'The Unknown Woman'

One of the most fascinating historical events in the city of Rahway is unveiled in "The Case of the Unknown Woman," published by Dorrance Publishing Co. Inc., a factual mystery, which took place during the 19th century.

The book, which was written Rahway city historian F. Alexander Shipley of Rahway, who is also a research consultant for Rahway Public Library and director of museum operations at Merchants & Drovers Tavern Museum and serves as its newsletter editor, could easily be interpreted as a suspense novel. However, the only novel part of "The Case of the Unknown Woman" is its intrigue in numerous frantic attempts to solve the mystery by the mayor of Rahway, the police chief in Elizabeth, local newspaper reporters and many of the townspeople themselves, including the undertaker.

Unfortunately, reading the book is not like watching a segment of "Law and Order," where communications with officials are readily available through modern techniques. Back in 1887, in order to obtain vital information, one must rely on telephone calls, local and long-distance; written statements; investigative travels — by train, mostly, but by horse and wagon, too — the imaginative ideas prompted by hearsay, and personal, and sometimes incorrigible interviews.

It appears, according to Shipley, that on March 25, 1887, the mutilated body of a murdered young woman was discovered on Central Avenue, close to St. Georges Avenue, and Jefferson Avenue by a young man on his way to work. Police Chief William Tooker was notified, when the young man ran to the police station. Her throat was cut, and near the corpse lay her cape, umbrella, hat and a willow basket filled with eggs.

It was further reported that nearly half the Rahway dwellers were suspect, and the other half believed they they may have known the "unknown woman" as perhaps a relative, an employed or unemployed young woman, a long-lost wife, sister, child.

Newspaper stories, local and out-of-town, prompted strangers to attempt to follow a lead of their lost ones toward identification. And frustration after frustration overwhelmed the city, as thousands lined up daily in the city morgue to view the body and the clothes and acces-

sories exhibited nearby.

Each chapter begins with a date, from Saturday, March 26, 1887, to Wednesday Oct. 24, to Saturday, Oct. 27, 1888.

Unquestionably, Shipley delves into the intricacies of the lives of the innumerable suspicious characters, and a reader is presented with too much information, but hardly enough to convict any one person. He offers open hearings of testimonies in City Hall, questions and answers that interestingly read like a movie script.

These personal hearings involving the residents of Rahway, even with yes and no answers often offer a break to readers from a straining text and serious connotations. So many are suspect, and yet, these same people have alibis to prove their innocence.

Therefore, who is the real murderer? Where does the innocent suddenly become the guilty?

The author may have his own ideas on the gory subject; but a reader may find justification in regard to the actual outcome of such a situation. There are so many complications in all of the details that even a writer, who has obtained bachelor and master degrees, taught high school English in two different schools for 33 years, has created four different books, is a research consultant and museum director, still

cannot come up with the perfect answer. Perhaps when "The Case of the Unknown Woman" leaves the Rahway Cemetery, also known as St. Georges Avenue Cemetery, and takes a journey on the shelf of this reviewer's library, it will have a consultation with the other mystery books there — and come to a true conclusion.

From photos to novel, Shipley retells murder mystery

According to F. Alexander Shipley of Rahway, "The Case of the Unknown Woman," is not just another murder mystery.

It is, a true book that is derived from an insurmountable amount of research time, a fierce loyalty to the city of Rahway, a refreshingly unique approach to the restoration of a mysterious murder event that took place in 1887 and the satisfaction of the success of the author's story.

And, it still goes beyond the recognition of Shipley's literary gems. With the publication of his book, the association will conduct its 16th annual tour at Rahway Cemetery, also known as St. Georges Avenue Cemetery, with an "expected 600 visitors" to be escorted to 12 graves of people who were involved in the case of the unknown woman on Oct. 9 and 10.

"At the first tour," said Shipley, during a recent conversation, "we were asked simply to take a tour of the graves at the cemetery. I thought there would be about 20 people, but there was a line of about 84 people waiting to get in. I had to get three other fellows who knew something about the history. Each year, the group of tourists grew. We soon got actors

to play the roles of the people involved. Before long, we had 14 sites, working scripts, I got the best people I possibly can with 27 actors on site; and that was when I began to write the book of the unknown woman.

"The story of the unknown woman is a story I've known since I was 10 years old," explained Shipley. "We had the city's centennial in 1958. There was a publication put out by the centennial committee. And in that 60-page booklet," he said, "there was one page on this mystery. My father was on the committee."

Shipley added "I remember sitting there as a youngster all by myself and being enthralled by that one page. Then early in the 1970s, we were celebrating the bicentennial of the country, our mayor and the city council asked me to do a history of the city. So, I wrote 'A Rediscovery of Rahway,' which was published in 1975. I did a lot on all the aspects of the city. In the ensuing years," Shipley reminded, "the Merchants & Drovers Museum asked me to do a fund-raising project in book form: That was 'Images of the Past I' in 1997, and in 2005, I did a fundraiser for them, 'Images of the Past II.'"

Shipley explained that "over the years we

had a lot of photographs, and we never did much with them. Back in February 2005, I became research consultant for the Rahway Public Library." This was after 33 years of a teaching profession — he taught at Linden High School from 1970 to 1979, and at Rahway High School from 1979 to 2003.

"I had contacted Rahway residents, old-timers, whose relatives were buried in the cemetery. I did a lot of research over the course of those years. I went on the Times website and found material going back to the 1800s."

Shipley chuckled. "I had a couple of hundred pages of material. So, I sat down to organize it by decade. And I found the pile from 1880 was the biggest. Would you believe," he gasped, "that I counted 55 articles in the New York Times about this murder? So, I said to myself, if I ever do another book, I have to have a chapter on the unknown woman who was murdered in Rahway. I started to write a report that ran about three pages, but as I got into the research, I realized it could become a book. This was in 2006, and I had made up my mind that I would be going along with this thing."

Shipley then perused 16 newspapers,

including those from New York, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., and Newark.

"My whole life was spent in those places," he said. "I even went down to the archives in Trenton and to Rutgers' library. I had all of this raw material of newspaper accounts. I organized everything and set out to string the stories together. My biggest concern from the very start was that I had my hands on this great story, and I wondered if I could tell the story in an effective way that would do justice to the story."

Of all the suspects in the book, which one, in the author's opinion, was the most suspicious?

"You know," he sighed, "whenever I give a talk on this book, that's the first question that comes up. 'Who do you think did it?' And I answer, 'I really don't know.' And," Shipley mused, "actually, I don't want to know, because then the story will be over. I want to make it an even more intriguing story, because there's no answer."

The book was finished by early 2009, and was proofed by 10 critical readers — accomplished people. And, Shipley said proudly, "when I got the green light from this, I knew I had something good."







Overlook focuses on youth eating habits

The Goryeb Children's Center at Overlook Hospital announced the expansion of the Eating Disorders Program at Atlantic Health to include a partial hospitalization program and an inpatient medical stabilization program.

The Eating Disorders Program, which treats anorexia, bulimia, and related eating disorders, is the only comprehensive, multidisciplinary program in New Jersey exclusively for children and adolescents.

"Previously, patients could come to the Goryeb Children's Center and receive outpatient services but, if they needed additional intensive treatment, they would have to leave their communities and sometimes the state to find that level of care," said Leslie Sanders, MD, medical director of the Eating Disorders Program at Atlantic Health, and interim director of adolescent medicine. "Now that we offer a complete continuum of care for eating disorder patients, they can remain close to home, which allows their families to fully participate in the recovery process."

The partial hospitalization program, which meets for 40 hours per week, offers individual, group and family psychotherapy; yoga; art therapy; two therapeutic meals with observation per day and daily med-

ical evaluation with a registered nurse.

The staff consists of physicians, psychologists, nutritionists, a psychiatrist, social workers and creative arts therapists.

According to the National Eating Disorders Association, eating disorders affect about 10 million females and 1 million males in the United States.

About 40 percent of newly diagnosed cases of anorexia are in girls ages 15 to 19. Eating disorders most commonly begin in adolescence and can cause a variety of serious medical complications and, if left untreated, can be fatal.

"As we open a brand new pediatric subspecialty suite on the Overlook campus, we are also proud to expand our eating disorders services," said Walter Rosenfeld, MD, chairman of pediatrics for the Goryeb Children's Center at Overlook and the Goryeb Children's Hospital at Morristown Memorial Hospital, all part of Atlantic Health.

The Eating Disorders Program at Atlantic Health is based in the MAC II building, adjacent to Overlook.



Summit is 4-0 for the second straight year and has won a county-best 16 straight.

However, the Hilltoppers were down to visiting Hillside 18-7 at halftime last Saturday before coming back to win by the score of 28-18.

Summit outscored the Comets 21-0 in the third quarter to produce the comeback victory.

The Hilltoppers will have a very challenging contest at Johnson tomorrow night at 7 at Nolan Field in Clark.

The Crusaders are coming off a tough 17-14 double overtime non-conference loss at Group 1 Brearley last Friday night.

New Providence, which was one of three teams off last weekend, has the county's second-longest winning streak at four.

New Providence is set to clash at Brearley tomorrow night at 7 at Ward Field in Kenilworth.

Brearley has won the last two games in the series and has come out on top four of the past five seasons.

Brearley is now 73-17 (.811) under ninth-year head coach Scott Miller. His record against Group 2 schools is now 24-4 (14-1 at home and 10-3 on the road) and vs. Group 3 teams 1-0 since he took over in 2002.

Plainfield is 2-1 for the first time since 2005 and defeated Union for the first time since that same season.

Cranford is 3-1 for the first time since 2004. The third win that year to improve to 3-1 was a 28-14 win at Scotch Plains. Cranford came back to beat Scotch Plains 21-14 at home last Friday night to improve to 3-1.

Roselle Park has lost 18 straight and Elizabeth 10 in a row.

Almost a third of the teams in the county — five of 17 — are still without a win.

Gov. Livingston, off last weekend, is playing its first league game Saturday. The Highlanders are hosting Cranford in Mid-State 39 Conference-East B Division action in Berkeley Heights.

Cranford is 0-3 the past three years vs. GL since playing in the same division. Cranford's defensive coordinator this year is former GL head coach Joe Hubert.

Cranford football lifted by play of Papandrea, James Scores all 21 of its points in 4th quarter

CRANFORD — It was one thing for Cranford to lose to a 2-0 North Plainfield team at home two Friday nights ago.

It would have been quite another thing for the Cougars to have gone down to a 0-3 Scotch Plains squad last Friday night, despite being without the services of injured three-year starters Sean Trotter and Justin Van Ostenbridge.

Well, it almost happened.

It was a combination of Scotch Plains playing its best game of the year — especially on defense — and Cranford failing to put anything together offensively.

However, after it took the Cougars 40 minutes to get on the scoreboard, there would be no denying Cranford this time.

Senior quarterback Joe Papandrea engineered what might go down as the best Cranford drive of the year to finally get his team into the end zone with 8:06 left in the fourth quarter.

After the first Cougar touchdown tied the game, junior defensive back Walter James — in just his second varsity start — picked off two passes that led to short, touchdown-scoring drives.

Scotch Plains, which kept on fighting and never backed down, came back to score the game's final touchdown with two minutes left.

Then Cranford held on for a hard-fought, come-from-behind, 21-14 non-conference triumph at Memorial Field.

Papandrea scored all three Cranford touchdowns in the fourth quarter and ended up rushing 23 times for a team-high 116 yards.

"They might be 0-4, but they've got people that can play over there," Papandrea said of the Scotch Plains effort. "They gave us all we could handle."

The first two varsity interceptions by James both came in the fourth quarter.

"On the first interception I listened to my call, I read No. 2 — the guy I was covering — and I just came up and picked him up and read the quarterback's eyes," James said. "I got a good break on the ball."

"I just got lucky on the second one. We practice the tip drill every day before the games, so I guess that helps out."

Scotch Plains limited Cranford's spread option to just 77 yards of total offense — 67 rushing on 15 attempts and 10 passing — in the first half and just six on its first possession of the second half.

Then Papandrea engineered one of the best drives of the year. He led Cranford on its second possession of the second half to a 91-yard march that took 9:10 and covered 19 plays. The Cougars made five first downs on the drive and committed no penalties.

Papandrea ended the drive by scoring from four yards out.

"Every yard was a struggle," Cranford head coach Erik Rosenmeier said. "I think Scotch Plains did a great job preparing and a great job effort-wise."

"That drive was really the one that determined the game, because I think, somewhere, finally — it took us three quarters — in that drive we started to take over in terms of the line of scrimmage. It was very, very difficult, but I think only partially through that drive did we finally start to get the edge."

"Up until that point, they had the edge."

R. Catholic boys' soccer wins 6 of first 8 matches

Senior Perez leads way with 12 goals

The Roselle Catholic boys' soccer team put a representative squad on the field last season, sparked by senior all-county goalkeeper Stephen Patricco.

This year's squad is just as competitive, if not more. The difference so far is that the Lions found a player capable of putting the ball in the net.

That player is forward Joe Perez.

The senior from Roselle Park scored 12 of his team's first 15 goals to lead the Lions to a 6-2-0 start entering Monday's scheduled 4 p.m. Union County Conference-Valley Division home game vs. Brearley.

Perez, a three-year starter who transferred from Roselle Park before his sophomore season, was Roselle Catholic's sweeper last year, scoring four goals from the defensive position.

"Joe did a great job on defense for us last year and we didn't give up many goals," second-year Roselle Catholic head coach Scot Simpson said. "However, we didn't score many goals."

The Lions, according to Simpson, netted under 20 goals last year during a 6-13-2 finish.

Perez is on pace to finish with more than 20 himself this season, while Roselle Catholic has already matched last year's win total.

"I felt we had a very good team last year, a senior team, but we didn't have a pure goal scorer," Simpson said. "Perez is one of those kids you can play anywhere on the field, so we put him up top."

Perez scored both goals — one in each half — in the season-opening 2-0 conference win at Brearley on Sept. 14. He then scored in the first half for the game's only goal in a 1-0 conference home victory over Roselle Park two days later.

Rahway defeated Roselle Catholic 1-0 at RC in a non-conference match before the Lions came back to beat Marist 4-1 in Bayonne. Perez scored all four Roselle Catholic goals in the non-conference triumph for his first hat-trick of the season.

Perez scored two more goals in a 4-2 conference home win vs. Hillside and then produced another game-winning goal in a 2-1 conference home triumph over Roselle. Perez struck for two more goals in RC's 2-1 non-conference victory at Rutgers Prep.

In the only game the team played last week, Perez and Roselle Catholic were shut out on the road by Mountain Division foe Summit 4-0.

So, in the team's first eight matches, Perez had scored in six of them and had the game-winning goal in five. He scored at least one goal in six games, at least two in four and had the one hat-trick vs. Marist where he scored four times.

Roselle Catholic was 6-0-0 so far in games he scored and 0-2-0 in games he didn't.

"Playing him at sweeper last year was a last-minute decision," Simpson said. "I wasn't happy with our center backs, so we tried him at the sweeper role and he did a phenomenal job in a scrimmage, so I kept him there."

"Now, obviously, he's playing well up front for us."

The other three Roselle Catholic goals among the first 14 were scored by senior midfielder Mike Mercurio and senior defenseman Chris Gomes vs. Hillside and senior midfielder Joe Mucha against Roselle. Mucha's goal tied the Roselle match at 1-1.

Leading the team in assists so far is senior midfielder Wensley Arrieta with four.

Roselle Catholic has a couple of comeback wins under its belt. Hillside led the Lions 2-0 before Perez scored the first RC goal right before halftime.

Roselle Catholic trailed Rutgers Prep 1-0 at the half before Perez struck for two second half goals.

"The kids have stayed focused and have pulled out some wins," Simpson said.

In goal are seniors Chris Moore and Eithan Neiman. They have combined for two shutouts so far.

A 5-3-2 formation includes Gomes, junior Brendan Cross, junior Andy Altamirano, sophomore Sean Cohen and senior Matt Ramirez on defense. In the midfield are Mercurio, Arrieta and Mucha and up front are Perez and sophomore Aryel Olivera.

NOTES: Summit began the fourth week of the season 4-2-1, while Rahway was 4-5. Summit scored three times in the first half and once in the second half in its 4-0 home win over Roselle Catholic.

Also in the Mountain Division of the UCC, Rahway fell at Summit 4-1 Friday to drop to 4-5. The Indians had won three straight to even their record at 4-4.

"Our loss to Rahway came in the last 10 minutes," Simpson said. "That was a match that could have gone either way."

Simpson was an assistant coach at Roselle Catholic in 2007 and 2008 before becoming the head coach last season. He is a 2004 Westfield graduate.

Roselle Catholic began the week 4-0 in Valley Division play. The other five teams in the division are Dayton, Brearley, Roselle Park, Hillside and Roselle.

Roselle Catholic's conference game at Dayton last Thursday was rained out and — as of Monday — still had to be rescheduled.

Patricco, a Union resident, was one of two Roselle Catholic seniors in the Class of 2010 that received acceptance into the prestigious United States Naval Academy at Annapolis.

The other was Kathleen O'Brien of Elizabeth.

It was the first time in the school's history that two RC seniors were accepted at the school.

Also a baseball standout who batted leadoff and played shortstop for the Lions his senior year, Patricco started to play goalie on the soccer team at RC his sophomore year.

A three-year starter, Patricco was First Team All-Conference his junior and senior seasons and Second Team All-County and Honorable Mention All-State by The Star-Ledger his senior year.





Then, now with the score tied 7-7 and Scotch Plains beginning just its third possession of the second half, James picked off a Steve Alleman pass on what was just the seventh offensive play of the half by Scotch Plains.

Before that, the Raiders were limited to 30 yards rushing on five carries and no yards on one pass during its first two second-half possessions.

Alleman threw the ball over the middle, with his pass intended for 6-4 junior wide receiver Matt Jegede. The interception set up Cranford's and Papandrea's second of three fourth quarter touchdowns, which was a 23-yard run.

Jegede caught three passes for 48 yards and one touchdown in the first half. Two of the receptions were balls he held on to that were thrown his way over the middle, while the touchdown reception was against single coverage in the left corner of the end zone.

Another interception by James off a tipped pass led to Papandrea scoring from four yards out again. It was Cranford sophomore linebacker Nick Diaz that tipped the pass near the line of scrimmage.

Cranford rushed 30 times in the second half for 140 yards.

Scotch Plains didn't give up as Alleman engineered an 80-yard drive that culminated with him completing a 35-yard touchdown pass to senior wide receiver Moussa Channaoui with 2:16 left.

"You have nothing to be ashamed of," is what Scotch Plains head coach Steve Ciccotelli told his team after the game.

"They made more plays than us. You guys did a great job. It just didn't go our way."

Ciccotelli was right.

Scotch Plains produced a solid, consistent effort that put itself in position to gain its first win of the season.

The Raiders may not play a better game this year, even in victory.

"We played our hearts out today," said Alleman, who completed 5-of-13 passes for 95 yards, two touchdowns and three interceptions.

"In the last quarter we started to shut down. The whole game - that was us."

Scotch Plains fell to 0-4 and is 0-1 in the Mid-State 39 Conference's West B Division. The following four games are against division opponents, beginning with this Saturday's 2:30 p.m. home kickoff against Somerville.

Games are starting later this Saturday - Oct. 9 - because of SATs.

Somerville is 1-3 overall and 0-1 in the division after falling at home to North Plainfield 33-6 last Friday night in its league-opener.

Cranford bounced back from a 28-14 non-conference loss to visiting North Plainfield two weeks ago to improve to 3-1 overall.

The Cougars are 1-0 in the Mid-State 39 Conference's East B Division.

Cranford's second division game will be at Governor Livingston Saturday at 2:30 p.m. in Berkeley Heights. GL is 0-3 and has not yet played a game against a fellow East B Division opponent.

Since moving into the same division as GL in 2007, Cranford is 0-3 against the Highlanders.

Friday night's game was scoreless until Scotch Plains was able to put the ball in the end zone on its third drive, which started on the Raider 36.

A big play in the march was a 36-yard run by Alleman down to the Cranford seven-yard line.

Two plays later on third-and-goal from the 10, Alleman rolled left and found Jegede open in the left corner of the end zone for the first of his two touchdown passes.

Alleman's TD pass to Channaoui was also in the left corner of the other end zone and vs. single coverage.

Although the Raiders did not come out victorious, they can be very proud of the performance they put forth. What they now need to do is carry that momentum into this week's game.

"We played amazing this game and our defense was outstanding," Alleman.

That defense was led by numerous tackles from the likes of junior tackle Dan Lynch, junior outside linebacker Andrew Miller, senior cornerback Connor Thompson, linebacker Brett Kovacs, senior end Matt Manns, senior linebacker Neville Hall, senior outside linebacker Kyle Berwick and senior safety Sean Coloney.

The unit did a good job of containing Papandrea, who is a three-year starter, for the first three quarters.

"We just have to keep it up and we'll move on through the rest of the season," Alleman said.

Scotch Plains senior running back Quenton Blackwell had a top-notch game rushing the ball, carrying 18 times for a game-high 130 yards.

He gained 77 on seven attempts in the first half and 53 on 11 in the second.

It was his best performance of the season and arguably his best of the past two seasons.

"I really enjoy playing with Kate," said Melissa, who's also a two-year varsity starter for the Lions' girls basketball team. "We work really well together and we can balance out each other's weaknesses. It's our first time playing together and I'm really enjoying it."

"I have always thought about how fun it would be playing with Kate. We have been to so many of each other's game, but all we were able to do was cheer each other on and watch. This is our chance to finally work together."

Mr. and Mrs. Tobie can be proud there's no sibling rivalry here.

"We get along very well off the field, so it's a lot of fun to play with Melissa on the field," said Kate Tobie, who enjoyed playing with her sister and future teammates in a couple of summer leagues. "I think we have good chemistry when we play together."

"I like being able to talk with Melissa about the games we play."

"We talk on our way to school and before we go to bed. I think that's my favorite part, and how we both just know where the other is going to be on the field."

Tobie's teammates and coaches have noticed that sisterly connection.

"They know exactly where each other is on the field," said first-year Roselle Catholic assistant coach Elizabeth Lanigan, a 2005 RC graduate and former goalie for both the Lions and the Kean Cougars.

"Growing up with each other, they just seem to have a special connection that's hard to explain," said Lanigan played with her younger sister, Sarah, at Roselle Catholic. BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Committee of the Township of Springfield, County of Union, State of New Jersey that Chapter VIII entitled, "Taxicabs and Limousines" is hereby amended as follows:

SECTION I. Subsection 8-7.3 entitled, "Issuance of License; Contents; Fee;" of Section 8-7 entitled, "Regulation of Limousines" is hereby amended by requiring the Township to charge limousine licensing fees consistent with N.J.S.A. 48:16-17. The amendment shall read as follows:

8-7.3 Issuance of License; Contents; Fee.

The Township Clerk, in accordance with N.J.S.A. 48:16-17, upon the filing of the required insurance policy and the payment of a fee of fifty (\$50.00) dollars for each limousine service plus ten (\$10.00) dollars for each limousine which is covered under the required insurance policy, shall issue in duplicate a license to operate showing that the owner of the limousine has complied with the terms hereof. Such license shall recite the name of the insurance company, the number and date of expiration of the policy a description of each limousine issued thereunder, and the registration number of each.

SECTION II. If any article, section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is, for any reason, held to be unconstitutional or invalid, such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of this Ordinance and they shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION III. In the event of any inconsistencies between the provisions of this Ordinance and any prior ordinance of the Township of Springfield, the provisions hereof shall be determined to govern. All other parties, portions and provisions of Chapter II of the Revised General Ordinances of the Township of Springfield are hereby ratified and confirmed, except where inconsistent with the terms hereof.


