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Linden school board pushes to end primary voting

LINDEN – The school board is seeking to have June primary voting removed from the district's schools, despite having already been met with sharp criticism and accusations of voter suppression by Mayor Derek Armstead.

The board, at its Aug. 28 meeting, voted to authorize President Raymond Topoleski to send a letter to the city clerk and the Union County Board of Elections, asking for other sites to be used for polling.

Emotions ran high at the meeting where board members tried to figure out how a copy of a letter drafted and signed by superintendent Danny Robertozzi ended up in Armstead's hands before it could be sent to the city clerk and the elections board six weeks ago.

Another point of contention at the meeting was the fact that board members Gregory Martucci and Katarzyna Kozak were quoted in Armstead's Aug. 7 press release

that condemned the removal of voting from the schools. Vice president Theresa Villani said that ethics charges will be filed with the New Jersey School Board Association against two board members stemming from, amongst other things, the fact that the original letter was "leaked" to Armstead.

Villani declined to reveal which members would be accused with the charges.

"There is one person that is going to file it and then we'll see what happens at our September meeting," she said. "I can't see the future, but what could happen is the board could vote to enjoin that grievance, meaning the majority of the board supports the ethics grievance and that we stand behind it."

The idea of moving primary voting out of the schools goes back to June, when some board members said they heard from several parents who complained they had to adhere to stricter school security measures adopted by the board in April.

The parents were upset they had to produce identification, but voters were allowed to enter the school without any vetting.

Board members, conjuring images of mass school shootings such as the ones at Columbine and Sandy Hook, said allowing people into the schools during primary voting creates a safety concern.

"It is the responsibility of every commissioner in this room to ensure that our children are returned to their parents the way they are dropped off each and every day to our buildings," said board member Tracey

Birch. "I will do that every day. Election days are no different. When I took this oath, it was to ensure their safety for 180 days, not just 179 days. While we don't allow the general public to enter our buildings unescorted any other time, and by allowing the general public access to our buildings, it goes against our safety policy."

Armstead scoffed at the idea that there is a safety issue at the schools. In a statement dated Aug. 7, he said there has never been an incident during a primary.

He characterized the school board's call

Ousted Roselle school board member appeals to the state

ROSELLE – The school board member who was dismissed during a combative, sometimes chaotic meeting attended by about 200 people has filed an appeal seeking immediate reinstatement.

Archange Antoine, an eight-year member and the longest-serving on the board, was removed by a 5-4 vote at the Aug. 27 meeting in the Abraham Clark High School Auditorium.

Daniel Antonelli, Antoine's attorney, provided LocalSource with a copy of the 40-page appeal, dated Aug. 29, that was sent to the Department of Education commissioner.

The process of removing Antoine was set in motion at the Aug. 16 meeting when board President Patricia Fabrizio cited board policy No. 145, which states that a "member who fails to attend three consecutive regular meetings of the board without good cause may be removed from office." She also cited statute NJSA 18A: 12-3, which allows for a removal based on three consecutive absences.

At the Aug. 16 meeting, board administrator Anthony Juskiewicz said Antoine had missed five consecutive meetings in the spring. Fabrizio said Antoine also missed meetings

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Inspired by 9-11, Mountainside man becomes cyber warrior

As Nick Perez-Santalla sits in his office in the Pentagon, it sometimes dawns on him how his life has come full circle.

The attack on the World Trade Center on Sept. 11, 2001 felt personal, considering there had always been a feeling of awe and pride associated with being able to look out from a spot on U.S. Route 22 not far from his home in Mountainside and catch a glimpse of the Twin Towers rising in the distance.

Maybe it was personal, if you consider his dad, Javier, worked there when they were bombed in 1993.

That earnest, eager Union Catholic High School senior who was inspired to enlist mere weeks after the attacks on 9/11 has grown up to become U.S. Army Master Sgt. Nick Perez-Santalla, a communications specialist who has spent a year in Iraq and has been deployed to Afghanistan five times.

When he shows up to work every day at the Pentagon, the emotions he felt after those attacks are sometimes stirred and he's reminded why he has dedicated his life to defending his country.

On this Sept. 11, he said he plans to take some time out to quietly reflect on the events of 17 years ago and to consider how fate has brought him to work in one of the buildings that was attacked on 9/11.

"I thought about it recently," Perez-Santalla said. "I saw one of those 9/11 patches in the shape of the Pentagon and the 11 on the inside was formed by the Twin Towers. I said, 'Man, that's funny. My father worked in that Trade

Center and I'm now working in the Pentagon because of that day. That's pretty, I don't want to say it's pretty cool. But it's pretty cool."

Perez-Santalla was 10 when the Towers were attacked in February 1993. A Ryder truck filled with explosives detonated in the underground garage, killing six people and injuring many more.

There was no word from his father, who was a senior executive at Cantor Fitzgerald and worked in the North Tower. This was the days before cell phones, so the family was resigned to sit and wait for what seemed like an eternity. When he came through the front door later that night, he was still covered in black soot from the attack.

When terrorists commandeered two passenger jets and used them to knock down the Towers eight years later, Perez-Santalla and his classmates were quarantined in the gym. He looked at the fear on their faces and knew he had to act.

"Maybe it would have been different if it was a one-time event," he said. "But it was like, 'Again? Oh, no absolutely not.' I became Captain America."

Perez-Santalla found himself halfway around the world, in harm's way time and time again.

"You constantly had to keep your guard up, especially if you were on one of those three-day drives from Beirut to Kuwait," he said.

As Perez-Santalla put it, "Anything could come from anywhere at any time."

His role in installing communications lines and providing tactical intelligence to the commanders in

Controversial Trump billboard comes down after brief run

UNION — A billboard at the center of the township that became the center of a nationwide controversy has been taken down seemingly as suddenly as it went up.

For eight days, a billboard sporting a photo of President Trump and the phrase "Our Leader The Idiot" greeted motorists and pedestrians on the eastbound side of Morris Avenue between Rahway and Elmwood avenues.

It stoked emotions on social media and prompted hundreds to call the township.

Television news crews filmed segments near the site and tempers ran hot on New Jersey 101.5-FM radio.

Reporters from New York-based tabloids descended on the town and USA Today picked up on the story.

The attention became so intense, the township issued an official comment on social media and the committee passed a resolution to denounce it.

On the afternoon of Wednesday Aug. 29, the billboard was replaced with public service ad.

And now that the Trump Billboard, as it was simply known in town, is gone and residents such as Ronnie Giameo are eager to get back to life as normal.

"It's done," Giameo said. "I'm happy it's over with and we can put it behind us finally and just move forward."

The billboard, owned by Out Front Media, was paid for by Neil Harrison, a Bronx-based activist and filmmaker who was using the billboard to promote a documentary film.

Harrison, in an Aug. 31 phone interview, indicated the executives at Out Front Media seemed hesitant to post the billboard from the start. As it began to attract more and more attention, Harrison said they must have been receiving more and more calls. He said they stopped returning his calls after a few days, so he had a feeling Out Front

Media would not allow him to renew the billboard for an additional month.

Harrison said the executives at Out Front Media called him on Aug. 29 to tell him the company was going to take the billboard down and refund him a prorated portion of the \$1,000 he had paid them.

"My first reaction was, 'Guys, let's discuss this. You are using emotion here,'" Harrison said. "The gentleman (from Out Front Media) kept repeating the same thing: 'We've made our decision and case closed.' There was no discussion."

Two phone messages and an email sent to Out Front Media seeking comment were not returned.

The billboard was the topic of discussion, however, in the corridors of many of the municipal buildings, township spokeswoman Natalie Pineiro said. Hundreds of calls were coming in to office of public information and other departments. Many of the calls were from people out of the area, if not outside the state. When she arrived at work Monday, Aug. 27, Pineiro said she had 37 messages on her voicemail.

Although some callers supported the billboard and its message, most said they thought calling the president an idiot was inappropriate.

"I think it was mostly, it wasn't necessarily that someone was expressing their opinion or promoting a movie that was against Donald Trump," Pineiro said in an Aug. 31 phone interview. "I think it was mostly the language. We pride ourselves on having this really strong unity and no matter what we do we kind of respect each other. I really think that was the straw that broke the camel's back. It was seen as a lack of respect."

Pineiro said the controversy spilled over onto the township's official Facebook page, where Trump supporters were met with anti-Trump sentiment. Calls to show respect for the president and the office of the presidency were met

by defenders of free speech.

Pineiro said people are free to express their views on the page, but the town's policy restricts the use of profanity, cyberbullying, harassment, personal attacks and name-calling.

"People are given a warning, like, 'Please edit your post or it will be removed,' and we had to remove quite a few," Pineiro said.

By Aug. 23, the township issued an official statement on its Facebook page that a "potentially offensive billboard has gone up on Morris Ave promoting a documentary about the president. We wanted to take this time to remind you all that while we take these matters very seriously, billboards are privately owned and as such the Township of Union has no authority or or role in approving what goes up on each of them."

Five days later, the Township Committee passed a resolution denouncing the billboard.

"The Township Committee prides itself on the Township's diversity and inclusion, and does not promote hate speech of any kind," Mayor Suzette Cavadas said reading from the resolution.

The following day, Pineiro forwarded a statement to LocalSource saying, "The resolution passed yesterday evening is a testament to the fact that this billboard does not represent the values of our residents, government or administration. We believe in the concepts of common decency and respect not matter who you are or what you believe in."

As the town was moving to distance itself from the billboard, Harrison was reveling in the attention it was receiving, saying his \$1,000 investment was generating \$1 million in publicity.

"I'm not shocked that made waves," Harrison said. "I'm See **TRUMP**, Page 16



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Longtime Cranford firefighter eulogized by mayor

CRANFORD — Mayor Tom Hannen's voice cracked with emotion as he paid tribute to longtime resident Brian Koshney at the close of the Aug. 14 township committee meeting.

Hannen remembered Koshney, 50, who died of cancer earlier that day at Overlook Medical Center in Summit.

The resident was a repairman for the Cranford pools for 32 years and a mechanic at Cranford Sunoco for many years. He also served in Cranford Fire Department as a part-time firefighter for 23 years.

The mayor said Koshney was made a lieutenant in the call department in 2016.

"Brian was always willing to help people, and loved telling stories of fires past with both the older members of the fire department and passing those stories down to the newer members of the department," he said.

Hannen said that during the previous few weeks, the Cranford Fire Department had included Koshney in their morning radio test, which he

answered from his room at the Cranford Rehab and Nursing Center on Birchwood Avenue.

"This morning, Brian didn't answer the radio test," Hannen said. "Brian's answered his final bell, and we will miss him very much."

According to the mayor, anyone who stopped at the Sunoco on a Saturday morning or afternoon would see Koshney emerging from the bays to welcome the customers with his signature greeting: "Hello, Puddin'!"

Hannen added that there's no doubt that Koshney would be "telling those stories of fires past as old firemen tend to do and keeping that firehouse in the sky ready and manned for the rest of us until we make the final call. Rest in peace, Brian."

Koshney was predeceased by his parents, Raymond and Anne. He is survived by his sisters Kathleen O'Brien and Theresa Brownlee; brother, Dan Koshney; nieces and nephews Dylan, Reagan, Taylor, Kennedy and Lochlyn; and the Petschow and Dolan families.

A GoFundMe account has been set up to help his family pay for Koshney's funeral expenses

to remove voting out of concern for students a "smoke-screen."

"The superintendent and the majority on the school board aren't really concerned about who comes to vote; they just don't like who the residents are voting for," Armstead said in the press release. "This is about creating chaos and suppressing the turnout in the June 2019 primary, pure and simple. They were openly opposed to my re-election, are furious at the results and want to create confusion and chaos."

Armstead, who backed Fanwood Mayor Colleen Mahr for the Union County Democratic chair earlier against Linden Democratic chairman and state Sen. Nicholas Scutari earlier this year, ran unendorsed for the Democratic nomination for Linden mayor in June and won.

His statement was a response to a letter drafted and signed by Robertozzi and addressed to John DeSimone, chairman of the Union County Board of Elections, and Joseph Bodek, the Linden municipal clerk.

According to a copy of the letter, which Armstead provided to LocalSource, the purpose for it was "to request the County Board of Elections and/or the municipal clerk remove all polling sites from the Linden Public Schools."

Robertozzi said he had every board member's permission in June to draft the letter. However, Armstead said in his release that Martucci and Kozak told him "there was a no vote" in regards to drafting the letter.

Martucci was quoted in the Armstead's release as saying, "To my knowledge there have been no complaints about the safety of our students and staff on primary election days. Safety on this day has NEVER (sic) been an issue."

"As a duly elected guardian of our schools, I am appalled that a baseless allegation has been asserted."

Kozak was quoted in the release as saying that her "concern lies when correspondences are sent without any formal action by the board of education and notified of it after it was released. This request was not approved by the board and misleadingly indicates the board's consent."

Martucci was not at the meeting, but Kozak was asked about quotes that appeared in newspaper reports last month. Board president Raymond Topoleski said that, according to board policy, he is the only member allowed to speak to reporters.

Villani asked Kozak: "Did you also go for training stating that you as a board member have no right to talk to any of the press."

"But I didn't," Kozak said.

"You're recorded in newspapers and press releases," Villani continued. "So you violated ethics from the board, you and Mr. Martucci. And you lied, in my opinion."

Kozak declined to comment after the meeting.

Board member Elizabeth Welsh also used the meeting as a chance to respond to Armstead's accusation that "the majority of the school board is aligned with Scutari" and that "either he is behind this cynical move or one of his fiefdoms is out of control."

"There is no one controlling anyone on this board," Welsh said. "As far as I'm concerned, I'll speak personally for myself. Sen. Scutari, I've never personally spoken to the man."

Villani interrupted to say she has met Scutari "like one and a half times."

Welsh then continued: "I have no relationship with him. He does not control what I say. He does not control what I do. I find that — I was very disturbed when I read that in the article that the board members not all because it was limited to certain ones are controlled by other people and I am here to say that I am not controlled by anyone."

Armstead did not respond to messages left for him at City Hall.

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

with the members of the board's Personnel, Negotiations, Legislative and Finance committees.

According to Antoine, who serves as executive director of Faith in New Jersey and policy director for New Jersey Clergy Coalition for Justice, said he had good cause for missing four of the meetings. On May 15, he was working at the Islamic Center of Passaic County; on May 24, Antoine, who is Haitian-American, was attending Haitian Flag Day; on June 11, he was working to gain support for a bill that would require every fatal police shooting in the state to be investigated by a special prosecutor; and on June 25 he was away attending a gun violence conference and visiting an immigration-detention center in California.

According to the appeal, Antoine did not violate policy No. 145 because he missed only one "regular" meeting.

Antonelli included a copy of the BOE's regular meeting schedule approved in January.

"The actions of the board are shocking and disturbing," Antonelli said in an Aug. 29 interview with LocalSource. "Their failure to follow their own policy on a board member's removal means any member of the board at any time can be removed on a whim simply because they do not share in the same views as the majority."

BOE attorney Allan Roth said Antoine has 20 days to file an appeal with the office of the commissioner.

Audience members, many of whom used the public comments portion of the meeting to praise Antoine's commitment to Roselle, where he grew up, and the schools he has served, fell silent after the vote.

There was some applause as Antoine climbed down the stairs from the stage. As the board members grabbed their papers and went into executive session, Antoine was greeted by residents who shook his hand, patted him on the back and hugged him.

Members of the audience called out words of encouragement to Antoine throughout the meeting. During the public comment portion, they formed a line up the center aisle and talked about the work he does in the community and across the state in such areas as immigration and "social justice".

"He has been a member of St. Matthew (Baptist Church) for almost 10 years and I am proud of him because he is a young man who loves the Lord," Rev. David Ford said. "He's passionate about giving his service and he understands what it means to be a Christian. And because of that, he tries to exemplify in his walk and in his talk."

Others took the opportunity to criticize the board for everything from discord among members during meetings to the district's teachers have been working without a contract for more than a year. A few seemed to reference the website Niche's annual survey of New Jersey public school

districts, which gave Roselle schools a grade of D.

A lot of their criticism was directed at Fabrizio.

At one point, Democratic council candidate Brandon Bernier suggested Fabrizio should be removed from the board and not Antoine.

Fabrizio, the only white member of the board, was told by board member Keyanna Jones at the Aug. 16 meeting that her "white privilege does not extend to this end of the table" after Fabrizio asked board members to put down their cell phones. She said Jones and Angela Alvey-Wimbush were on their phones and that phone use during meetings had been an ongoing issue at meetings. Jones said she was using her phone to Google information about a new teacher evaluation system being considered by the board. After the contentious discussion, Jones, Alvey-Wimbush and Antoine walked out of the meeting soon after.

After that meeting, Fabrizio said the "white privilege" comment was the latest episode of being "racially assaulted." She said she filed a formal complaint regarding remarks by Jones and other members with Roth between March and May. She said no action had been taken on her complaints. Roth said he has not been able to act on Fabrizio's complaint because the board has not picked a new affirmative action officer after the previous one, business adminis-

trator Jason Jones, was dismissed.

At a few points in the Aug. 27 meeting, Fabrizio said she was going to instruct the two police officers present to remove people calling out from the audience. When a woman walked up in front of the stage and was trying to speak while the meeting was being conducted, Fabrizio called for the police to remove her. Several audience members shouted their objections and the woman eventually returned to her seat.

Other audience members lashed out at Roth.

Before a vote could be taken on the removal of Antoine, Jones made a motion to have Roth "removed from the dais for not having a contract and for giving bad legal advice.

"Legally, Mr. Roth does not have a con-

tract so he really does not have a standing even to be here," she continued. "He does not have a real legal standing to place any complaints on anyone's behalf. He doesn't have a legal standing to give any real legal advice in this forum."

Roth remained after Jones, Antoine, Alvey-Wimbush and Jonathan Davis voted for his removal and Fabrizio, vice president Donna Eleazer and board members Courtney Washington, Sherise Pollard and Richard Villeda voted for him to stay.

Roth explained during a Aug. 28 phone interview that a contract is not necessary since the board passed a resolution to hire him and there is a board-ratified outline of the terms and conditions of his appointment.

Before a vote could be taken on the removal of Antoine, Alvey Wimbush, Jones and Davis spoke in his favor. Jones said that people are afraid of Antoine because he isn't afraid to speak the truth.

Washington and Eleazer, however, took Antoine to task for missing several meetings.

"You advocate for the community. That's wonderful," Eleazer said. "I applaud you for that. But, you're not here working, doing what we need on this school board. We have parents, we have kids. You sit here and you listen to the public tell us off, call us names, but when they say all that, they're talking about you, too. They're talking about you because you're a sitting board member, but unfortunately we all take our positions to heart."

Antoine told the board members: "Don't be shocked if there's a recording out there of a certain individual saying that he plans to make sure I'm removed from this district and your name is on there."

Alvey-Wimbush, Jones and Davis voted for Antoine to stay, the others voted for his removal.

Most of the audience left when the board went into executive session. Mayor Christine Dansereau remained. She called the decision to remove Antoine "a mistake."

Antonelli said Antoine is "upset and disappointed."

"However, he's in good spirits and he can't wait to get back to working for the good people of Roselle and doing the good things for the children of Roselle."

Each bag includes books, CDs and DVDs and links to online resources. There are also complimentary handouts on each topic that patrons may keep.

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
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

A day to never forget

For most people, Tuesday will be just another day to go to work, school or wherever their daily routines take them. But 17 years ago, Sept. 11 became a day no one would ever forget, especially the families of the almost 3,000 people who died in the terrorist attacks.

First, two jet planes crashed into the Twin Towers of the World Trade Center in New York City, eventually causing them to collapse, killing 2,763 people, including 343 firefighters and paramedics and 37 Port Authority police officers. Another plane crashed into the Pentagon, killing 189 people, including 64 passengers.

A fourth airplane crashed into a field in Pennsylvania when passengers tried to take back control from the terrorists; 44 people died. In addition, more than 6,000 other people were injured in these terrorist attacks.

Investigators determined the motivation for these attacks was the involvement of the United States in conflicts throughout the world, either through intelligence, weapons support or actual U.S. troops on the ground in foreign nations. Instead of forcing us to back away, the terrorists awoke a "sleeping giant," much as Japan did with its sneak attack on Pearl Harbor, a move that ultimately drew the United States into World War II. Since Sept. 11, the United States has been involved in countless wars and incursions in foreign lands, all to exorcise the presence of terrorists ranging from Al-Qaeda and Osama bin Laden to terrorists in Iraq, Afghanistan, Pakistan, Syria and around the world.

Things have changed at home, too. Police presence is more noticeable and people are less trusting of strangers and foreigners. Safety precautions are evident at airports, ballfields, concerts, churches, mosques and wherever people are likely to gather. New York City and the other target sites have rebuilt, but the less visible scars remain.

Other countries came to our assistance after Sept. 11, but they, too, have had to deal with terrorism in their own borders and the feelings of camaraderie have proven tenuous. But this can also change. Ours is a nation that has faced great challenges before and we can regain our footing and place in the world, a world in dire need of stability.

Perhaps the saddest aspect is how easily we can

forget. Yes, we need to move on and heal, but so many lost their lives that it would be wrong not to recall them, especially on this day.

How many people remember that Dec. 7, 1941, was when the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor, "a day which will live in infamy," said President Franklin Delano Roosevelt? Does June 6, 1944, mean anything to anyone, or do only the few World War II veterans still alive remember it was the anniversary of D-Day, the largest seaborne invasion in history, which began the liberation of German-occupied France and later Europe? Who remembers the significance of Nov. 22, 1963, when President John F. Kennedy was assassinated in Dallas? Or a happier anniversary, July 20, 1969, when mission commander Neil Armstrong first set foot on the lunar surface, uttering the oft misquoted words, "That's one small step for a man, one giant leap for mankind."

Yes, for far too many of us, these dates have lost their meaning, other than a long forgotten history class or an episode of "Jeopardy." But we need to remember.

That is especially true of this date. Take the time to visit any of the countless memorials to pay tribute to those who lost their lives on that ignominious day. "Reflecting Absence," a pair of reflecting pools in the footprints of the towers, surrounded by a list of the victims' names in an underground memorial space, was completed Sept. 11, 2011. A museum also opened on the site on May 21, 2014. In Arlington County, Virginia, the Pentagon Memorial was completed and opened on the seventh anniversary of the attacks in 2008, consisting of 184 benches facing the Pentagon. In Shanksville, Pa., situated on a hill overlooking where the fourth plane crashed into a field and the white marble Wall of Names, a concrete and glass visitor center was opened on Sept. 10, 2015.

There are other local memorials you can visit as well. The important thing to do is to discuss the significance of what happened on that date with your children and other young people. Explain how something meant to drive us apart brought us together. Stress the importance of remembering both the people who died and their friends and relatives who live. Because this date is more than just a day to remember the dead; it is a day to celebrate the living.

The focus of Joel Chapman

There are similarities meeting again with Joel Chapman, the Hillside Board of Education member who ran successfully last year for a one-year term; he still smiles easily and speaks optimistically about the future of education in the community where he has spent his life and was an honor student. He is running now for a three-year term.

But there are also changes. After a year of facing the bureaucracy of public education, he sees the pace of reform as proceeding far too slowly. There still is infighting on the board and he is not pleased with the loss of teachers to other communities. This is a problem common in urban Union County communities, but it offers little solace to the New York University public administration major, who was a ferocious campaigner last year.

Chapman talks about his goal of "improving criteria" in the basics of math, social studies and language arts. He likes to steer the discussion to the strong improvement he sees in the middle grade students, especially grades three to six. While SAT scores have been consistent, Chapman has moved the focus to greater parental involvement and even more active interaction between the PTA and school board. He acknowledges the need to have a working relationship with the union leadership in the school system as well.

His frequent smile gets ever so wide when he speaks about the cooperative effort to send students graduating the high school on to NJIT. He also loves his state football champs. His remarks are interspersed with slogans like "tapping the potential of the students." And he runs on the slogan of the "Children First Team."

Ever the realist, Chapman has allied himself with running mates Kim Cook and Dennis Kobitz. Pinchas Shapiro and Laquana Best are also his allies, both running for one-year terms. Chapman speaks to the diversity and life experience of his running mates who have the support of the powerful local Democratic Party in the township.

There are challenges. An obscure website, Niche, which rates schools, gave Hillside a C grade. Meanwhile, state school aid went from \$22 million to \$23 million, not a big jump in the world of education. Donna Custard of the N.J. Chamber of Commerce said: "The business community needs reliable measures of accountability and assurances that students are graduating from high school with the requisite skills for in-demand employment opportunities available in our state."

The new school year will start this week. We should all acknowledge the challenges facing the urban districts. The Wall Street Journal reported last week that West Side High School in Newark got a grant from PSEG to construct a laundry room, which

Principal Albar Cook fought for, saying: "Kids were being bullied because they didn't have clean clothes."

Thankfully, we don't hear such stories in Hillside. Maybe we all owe thanks to Joel Chapman and board of education members. They are wrestling daily with educating the kids we expect to take over society some day.

Happy Rosh Hashanah

Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year, is celebrated on the Hebrew calendar date of 1 and 2 Tishrei, this year heralding in the Hebrew Year 5779. Rosh Hashanah, literally meaning “head of the year,” begins at sundown this year on Sunday, Sept. 9, and continues through Monday, Sept. 10, and Tuesday, Sept. 11. This holiday kicks off the Days of Awe, a 10-day period culminating with Yom Kippur. Unlike minor Jewish holidays such as Hanukkah or Purim, work is strictly forbidden on Rosh Hashanah, which, along with Yom Kippur, is called the High Holy Days.

Rosh Hashanah is one of Judaism’s most holy holidays, a time when even the most secular Jews tend to head to synagogue to celebrate the New Year. Rosh Hashanah has a special liturgy with special tunes, called nigunim, that help attendees feel more connected with God, their community and the holiday itself.

The spirit and awe of Rosh Hashanah is not limited to those two days though. During the Hebrew month Elul, the month preceding Rosh Hashanah, Jews begin the tough work of atonement and contemplation that will last through Yom Kippur. Additionally, the shofar, a ram’s horn that emits a loud blast when blown, is blown each day, except the Sabbath, in Elul. According to the rabbis, the sound of the shofar helps blowers and hearers to repent, reminds Jews of the many sufferings they have survived and recalls the shofar blast heard as God gave the Israelites the Ten Commandments.

Rosh Hashanah is celebrated differently by Jews in varying regions, all

depending on their ancestors’ minhagim, or customs. For instance, many Sephardic Jewish communities hold a Rosh Hashanah seder, which includes the eating of certain foods that symbolize good wishes for the coming year.

Just as Jews were at the forefront of comedy in the Borscht Belt and in some Hollywood circles, many of these symbolic foods actually derive from puns; for instance, in Hebrew date is tamar and the prayer said when eating the date includes the phrase “yitamu hataim,” meaning “may the wicked cease.” Sounds pretty punny!

Some nearly universal customs, however, include the blessing over a round challah bread, rather than the usual long braided one, to symbolize the continuity of life. Apples are dipped in honey to symbolize sweetness and good health throughout the New Year. Some people also eat fish or goat heads, which symbolize their desire to be on the top, not the bottom, of life in the New Year. Many Jews also eat a new fruit on the second day of the holiday; this custom, in which Jews eat a fruit they have not eaten in the past year, is both a wish for sweet and new experiences in the coming year, and an opportunity to say the blessing over new things.

Rosh Hashanah is both a time of celebration and of reflection, as it leads into the serious holiday of Yom Kippur. It is a time to look back at the year gone by and to look ahead to the year to come, a true representation of the cycle of life.

We wish everyone a good and sweet New Year! Shanah tovah u’metukah!

Examining Le

To the Editor:

I am a 35-year resident of Union who attended my first board of education meeting 29 years ago. This is my personal response to remarks Steven Le, currently a board of education candidate, made in LocalSource on Aug. 23.

Mr. Le stated that he thinks “things need to be fixed,” but from his past actions, I question if he is the one to fix things. Le upset the stability of the district last year when late last summer he filed a suit against the board. It needlessly went to two courts and worst of all, it cost — wasted — \$30,000 in the school budget that could have been spent in 30,000 other ways. He needlessly sued to try to immediately stop the board from spending \$5 million for school repairs that had been unspent since 2013, when it was left over from a school-renovation project.

The board had to spend money first to defend the case when Le filed in the wrong court, and then again, when he filed on Aug. 16, 2017. The case was heard on Sept. 6, 2017, and Le did not win the case. Thomas Betancourt dismissed the case, the commissioner of education upheld the dismissal in October. The record is a public document and all voters should read the case and the statements of Mr. Betancourt, which, in my opinion, are not too flattering to Le.

If Le had won the case, the construction project which was in progress at Union High School for the lighting, fire alarm and security system would have had to stop immediately and Union High School would not have been able to open for school.

Le was sitting on the board when the transfer of funds was discussed and certainly had to have been aware of the further discussions heard during the dates cited in Mr. Betancourt’s decision, which upheld the legality of the board’s actions. Yet he filed the suit anyway.

I know that I, as a taxpayer, had to pay for the attorney that had to be hired by the board of education. But who paid for Le’s attorney who is listed as Christopher Herriott, part of the Florio, Kenny, Raval law firm?

One final question I have asked myself: Is Le really the kind of person who should be sitting on our Board of Education next year? Is he?

Home rule

To the Editor:

Currently, New Jersey has the highest taxes in the nation.

Much of the excess in taxes is due to the “home rule” structure of the 566 municipalities, 617 school districts and 186 fire districts which exist in New Jersey. For purposes of comparison, Florida has 68 school districts.

Many ideas come to mind regarding reducing costs at the local level, including shared services, regionalization and possibly the township form of government.

One of the primary reasons for the resistance to any of the above cost saving measures is home rule recoil, the fear of confronting home rule.

In theory, home rule can have advantages — including greater accountability and, in some cases, better delivery of services.

But its disadvantages can be much more severe and more sinister, breeding duplications, inefficiency, waste and — at times — even corruption.

Policy makers must overcome home rule recoil and come to grips with the fact their perceptions about home rule are a myth — not a maxim. Indeed, there are

avenues to achieve greater local efficiencies and property tax savings without compromising the affection our citizens have for their unique communities, neighborhoods and towns.

This more efficient government model already exists in all corners of the state; it is called the township form of government.

Hamilton Township in Mercer County is one such example.

The township government provides services for more than 88,000 residents who live in communities with their own distinct character and local names: Yardville, Mercerville, Hamilton Square, White Horse, Quakerbridge and Groveville. Woodbridge in Middlesex County, Jackson in Ocean County, Jefferson in Morris County and Galloway in Atlantic County are similar in structure. All of these communities have property tax rates below the state average.

The state is riddled with hundreds of small communities, some with only a few dozen homes, that could be amalgamated into larger townships.

Layers of government redundancies could be eliminated through sharing agreements or consolidation, producing significant and lasting property tax savings. Meanwhile, each community could maintain its identity and character as distinct sections in more cost-effective townships.

It’s more imperative than ever that New Jersey overcome its home rule recoil and address the suffocating property tax problem that is choking our residents with each passing day.

the battlefield didn't go unnoticed. The Army began to ask him to assume more and more responsibility.

Perez-Santalla was assigned to Allied Forces Southern Europe with the 2nd NATO Signal Battalion in Naples, Italy from 2006-2010. In 2011, he served with the 82nd Airborne at Fort Bragg, N.C., and was selected for an assignment with the Joint Special Operations Command, where he supported the study and interoperability efforts of joint special operations and exercises with radio frequency management.

While assigned to JSOC, Perez-Santalla was selected to attend the National Defense University's College of International Security Affairs, where he received his Master of Arts in Strategic Security Studies in 2014. His thesis focused on national security impacts of federally reallocated radio spectrum from the Department of Defense to private industry and was published in the summer edition of the Army Communicator Magazine that year.

In 2016, he was assigned as the Non-Commissioned Officer in Charge of satellite

operations at Headquarters, U.S. Special Operations Command in Tampa, Fla. While serving in Tampa, he was requested by name to assist with the Army's newly established Cyber Directorate in the Pentagon, which focuses on Cyberspace Operations, Information Operations and Electronic Warfare.

Perez-Santalla's expertise as a frequency manager has made him valuable in cyber and informational security.

He understands that the notion of a silent, invisible threat scares some more than, say, a column of tanks moving across a battlefield. He likens it to something out of Hitchcock film and notes that there's plenty of books that have been written that suggest the next world war will be "fought in the cyber domain or won't be fought on the battlefield, with ones and zeros or radio frequencies."

"I sleep well at night knowing that there are thousand-pound brains and very capable people throughout that are able to handle those problems," Perez-Santalla said. "They war game all that and they know the solutions. Hopefully I'm part of that some-

where. That's why I can go home and not be worried about it and know that there's tons of talent out there."

When Perez-Santalla does go home after a 12- or 13-hour shift, he jumps right in to help his wife, Iolanda, and their three kids: Aurora Liberty, 8, James Justice, 6, and Ryan Freedom, 2.

He said Aurora is beginning to understand that her dad is a hero, resplendent in his Air Assault Wings, Combat Action Badge, Space Badge and Bronze Star.

"She understands that a little more than the others," he said. "When Veterans Day and stuff comes up they tend to focus on that a little bit more like, 'Bring a photo of your daddy to school.'" She kind of understands it.

"She is my daughter and she gets emotional, too. When I have to go away on a work trip, she gets emotional. But I always come home, thankfully. She gets it and I think she appreciates it. After all, her middle name is Liberty."

not even shocked it went viral. It's pretty much nationwide and worldwide this point. Everybody has picked up on this story, which is great. I love it. I really knew it would make it."

Harrison, however, expressed remorse for the way the billboard adversely affected the township.

"Did I try to be divisive?" he said. "Did I try to break the town up? No. It wasn't my intention, and that's the only thing I would probably regret if anything."

Harrison and two other men brandishing signs promoting the movie appeared on the sidewalk in front of the billboard at various times last week.

Union Police Director Daniel Zieser said officers from the department were dispatched to the area three times because people were going into the road and trying to hand out pamphlets.

"They kept going into the street and people were complaining, 'Gee, I almost hit that guy. Send a car over there,'" Zieser said. "A couple of times (the police went over) just to tell them to stay on the sidewalk, stay out of the street, especially with traffic stopped for the traffic light down by Elmwood and Commerce there. They would step into the street and try to handout brochures or whatever you want to call them, or handbills. We had to tell them to get out of street and stay on the sidewalk. It was nothing. They complied."

Harrison acknowledged that he had hired two men to stand near the billboard with signs, but he said they were not the ones stepping into traffic.

Harrison said that he expected a backlash from the title of the documentary, which he hopes will be out by Christmas — called "Our Leader The Idiot", his "Christmas gift to President Trump."

What he didn't expect, however, was to get so many

threats. Harrison, who listed his email address on the billboard, said he has not reported the threats to police.

"I'm a kid who grew up in the streets," he said. "If you tell someone you're going to do something, you're not going to do it. The guys that I have to worry about don't say a word. They just come at you. This is nothing new. That's part of being in the public eye and I'm not the only guy."

He described his film as a look back at the past two and

a half years of the president's life.

"It will be the most entertaining presidential film that anyone has ever seen," Harrison said. "It's going to be bright, not all negative, but it's going to show the man the way I see the man from my point of view, which is what a lot of Americans do. He's a very manipulative kind of guy. He's a mastermind and that's what makes the man scary."



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Union man arrested after neighborhood chase for assault, robbery

A Union man was apprehended after leading police on a foot chase through backyards and over fences, and is accused of punching a woman in the head and stealing her purse, police said.

Samuel Frazier, 41, of the Vauxhall neighborhood, was apprehended Wednesday, Aug. 15, after police received a report at about 9:25 a.m. of a street robbery on Liberty Avenue.

The unidentified victim reported that she was walking on Liberty Avenue when a man punched her in the head and stole her purse. The suspect was described as a black male last seen running onto Carlton Terrace, and officers began to check area yards.

As they entered a rear yard on Carlton, the officers reportedly saw Frazier, who then fled. Detectives and other officers

responded to the scene, along with a Union County Sheriff's Office K-9 unit to track Frazier. When he was eventually apprehended, Frazier did not have the purse.

The victim was able to identify Frazier as the person who robbed her, and on Carlton a detective located his car, which was then towed.

Detectives and officers canvassed the neighborhood and, with the help of the K-9

unit, found the purse in a rear yard on Carlton. Detectives later returned the purse to the owner, who had minor injuries from the attack.

According to police reports, Frazier also fits the description of a suspect sought in a similar robbery Sunday, Aug. 12, on Burlington Avenue, when a woman was punched in the face and her jaw broken. Detectives are investigating that crime.



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Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year, is one of Judaism's holiest days. Meaning "head of the year" or "first of the year," the festival begins on the first day of Tishrei, the seventh month of the Hebrew calendar, which falls during September or October. Rosh Hashanah commemorates the creation of the world and marks the beginning of the Days of Awe, a 10-day period of introspection and repentance that culminates in the Yom Kippur holiday, also known as the Day of Atonement. Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are the two "High Holy Days" in the Jewish religion.

Unlike modern New Year's celebrations, which are often raucous parties, Rosh Hashanah is a subdued and contemplative holiday. Because Jewish texts differ on the festival's length, Rosh Hashanah is observed for a single day by some denominations and for two days by others. Work

is prohibited, and religious Jews spend much of the holiday attending synagogue. Because the High Holy Day prayer services include distinct liturgical texts, songs and customs, rabbis and their congregations read from a special prayer book known as the machzor during both Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

The sounding of the shofar—a trumpet made from a ram's horn—is an essential and emblematic part of both Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. The ancient instrument's plaintive cry serves as a call to repentance and a reminder to Jews that God is their king.

Tradition requires the shofar blower to play four sets of notes on Rosh Hashanah: tekiah, a long blast; shevarim, three short blasts; teruah, nine staccato blasts; and tekiah gedolah, a very long blast. Because of this ritual's close association with Rosh Hashanah, the holiday is also known as Yom Teruah—the day of the sounding of the shofar.

Local man is charged in Plainfield pedestrian death

A South Plainfield man charged with leaving the scene of a fatal pedestrian strike that took place four months ago in Plainfield has also been charged with second-degree death by auto, after it was determined that speed and alcohol were factors in the incident, the Union County Prosecutor's Office said.

Lavar B. Jones, 37, was charged in connection with the death of Sergio D. Cuxun-Tista, 39, of Plainfield, who had just exited a taxi when he was struck and killed.

At approximately 2:30 a.m. on Sunday, April 29, Plainfield police responded to the 1100 block of West Eighth Street in Plainfield to find Cuxun-Tista seriously injured, according to Union County Assistant Prosecutor Armando Suarez, who is prosecuting the case. The victim was pronounced dead at the scene shortly after. Jones was located shortly thereafter at his home, several hundred feet away on West Eighth Street, just over Plainfield's municipal border with South Plainfield. Also found outside the home was his Honda Accord, which reportedly had heavy front-end and windshield damage.

According to an investigation, Jones was allegedly traveling at approximately 65 mph in a 25-mph zone when the incident occurred. More than six hours after the

crash, his blood-alcohol level was reportedly measured to be nearly double the legal limit of 0.08 percent. Convictions on second-degree charges are commonly punishable by five to 10 years

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

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
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

Elizabeth scored the game-winning touchdown in the fourth quarter of its 35-28 triumph over Bridge-water-Raritan. BR reached the last three North 2, Group 5 state championship games, falling to Westfield all three times.

The ball then popped up in the air and then fell into the arms of Union sophomore wide receiver Jalen Carter, who was all alone in the end zone to make the dramatic touchdown grab. Carter was simply in the right place at the right time.

Last year Union lost three straight games by one point. That was not to be the case Friday night as first-year placekicker Ricardo Casas, a junior, was perfect with the game-tying extra point.

"The Union Drive" — as I will call it — covered 88 yards in seven plays and took 1:23. The Farmers never had to use their final timeout, thanks to the smooth and highly-effective play of Sanborn, who was clutch big-time — along with his receivers — under pressure.

Linden got the ball back with just over 40 seconds to go and one carry by senior running back BJ George was stuffed for only a one-yard gain. George finished regulation with 49 yards on 26 attempts.

Overtime was next.

Union got the ball first and this time moved forward with a running attack up the middle that saw senior running back Justin Peterman gain 20 yards, four more on his next carry to the one and then fellow senior running back Michel Lucien taking it into the end zone to give Union its first lead. "It's very disappointing that Roselle Park does not have a varsity team," said Miller, who not only has coached against the Panthers since 2002, but played against them when he was a student at Brearley Regional in the mid-1980s.

"With the great tradition that they have and the things they have done over there going back to even when I played in high school, it's unfortunate," Miller said. "There are other teams in our conference such as South Hunterdon and Dayton that have struggled with numbers recently."

Gov. Livingston football has 21-14 victory over Johnson Highlanders come back in the second half

BERKELEY HEIGHTS — The Gov. Livingston football team defeated Johnson 21-14 last Thursday in the first game for both.

Johnson scored first on its second possession, which was a two-play, 12-yard drive following a 33-yard punt return by Max Carmino.

Johnson senior running back Sebastian Iakouchevitch was stopped for a two-yard loss on first down and then scored on a 14-yard run on second. Nicholas Serpe kicked the extra point to give the Crusaders a 7-0 lead with 4:45 left in the first quarter.

Iakouchevitch scored both Johnson touchdowns and led all rushers with 186 yards on 29 carries. He gained 53 yards on 15 carries in the first half.

GL tied the game in the third quarter at 7-7 when the Highlanders took the kickoff and then marched 69 yards in 10 plays, using nearly five minutes. James Snyder capped the drive with a three-yard touchdown run.

GL went ahead 13-7 in the fourth quarter, moving 41 yards in seven plays following a Noah Truncale defensive fumble recovery when Johnson misplayed a pitch.

The Highlanders scored on a nine-yard run on second-and-eight. The extra point was not kicked, with an attempted run for two points thwarted by a John Cuccolo (No. 15) tackle.

Truncale also came up with an interception that halted Johnson's previous possession.

Johnson took the lead back right after GL scored its second touchdown. The Crusaders marched 81 yards in eight plays, with Iakouchevitch scoring from 17 yards out on first-and-10.

Serpe's second extra point put Johnson up 14-13 with 6:57 remaining.

GL was held without a first down the next time it had the ball and quick-kicked it back to Johnson. After the Crusaders were then held without a first down themselves, Carmino produced a 41-yard punt to the GL nine-yard line with 3:04 left and the Highlanders down to just one timeout.

On first down Jake Faulkner caught a touchdown pass that covered 91 yards. James Snyder then ran in the two-point conversion to make it 21-14 GL.

Johnson advanced as far as its own 32, went backwards, and then reached its own 31 before its final drive stalled.
